As many of you know, Naples is famous for its grapes, and we had a wonderful time in the vineyard, picking various types such as Concord, Niagara, and green grapes.

As we wandered through the vineyard, picking and enjoying the grapes — especially the Concord, which I discovered I love more than any other — I came across a scene that took my breath away. A large, beautiful bunch of grapes was hanging from the vine, perfectly attached. It was a simple yet amazing sight, and in that moment, a biblical message came powerfully to my mind.

I was reminded of Jesus' words in John 15:5, where He said, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing."

This verse came alive to me like never before. As I looked at that bunch of grapes firmly connected to the vine, I truly understood what Jesus meant. Just as those grapes cannot grow and thrive without being connected to the vine, we cannot bear spiritual fruit without remaining connected to Jesus. It's not about our hard work, efforts, or passion alone; it's about being rooted in Christ. Only when we are connected to Him can we bear the fruit of His Spirit — love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

This experience reminded me of the importance of our constant connection with Jesus in our faith journey. As we move through this season, may we focus on staying close to Him, allowing His life-giving Spirit to flow through us and bear good fruit.

District Superintendent Rev. Suzanne Block to Speak About the 2024 Changes to the Book of Discipline — October 23

During the General Conference held this year in May, the UMC overwhelmingly approved changes to remove from the Book of Discipline discriminatory language and bans related to ministry by, with, and for self-avowed and practicing LGBTQ+ persons. This allows for same-sex weddings performed in UMC churches and with UMC clergy, and also allows ordination of openly LGBTQ clergy.

Rev. Block will come to Aldersgate on **Wednesday**, **October 23rd at 6:00 PM** to share with us the theological reasons why the Conference has made this change, how it impacts UMC churches, as well as to answer any questions you might have. This will be an opportunity for an open and honest exchange of ideas and information.





Trust the Process: God's Hand in Creation and Our Lives

How many of you have ever sat down with a ball of clay, tried to make something, and thought, "This still looks like a blob of clay?" Or maybe you scribbled a drawing and thought, "I tried to draw a dinosaur, but it looks more like a squiggly marshmallow with feet?" We've all been there.

It's easy to feel discouraged when starting something new. Maybe you tried a sport and weren't great at first, or learned something new at school that didn't click right away. Sometimes, starting over in a new place with new friends feels awkward. When we try new things, it often feels messy or chaotic, and the vision in our heads doesn't match reality. But here's the encouraging part: even God, when He created the heavens and the earth, started with something formless and chaotic. (*Genesis 1:2*)

I love that. It reminds me that everything great starts somewhere small, even messy. God could have spoken

creation into existence all at once, but instead, He built it one step at a time. First, there was light, then sky, water, land, plants, animals, and finally man. Each step built upon the last, carefully and intentionally.

God is like an artist, starting with a blank canvas, adding details layer by layer. What looks like nothing at first becomes a masterpiece over time. Just as God took time and care to create the world, He's also working on us. When we start something new, whether it's a project or a big change in life, it might feel chaotic at first—but trust the process. Most great achievements happen right when we feel like giving up.

God has started a process in each of us, and He's not done yet (*Philippians 1:6, Jeremiah 29:11*). If He could turn a chaotic mess into the beautiful world we see today, He can certainly shape our lives, too. So, next time things feel messy, or a little chaotic, remember: *trust the process!*

Nakivale School Project Update

As we reported in our last update, we are able to proceed with the building of the school in Nakivale Refugee Settlement as long as we add a church to the school campus, so that the program falls under the oversight of the Ugandan Federal Church.

Since building another church building would have added cost to the program, we looked at the possibility of incorporating Redeemed Nakivale Church, built by Pastor Renzha while he lived in Nakivale, into this Ebenezer Hope Ministries project. Upon checking with the Republic of Uganda Registrar of Companies we found that the name Ebenezer had been incorporated for another church.

So Redeemed Nakivale Church, the land around it, and the in-process school campus are now incorporated as Naioth Revival Center Ministries (NRCM) Limited by the Registrar of Companies. The church building, its water purification systems, and rain water collection system previously purchased by donations are all part of the school campus.

Naioth is mentioned in 1 Samuel 19:18-19 & 22-23 as a place where Samuel supervised a community of prophets, a prophets' school; as well as the place where David escaped from Saul via prophesying.



Building of the school is now in process. The accompanying picture shows the first classroom building, with four classrooms, in process. We are getting ready to start building the second building that will contain six more classrooms.

Now we are requesting everyone who has supported student scholarships in the past to please donate at least that equivalent annual amount, which should support the necessary building program. Once built, the school is expected to be self-supporting from tuition from local residents.



In *The Book of Charlie*, one of our nation's most prominent writers discovers the truth about how to live a long and happy life from the centenarian next door in this "original and highly readable account of a splendid American life" (*The Wall Street Journal*).

When a veteran Washington journalist moved to Kansas, he met a new neighbor who was more than a century old. Little did he know that he was beginning a long friendship—and a profound lesson in the meaning of life. Charlie White was no ordinary neighbor. Born before radio, Charlie lived long enough to use a smartphone. When a shocking tragedy interrupted his idyllic boyhood, Charlie mastered survival strategies that reflect thousands of years of human wisdom. Thus armored, Charlie's sense of adventure carried him on an epic journey of the Jazz Age, racing aboard ambulances through Depressionera gangster wars, improvising techniques for early openheart surgery, and cruising the Amazon as a guest of Peru's president.

David Von Drehle came to understand that Charlie's resilience and willingness to grow made this remarkable neighbor a master in the art of thriving through times of dramatic change. As a gift to his children, he set out to tell Charlie's secrets. *The Book of Charlie* is a "genuinely original, formula-shattering" (Bob Woodward) gospel of grit — the inspiring story of one man's journey through a century of upheaval. The history that unfolds through Charlie's story reminds you that the United States has always been a divided nation, a questing nation—a nation of Charlies in the rollercoaster pursuit of a good and meaningful life.

Explaining Creation to Your Kids

Recently in Sunday School, we've started talking about creation, and some of the kids have been asking a big question: "Who created God?" Great question! I explained to them that God created the universe we live in, but God Himself didn't have a beginning. Since we live in the universe God created, the rules of the universe — like time — apply to us, but not to Him.

That's the simple way to explain it, but there's a more complex way too.

Our universe runs on the rules of time, but time is actually a physical property of the universe God created. Under certain conditions — such as changes in gravity, mass, and acceleration — even time can behave differently. In extreme places like black holes, for example, time itself behaves in strange ways because the laws of physics break down. This means that time only applies to the universe we live in, because God created time as part of it. The rules of time don't apply to God, so there's no beginning or end for Him. He exists outside of time, and the Bible describes Him as one who "inhabits eternity" (Isaiah 57:15). Since God is outside of time and space, He can know all events — past, present, and future — simultaneously.

Here's a fun fact: In 1955, the famous scientist **Albert Einstein** wrote, "People like us, who believe in physics, know that the distinction between past, present, and future is only a stubbornly persistent illusion." That's an amazing quote! It might be hard to explain, but some scientists who study Einstein's **theory of relativity** believe that all moments in time — **past, present, and future** — exist at once, like **points on a map**. We just experience them one at a time because of the way our universe is set up — we call that the "four-dimensional space-time continuum." It's a fancy way of saying the universe can be measured in all directions and time is also measurable. But independent of that structure, like where **God exists**, you could see all of time at once.

While the **universe** and everything in it needs a beginning, **God has always existed** — He wasn't created.

It's a lot to think about! But if you ever get stuck, just remember: "All you need to know is—it's science!" LOL



Today's kids also need to understand how **modern** science approaches creation. Even though many scientists believe in God, when they do science, they focus on explaining how the universe works without mentioning God. It's kind of like trying to explain how a TV was made without talking about the people who designed or programmed it. That's why scientists use a really long scale of time — they think about how long things might take if they happened on their own and how they could happen on their own. But don't worry too much about that. **Science** looks at how things work and tries to explain how they came to be, but it doesn't answer the deeper questions of who made them or why. That's where faith comes in. Science doesn't exclude **God** — it just approaches things from a different angle. Our **faith** is independent of science, and while scientific views may change, what we believe about God stays the same.

While science helps us understand **how** the universe works, it doesn't answer the deeper questions of **why** we exist, **what** our purpose is, or the **meaning** of life. Science can explain the mechanics of the world, but it doesn't provide for our **spiritual** and **emotional needs**. That's where **faith** comes in — giving us answers to the questions that science wasn't designed to address.

Choir Director Job Opening

Position Purpose: To provide leadership and direction to the Aldersgate UMC Chancel Choir, and thereby facilitate a high-quality choral music ministry for both the participating vocalists and the church membership.

Responsibilities: Subject to review and adjustment in conjunction with the Pastor, the Staff/Parish Committee, the Worship Committee, and the Church Council (when appropriate), the following constitute the major responsibilities of the Choir Director at Aldersgate United Methodist Church.

Working Conditions: The Choir Director requires flexibility in hours available for work, including evenings and weekends. The position is a part-time, year-around, salaried position. The actual number of hours required during any given week are those that are needed to fulfill the responsibilities of the position. It is recognized that the schedule may vary at different times of the year.
