FROM YOUR PASTOR...

There's so much bad news out there that it's easy to get caught up in fear and negativity. Our tendency when things get tough is to want to circle the wagons, to work even harder at building security for ourselves. This is, of course, futile. The only real security we have is in God. Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. There is an alternative to worry and fear and the self-protective behaviors that often flow from these.

One thing we can do is to, in the words of an old hymn, "Count your blessings, name them one by one." (I probably don't' have that exactly right, but I hope it's close.) When we take time to count our blessings, we are reminded how very much God has blessed us with from Jesus, to family and friends, to the church, to material wealth unmatched anywhere in the world, to the beauty we see around us, to special talents and abilities, to even the trials we experience that help us grow, and the list goes on and on. Give God thanks for all of these and ask for help in entrusting worries and fears to God.

We can also remember that God has blessed us so that we can be a blessing to others. (Genesis 12:3) God has given us so much so that we can share what we've been given with others. "God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work." (2 Corinthians 9:8) This does not mean that you have to give to every good cause and every special offering. It does mean that even when finances are tight we can keep on giving, because God will continue to bless us. God can take whatever we can give and bless others with it. Remember, Jesus is the one who took the five loaves and two fish that were offered and multiplied them to feed 5000 people.

The leadership of Aldersgate is diligent about being good stewards of the contributions you make toward the ministries of the church and the other resources we have. Last year, our second mile giving was \$35,279. That was significantly greater than in recent years and couldn't have come at a better time. Most of this money came from sources outside of our pledged giving. It's a great testament to the hearts of Aldersgate folk who continue to reach out in these tough economic times. I thank you for your generosity that makes this possible. I pray we will continue to be responsive to the growing need and trust that God will continue to make it possible as he blesses us.



FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

Dear Aldersgate Family:

Another school year is over—vacation times are here—perhaps a "Staycation" this year—whatever?

I wanted to share a little humor with you that will give you a lift—whatever you are facing today! June Griffin shared with me a story that I just had to pass on:

THE CHILDREN'S BIBLE IN A NUTSHELL

Feeding the Hungry

In one of his resurrection appearances three times Jesus asked Simon Peter, "Do you love me?" When Peter answered, "yes," Jesus responded, "Feed my lambs." "Tend my sheep." And "Feed my sheep." (John 21:15ff) Jesus calls his followers to feed and care for others, both spiritually and physically. Aldersgate is involved in both of these. In this short article we can't cover the whole gamut, but hope to clear up some confusion about our involvement in local food ministries. There are currently two ministries in Greece that offer food to those in need.

The Greece Ecumenical Food Shelf has been in existence for many years. Needy families from Greece can receive food from the Food Shelf once every three months. The Food Shelf receives 25% of the money we raise through our Annual C.R.O.P. walk (the remaining 75% feeds hungry people around the world) and has been the recipient of our Brown Bag Sunday food collections. Our next Brown Bag Sunday for the Greece Ecumenical Food Shelf is July 26.


Mission Share has been a ministry of the Greece Assembly of God Church until recently when several churches, including Aldersgate, have joined together to expand this ministry because of the growing need in our area. Recently we collected rice and syrup to help stock the shelves of the newly opened facility on Long Pond Road (in the building that formerly held the Greece Town Court). Approximately half of the food from our most recent Brown Bag Sunday was also given to this ministry. This drive was part of a Greece Central School and Greece churches collaboration.

At present, a needy family can receive food from Mission Share each month. They also receive information about Christ and the churches that are part of Mission Share.

The two ministries are not in competition, but working together to provide food, clothing and other services to people in our area.

A third ministry is Angelfood Ministries. This is a totally different program. This is a ministry that by using many volunteers provides low cost (not free), good quality food to everyone who wants to purchase it. The Hope Lutheran Church currently hosts this ministry. We hope to be able to do the same at Aldersgate, but because of our proximity to Hope Lutheran we may not be approved as a distribution site in which case we will work with Hope Lutheran. ALDERSGATE UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

WATCH FOR EARLY START TO SALES OF SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Please help us gather supplies for School and Health Kits for the United Methodist Committee on Relief again this year for delivery to Mission Central. We'll start with school supplies, since those often go on sale as early as July. We will put collection boxes out under the coat racks as soon as we seen the school supply ads.

Each School Kit includes the following: 1 pair blunt scissors (rounded tip), 3 pads (or loose leaf) of 8 1/2" x 11" ruled paper, 1 30-centimeter ruler, 1 hand-held pencil sharpener, 6 new pencils with erasers, 1 eraser (2 1/2"), and 1 box of 24 crayons.

In addition to this list for UMCOR, we will also be collecting **pens**, **two-pocket folders**, **and school glue** for the backpacks that **Mission Share** distributes before school starts each fall. These are needed by August 1.

For Health Kits we need these items: hand towels (15"x25" to 17'x27"); washcloths; large, sturdy combs; nail files or fingernail clippers; bath-sized bars of soap; single toothbrushes in original wrappers; and adhesive plastic strip sterile bandages.

Last year we were able to send 152 School Kits, 100 Health Kits, and several boxes of Flood Bucket supplies. Members of Sew 'n Sew's are busy making the school bags. You can help us do the rest. Watch the weekly bulletins for updates.

RUMMAGE SALE RESULTS

In case you haven't heard, we still hold the best Rummage Sale around! This last one was our best yet with the best results: total proceeds were over \$4500. Baked goods sold out every day and those sales alone raised \$356 of the total!

Thank you to everyone who helped in any way with the Treasure Sale this year. Whether you brought in donations, shopped or helped with the preparations or clean-up, your efforts were important to the successful outcome of this annual venture.

Half the proceeds from the sale will be used to purchase additional tables for the Ide Center and the other half will be used to meet our Pledge to Mission commitment and to support other UMW mission outreach programs.



ANGELFOOD MINISTRIES

Mission Outreach is sponsoring Angelfood Ministries in conjunction with Hope Lutheran Church. Angelfood Ministries is a non-profit, non-denominational food program dedicated to providing assistance throughout the

United States. It was started in 1994 and is now serving in 35 states and helps close to 500,000 families.

Their basic box of food (meat and vegetables) for \$30.00 will serve a family of four for a week. There are no qualifiers, all you have to have is a desire to eat. Anyone can purchase one box, or as many as they want. They also have a senior convenience boxes (for anyone who really doesn't want to cook) ten frozen dinners—just heat and serve, that are highly nutritious, and costs only \$28.99. They have special boxes also every month, fruit and veggie box, all meat box, etc. for very reasonable prices.

The menus change monthly. We will have their July order forms in the Gathering Space for you to look at and order from. At present, Hope Lutheran Church is the distributor, but we hope soon to have our church as a distribution point. We will be taking orders and volunteering with them for now.

We track and report giving two ways: by reporting the giving each Sunday in each category (regular offering, specials, building fund, etc.) and by comparing the total to date with the two previous years. The reports from our Financial Secretary for the first quarter of the year showed that 2009 giving was trailing several thousand be-

hind that in both 2008 and 2007.

Now, in spite of what some people think, we really don't spend all our time talking about money for the budget. In fact even most of our fundraising projects are mission efforts. But a funny thing happened. We did start talking about it, formally at Finance and Church Council meetings and informally with others when the subject came up. We didn't want to set off alarm bells—the church is not going broke. On the other hand, we are in this together with the Lord, and people do need to know the situation.

And a funny thing happened. Offerings in May and so far in June have increased significantly, enough so that the June Finance Report shows that we are now ahead of 2007 and closing in on 2008. While, for the first time, we had to make the mortgage payment a week late in May, we were on time again in June. In the meantime work

areas are spending money that needs to be spent but managing their resources carefully. (When have they not had to do that?) We do have more "catching up" to do because it is not enough to stay even with previous year when our costs go up, but our finances are headed in the right direction

Is this experience so odd? Not really! God has provided for our church every step of the way since we set off on this journey of expanding our facilities and our outreach. If we remain faithful to his call, God will continue to provide the resources.
