

FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

Dear Aldersgate Family:

Having served a church in Minneapolis for 10 years, we loved to listen to Garrison Keillor's "Prairie Home Companion" and loved his commentaries on Scandinavians and Lutherans (the predominant church denomination in Minnesota). So when I found the article that Keillor wrote about Methodists, I just had to share it with you. It's interesting the impressions we make on "an outsider"... Here it is:

Garrison Keillor on Methodists

We make fun of Methodists for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese. But nobody sings like them. If vou were to ask an audience in New York City, a relatively Methodist-less place, to sing along on the chorus of "Michael row the Boat Ashore," they will look daggers at you, as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But, if vou do this among Methodists, they'd smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach! And down the road!

Many Methodists are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little heart against that person's rib cage. It's natural for Methodists to sing in harmony. We

are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A7th and D7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other. I do believe this: People, these Methodists, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you can call up when you're in deep distress.

If you're dying, they will comfort you. If you are lonely, they'll talk to you. And if you are hungry they'll give you tuna salad.

Methodists believe in prayer, but would practically die, if asked to pray out loud.

Methodists like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.

Methodists believe their pastors will visit them in the hospital even if they don't notify them that they are there.

Methodists believe in miracles and even expect miracles, especially during their stewardship visitation programs or when passing the plate.

Methodists drink coffee as if it were the Third Sacrament.

Methodists feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall.

Methodists still serve Jell-O in the

proper liturgical color of the season and think that peas in a tuna casserole adds too much color.

Methodists believe that it is OK to poke fun at themselves and never take themselves too seriously.

And finally, you know you are a Methodist when:

It's 100 degrees, with 90% humidity and you still have coffee after the service.

You hear something funny in the sermon and smile as loudly as you can

Donuts are a line item in the church budget, just like coffee.

When you watch a Star Wars movie and they say, "May the Force be with you," and you respond, "and also with you."

And lastly, it takes ten minutes to say good-bye!

So, do you agree that it is great to be a Methodist whether Keillor has the right impression of us or not? Have a "Happy June" with picnics, graduations, Annual Conference, beautiful weather — and all the other things we associate with June!

FAITH FACTOR YOUTH MINISTRY AT ALDERSGATE UMC

Thank you, people of Aldersgate, for supporting our youth in mission. Faith Factor youth have been truly blessed by our fundraising efforts and your generous donations. Our net total was \$689.62 for the Dinner and a Movie Night! Thanks also to all the adult volunteers who helped with this event. You guys rock! Our second fundraiser this Spring was the Delta-Sonic discounted ticket sales. This fundraiser, which closed on May 11th, raised a profit of \$147 for the youth mission trip. Thanks to all the folks who worked on this and those of you who contributed. We have placed the order with Delta-Sonic and will have your tickets shortly.

The purpose of our fundraising efforts is to be able to raise

enough money to cover two components of the mission trip. the cost of rental van for the week along with fuel, and the cost of three motel rooms for the additional overnight on the way down to Virginia. We needed an additional overnight this year because of the length of the drive and the check-in time at the mission campsite. The cost of the van along with fuel will be approximately \$1,300. The cost of the three motel rooms is approximately \$300. As you can see, we're still a little bit short of our goal. We need your help! We are going to run another Delta-Sonic fundraiser in June and with your help we expect to close the gap on the motel rooms. We're still considering ways to close the gap on the van and fuel.

Those of you who would like to continue supporting the Aldersgate Faith Factor youth in mission this summer, and those of you who perhaps have not had the opportunity yet to do so, can contribute directly to the youth mission trip. Just write "youth mission trip" on your offering envelope Sunday. You can designate how much you want to go to the youth mission trip. We appreciate your support, and we know that with yours and God's help, this year's youth mission trip will be a blessed one.

MISSION NEWS



UMCOR UPDATE

In a recent news release, the United Methodist Committee on Relief reported that Charity Navigator, the largest and most-used evaluator of charities, gave UMCOR a four-star rating for sound fiscal management. That is their highest award and is issued to selected not-forprofits that exceed industry standards and outperform most charities in its cause. Members of our church have recently seen UMCOR featured on national news programs and in newspapers as an organization that will use your donations wisely.

Those following the news know that this has already been one of the worst tornado seasons in the U.S. in a decade. A member of the Missouri Conference Disaster Response Team noted that Missouri is already involved in eight separate recovery efforts—two ice storms, three floods, and three tornadoes. Disaster Response Teams are at work in Oklahoma, Georgia, Arkansas, Mississippi, and Virginia as well. In each case they are providing immediate assistance, cooperating with other non-profit and government response efforts, preparing plans for long-term recovery. The strength of the United Methodist Committee on Relief is in its commitment to that long-term recovery.

On the international level, UMCOR is working with Action by

Churches Together, a network of church and faith-based agencies to get some relief to people in Myanmar. Partner organizations have been able to distribute water purification tablets, food, and materials for shelter reconstruction. UMCOR is providing funding support to those partners who are permitted to work there, insuring that the assistance is delivered directly to those who need it most.

In China UMCOR is working through Amity Foundation, a Chinese social service organization with which UMCOR has partnered for more than twenty years. In addition to providing bottled water, packets of dried instant noodles, and plastic tarps for temporary shelters, Amity has begun to organize qualified volunteer social workers to help those in need deal with the trauma of the event. Amity estimates that its involvement in long-term relief work will last well into next year if not longer.

The best way to provide immediate assistance in any of these disasters is to give money. It is the most portable; and, if spent in the disaster area, helps to boost economic recovery as well. If you have in your heart a call to respond to a specific relief effort, you may indicate that on your check. Considering the number of active disaster responses right now, you may just want to indicate "Domestic Disaster Response" or "International Disaster

Response." Please make your checks payable to Aldersgate UMC. Your gifts show our concern for the world around us and make a real difference in the lives of those served by our own relief organization.


