## PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

We have completed our five week study of the Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations by Bishop Robert Schnase. We've been reminded about the importance of radical hospitality, passionate worship, intentional faith development, risk-taking mission and service, and extravagant generosity. We need to be vigilant in practicing these five things as individuals and as a congregadion. The "Discover Your Spiritual Path" brochure is intended to help each one of us be more intentional about our faith development. I pray you have taken the time to use it and are actively taking the next step (s) you identified. I have and am. If you don't have one, the brochures are available in the gathering area or by calling the church office.

On October 26, we began another church wide study called Living Beyond Myself. It focuses our attention on the practice of risk-taking mission and service and how we can live more fully for Christ who will transform our lives and teach us how to make them really count for something. This four-week series has a small group component that you won't want to miss. If you are not currently in a small group, any of the existing small groups would be happy for you to join them for this
study. I also will be starting a new group on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 PM beginning October 28. If you'd like to be a part of this new group, give me a call (663-3665).

I'm also very excited about a new opportunity we have this coming Christmas season to make a difference for Christ. In addition to our continued participation in the White Gift program to bring God's love to people in the Rochester area, we will be offering the opportunity to share God's love with people throughout the world. In August, at the Willow creek Leadership Summit we heard from Gary Haugen. Gary is a lawyer who quit his regular law practice to start an organizadion called International Justie Ministries. This is a ministry that works to secure jusmice for victims of slavery, sexual exploitation and other forms of violent oppression. They are making a real difference. When people have been freed they receive counseling and are helped to reenter socity. They need jobs. This is where Trade As One and Better Way Imports come in. These are two organizations that market products made by these people and others that live in extreme poverty. The youth will be doing a fund raiser selling handbags from

Better Way Imports. This is a great opportunity for us to support the youth and help others who really need our help. As a church, we will be involved in project H.O.P.E. through Trade As One. The H.O.P.E. project will enable us to pourchase Christmas gifts for our friends and family that they will enjoy and use from the products marketed by Trade As One. It's a win-win opportunity to make our Christmas purchases make a double if-ference-bringing joy to our family and friends and joy to some of the poorest of the poor by helping them to have meaningful jobs. You'll be hearing more about this in the near future. If you'd like to join the team putting it together, please contact me soon. Together we can help bring justice to some of the least and the last. This is, after all, part of our mandate from God. "God has shown you what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." ## FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

## Dear Friends:

Is it possible that November is here - the month the elections will be over, then we observe Veterans' Day and Thanksgiving. Besides these, our church calendar is fullsee the details in this Hinge.

As we come to Veterans’ Day, I would like to share with you an important story.

## The Story of TAPS

If any of you have ever been to a military funeral in which taps were played; this brings out a new meaning of it. Here is something Every American should know. Until I read this, I didn't know, but I checked it out and it's true:

We in the United States have all heard the jaunting song, "Taps." It's the song that gives us that lump in our throats and usually tears in our eyes. But, do you know the story behind the song? If not, I think you will be interested to find out about its humble beginnings.

Reportedly, it all began in 1862 during the Civil War, when Union Army Captain Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate Army was on the other side of the narrow strip of land. During the night, Captain Ellicombe heard the moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the Captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the Captain
reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment. When the Captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead. The Captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son. The boy had been studying music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted. The Captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But, out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one musician. The Captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. The wish was granted.

The haunting melody, we now know as "Taps" used at military funerals was born.

The words are:
Day is done.
Gone the sun.
From the lakes.
From the hills.
From the sky.
All is well.
Safely rest.
God is nigh.

Fading light. Dims the sight.
And a star.
Gems the sky.
Gleaming bright.
From afar.
Drawing nigh.


Falls the night.
Thanks and praise.
For our days.
Neath the sun.
Neath the stars.
Neath the sky.
As we go.
This we know.
God is nigh.

I too have felt the chills while listening to "Taps" but I have never seen all the words to the song until now. I didn't even know there was more than one verse. I also never knew the story behind the song and I didn't know if you had either so I thought I'd pass it along. I now have an even deeper respect for the song than I did before. Remember Those Lost and Harmed While Serving Their Country. Also Remember Those Who Have Served And Returned; and for those presently serving in the Armed Forces.

I hope we'll all pause and think about this on November 11th.

## Dear Concerned,

The simple answer is that it doesn't. Of course, the simple answer assumes that we at Aldersgate continue to make our monthly payments on time and that you hold your bonds until they are due. That's the beauty of borrowing from ourselves and other churchgoers around the country who have faith in God's provision and in our determination to pay the money back.

If you watch the regular bond market or have money invested in the bonds of some company, you will see that the value of the bonds is not necessarily the face value that you paid for them. The value of the bonds depends on the credit-worthiness of the company you invested in and that may change over time. (Think about General Motors bonds, which strangely come to my mind right now.) If you need the money before the bond matures and try to sell it, what you will get also depends on the willingness of another person to give up their money and wait for the return. You may get less than you invested if there are few willing buyers; or you may get more, if the bond is near maturity and the investor can count on picking up a sizeable additional amount of interest in a relatively short time.

That's why Share Financial checked us out so carefully before agreeing to work with us on the bond sale. We were a relatively small church with a relatively small down payment for such a large project. You may not remember, but the president of the company flew in from Texas to meet with the Church Council to feel certain in his own mind that we had checked out all possibilities and that we knew what we were doing. Their reputation, not just ours, is at stake when they sell a bond issue. Their ability to get buyers for other church bonds is diminished if we mess up.

Now, if you need the money from your church bonds right now, you may not get full value. That would have been true even if there were no national financial credit crunch. That's why Share suggests we try first to sell the bonds within the church. The market for church bonds is limited. On the other hand, if you hold them to maturity, you'll get your money plus interest. (I'll get my money from my GM bonds, too, if I hold them until 2015 and GM is still around. Meanwhile they are paying really good interest.)

Plainly and simply, if we keep up our monthly payments, our bonds are fine. The people who invested in the shorter-term bonds are getting their checks in the mail right on time. Now the monthly payment is $\$ 17,461$-no small amount, but it is a fixed amount from here on in. To do that, we will need a third capital campaign and perhaps a fourth. (Sorry, folks, I have to bring that up-more work ahead.) Also, we have to begin to move that payment into our regular budget. If we were to double our giving for our on-going ministries, we could eliminate those campaigns! That's the amount of money coming in now-it's just in two separate categories.

The good news is that a lot of us right now are feeling pretty smart for having invested in our church bonds. In fact, we are wishing we had bought more!
