PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

We are entering the seasons of Advent and Christmas. It's the time we focus on the coming of Christ—as an infant in Bethlehem, into our hearts and lives today, and at the fulfillment of time. It's a time for receiving anew or the first time the most important gift of life in Christ. "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16) It's a time for giving giving love to God and to our neighbor.

How are we to give love to God? "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind." (Luke 10:27a) As I think about what that means, it means giving my whole life, everything I am and everything I have to the Lord in response to his great gift of salvation. It involves giving Jesus my total devotion—spending time in worship and prayer both personally and corporately. It involves giving my mind over to study God's word, to think about

its meaning and apply it in my life. It involves giving Jesus my strength in the form of service.

How are we to love our neighbors? "Love your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:27b) We are to give love to others as we give love to ourselves and our loved ones. Each Christmas I think about Mike Slaughter, pastor of a large United Methodist Church in Ohio. He and his family decided years ago to give away as much at Christmas as they spent on themselves. He is now encouraging the church to do the same. The last several Christmases they have taken a "miracle offering." They've used the money to make very real differences in Darfur.

As I think about giving this year, I'm thinking about giving time and resources to our mission trip to New Orleans, Feb. 14-22. We'll be driving to New Orleans on Feb. 14-15. We'll work for 5 days then drive back on the weekend. The trip should cost about \$350 each. There will be things for all levels of skill

including office help as well as home rehab. Youth 14 and older can go when accompanied by an adult. I am hoping several of you will join me in this as part of your gift to Jesus this Christmas. Let me know if you need more information or want to go. We'd like to have the team in place by the end of the year.

We are always giving ourselves to/for something. The question is it the right/best thing? Giving love to God and neighbor in concrete ways is the best and most fulfilling. Choose this Christmas to live beyond yourself.

Have a blessed and joy filled Advent and Christmas.

FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

Dear Aldersgate Family:

A little story that I found recently spoke to me and I hope it speaks to you as we begin our Christmas preparation in these uncertain times. It is called:

A Crushed Spirit

A man's spirit sustains him in sickness, but a crushed spirit who can bear?

Proverbs 18:14

During World War II a woman took her two little children to visit her parents in Texas because her husband was stationed in Europe. As they got ready for Christmas—setting the tree up, putting the presents out, and preparing dinnerthey were experiencing the joy of Christmas, almost forgetting the

worry of war. But no sooner had the fun begun, than the family heard a dreaded knock on the door and received a terrible telegram greeting.

The young mother had to tell her children that Daddy wouldn't be coming home for Christmas...ever. And then she went up to her room to weep alone. Her parents debated and finally decided to take down the Christmas decorations and put the presents away. When the young lady came downstairs, she immediately saw the empty spot. She exclaimed, "Mother, what have you done?" Her mother replied, "You're so broken-hearted, so your father and I decided this is not the time for Christmas." The new widow said, "Oh no, mother, bring it all back, Christmas was made for times such as these."

Many people have overwhelming problems which make it hard to get excited about the holidays whether they be financial difficulties, physical ailments, loneliness, or emotional pain from the loss of a loved one. Christmas is certainly not about the presents, lights, and decorations, but it is surely a time when we can lean on the goodness of God and rejoice in Christ's birth.



CHRISTMAS OFFERING HELPS HABITAT & GATE-WAY-LONGVIEW

This year's Christmas Offering will be used to support Greece **Churches Habitat for Humanity** and Gateway-Longview. Even though plans for a new project are on temporary hold due to the illness of the wife of the Chair of the project, Bill Mason of Greece United Methodist Church, fundraising for the next house continues and the funds needed are growing. Recent news articles have highlighted housing needs in the city and Habitat is currently building in the most needy Jay -Orchard Street area. (We don't know that's where we would be assigned; however, there are plans for on-going development there.) The more money raised up front the more quickly building can proceed.

The annual sale of pies from Kelly's Farms brought orders for 24 pies from Aldersgate. The profit

This year Election Day Sale of Baked Goods and Crafts was indeed the biggest ever. Those who visit the facilities near Buffalo are impressed with the variety of services offered and the loving care with which they are given. We can be thankful that our United Methodist Church is able to respond to the needs of children and families in Western New York with skilled staff, well-equipped facilities

and Christian love.

The Missions Committee is charged each year with the responsibility of selecting the beneficiaries of the Christmas Offering.

RESULTS OF 2008 AUCTION PLEASES EVERYONE

The first surprise was the number of people who came to this annual November event. In setting up, we thought that 128 places allowed ample flexibility for families to sit together and a possible "walk-in" or so. As nearly as we can tell, at least 134 showed up for dinner and we had to set up an extra table. Some saw it in the newspaper and others heard about it on television. Some arrived even after the auction started—and made successful bids! For the first time ever, we had to start the auction late!

With all late receipts and expenses accounted for, the auction and dinner netted \$2,721.00 for Aldersgate and \$264.50 for Lake United Methodist Church, an outstanding response, especially considering that we continue to be told that people aren't buying anything! We know—it's for a good cause!

The Aldersgate money will be divided three ways: one-third for the Trustees to use for the purchase of equipment they need for the maintenance of the church facilities, one-third for the building planned at Cookson Hills to replace a number of decrepit facilities currently used, and one-third for the February Katrina Relief Mission Trip.

Our thanks go to all those who helped. Most of all we are grateful to Marilyn Sobus, Al & Myrt Holmes, Shirley Grierson, and Walt Dunn for their work in the kitchen, which became somewhat more complicated by the additional influx of diners (not that anyone is complaining)!

SALLY STEWARDSHIP

Dear Sally Stewardship,

Is it possible to get a tax break by donating directly from my IRA to the church like I did last year? I want to help, but I need all the tax breaks I can get!

Planning Ahead

Dear Planning Ahead,

Good news! When you asked a month ago, the answer was, "No." That tax benefit was just for 2006 and 2007. However, the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 (the much-publicized "bail-out" bill) put that benefit back in place for tax years 2008 and 2009. You can again make a tax-free contribution from your IRA to the church—or another qualified charity.

The same qualifications apply:

- You must be 70 1/2 years of age or older.
- The transfer cannot go through you. You must wire it or have your IRA administrator cut a check directly to Aldersgate United Methodist Church.
- It must be an outright gift and it will count toward your minimum annual distribution.
- The gift is tax-free, but it does not qualify for an additional tax deduction.
- The maximum amount you may give under this provision each year is \$100.000.

The transfer must be completed before December 31 each year.

It is important that you consult your own financial planner and/or tax accountant to be sure of your qualifications and benefits. Don't wait until the last minute. Everything takes more time than you think it should.
