Holy Week is the most important week in the Christian year. It begins (this year on April 5) with the celebration of Palm/Passion Sunday. We will celebrate with a Palm Parade and a drama called "Trilogy" to help us experience the power of Jesus suffering and death. Tuesday, the United Methodist Women will celebrate "A Meal in the Upper Room" at 6:30 PM. On Maundy Thursday evening at 7 PM (April 9) we will spend time with Jesus in the Upper Room as he shares the Last Supper with his disciples and join together in the Holy Communion. Our chancel choir and bell choir will have a part in leading us in worship that night. On April 10, Good Friday, the Chapel will be open from 9 AM to 6 PM. Please stop in for some quiet time with Jesus in the



garden for prayer. Good Friday worship will be held in the sanctuary at 7 PM. The week will culminate with the joyful celebration of Easter during our two morning worship services. You won't want to miss these special services!


Why do I say Holy Week is the most important week in the Christian year? It's because during this week we focus on the most central beliefs of the Christian faith. At the heart of our faith is the knowledge that "God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Rom. 5:8, TNIV) What incredible love God has for each of us that God would come to us in Jesus Christ and suffer and die so that we might be forgiven and reconciled with God. Yet, that's not the end of it. Sunday comes after Friday. "For if we were God's enemies, we were reconciled to him through the death of his Son, how much more, having been rec-

onciled, shall we be saved through his life!" (Rom. 5:10) On the third day, Jesus rose from death making it possible for us to live anew in him! Jesus' death and resurrection make all the difference to those, who by the power of the Holy Spirit, simply believe it's true. May God bless you with faith in the power of the cross and new life in the Risen Christ!



FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

Dear Aldersgate Friends:

As you receive this copy of the *Hinge* we'll be about ready to observe Holy Week and celebrate again the glorious Resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday. I hope the Lenten days have been enriching to each of you.

As we come to celebrate Easter again, I want to share with an interesting article that Zuni Simons sent me. It is entitled

Why Did Jesus Fold the Napkin?


Why did Jesus fold the linen burial cloth after His resurrection? The gospel of John (20:7) tells us that the napkin, which was placed over the face of Jesus, was not just thrown aside like the grave clothes. The Bible takes an entire verse to tell us that the napkin was neatly folded, and was placed at the head of that stony coffin.

Early Sunday morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and found that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance. She ran and found Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved. She said, "They have taken the Lord's body out of the tomb, and I don't know where they have put him!" Peter and the other disciple ran to the tomb to see.

The other disciple outran Peter and got there first. He stooped and looked in and saw the linen cloth lying there, but he didn't go in. Then Simon Peter arrived and went inside. He also noticed the linen wrapping lying there, while the cloth that had covered Jesus' head was folded up and lying to the side.

Is that important? Absolutely! It is really significant? Yes! In order to understand the significance of the folded napkin, you have to understand a little bit about Hebrew tradition of that day. The folded napkin had to do with the Master and Servant, and every Jewish boy knew this tradition.

When the servant set the dinner table for the master, he made sure that it was exactly the way the master wanted it. The table was furnished perfectly, and then the servant would wait, just out of sight, until the master had finished eating, and the servant would not dare touch that table, until the master was finished.



Now if the master were done eating, he would rise from table, wipe his fingers, his mouth, and clean his beard, and would wad up that napkin and toss it onto the

table. The servant would then know to clear the table. For in those days, the wadded napkin meant, "I'm done". But, if the master got up from the table, and folded his napkin, and laid it beside his plate, the servant would not dare touch the table, because....

The folded napkin meant, "I'm coming back!" He did come back to life that first Easter and he is Coming Back Again!

Let's rejoice in this great truth again this Easter! We hope you and yours will join us in the Easter worship services.






or leave it with Candy Metzger in the office—before the breakfast, if you are unable to attend so that your prayer partner is not left out of the festivities.

DEAR SALLY STEWARDSHIP

Dear Sally Stewardship,

All this news about economic collapse has me near collapse! Right now I have a job but who knows how long that will last? My retirement savings are disappearing. What should I do?

Worried Sick

Dear Worried,

First a disclaimer—I’m not a financial expert and couldn’t begin to address your personal situation. However, as Christians we do have some resources. Now a reminder—God knows that we are going to encounter circumstances like these during our lives. That’s why Jesus preached in the Sermon on the Mount, “Do not store up riches for yourselves here on earth, where moths and rust destroy . . .” (Matt. 6:19) The point is not that we shouldn’t save and prepare for the future but that realistically we can’t count entirely on our own efforts to supply all our needs. Things do go wrong—often things outside our control. But a few words later, Jesus also reminded us to “Look at the birds: they do not plant seeds, gather a harvest and put it in barns; yet your Father in heaven takes care of them! Aren’t you worth much more than birds? Can any of you live a bit longer by worrying about it?” (Matt. 6:26-27)

We need to give up our worries to a God who cares for us and regards us as valuable and worthy of His care. Don’t beat yourself up too much if your response is, “Duh, I know that. I’m still worried.” Remember that one of the running themes in the whole Old Testament is the story of the Israelites forgetting how much God had done for them,

complaining, and looking to other Gods when they thought they didn’t get a quick enough response—or the response they wanted. Take action. Make your concerns a matter of serious prayer. Connect with God and be open to the possibility of a variety of answers. Rather than news of a major inheritance from a long-lost uncle, the response may be learning to trust His provision for you and to live with some level of ambiguity. In any case, if we are not consumed by anxiety, we are better able to work through the problems we may—or may not—encounter.

John Wesley also had some apt financial advice for us: Earn all you can, save all you can, and give all you can. His example may be a bit hard to follow, and we are clearly not all called to either his life or lifestyle. One of the reasons that we have so many of his thoughts in writing was that he published his sermons, journals, etc. and sold them as a source of income for his ministry. He wrote wherever he was, including on horseback. He established early in his career that he could live on just a little more than five pounds a year and set that as a limit for his expenses for the rest of his life. (His wife had an independent income.) He saved the remainder and gave it all to the many ministries he started. In spite of the fact that he never would have been considered a wealthy man, his giving over his lifetime made him one of the major philanthropists of his era.

YOUR SPECIAL GIFT AT EASTER SUPPORTS MISSION- ARY MERI WHITAKER

The ministry and related services are growing at **Cookson Hills Center** in Eastern Oklahoma, but the need is growing even faster. The new Daycare and Senior Center opened two years ago; a Health Resource Center opened last year; and now on the drawing boards is a plan for a new building to house their reception center, food shelf and clothing closet. None of the buildings are pretentious—just neat, attractive, and serviceable.

This United Methodist ministry to the people in one of the neediest counties in the country serves primarily Cherokee Indians. The Director of the mission is **Meri Whitaker, our covenant missionary**, who coordinates the services, works to develop local businesses to help people to support themselves, and pastors a Twelve-Step Church. Those of us who have heard her speak when she has visited our church continue to be impressed with her commitment to reaching out to meet the spiritual, physical, and emotional needs of the people with whom she has been called to work.

The Easter Offering is one of the primary sources for meeting our annual commitment of \$2500 to support our covenant relationship with Rev. Whitaker. Please be generous both with your prayers and with your money for this most important relationship. Put your special gift in the Easter Offering envelopes provided with your packet of church envelopes, or mark "*Easter Offering*" on your check or pew envelope.

GREECE HABITAT NEWS

Please remember to return your Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity coin boxes (preferably filled) to church on the **Sunday after Easter, April 19**. Individually the money in the coin boxes will not seem like much—and we're not even likely to miss it—yet the total can make a significant dent in our goal of raising \$6500 for this new building project scheduled to start this summer.

The Greece group is hoping to participate in an **Earth Day Recycling** program for outdated electronic appliances on **April 18** that is being planned and sponsored by Flower City Habitat for Humanity. Watch the bulletin for details on location and a list of items that can be recycled.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE EXPLORES ANGEL FOOD MINISTRIES

Angel Food Ministries is a non-profit, non-denominational food program dedicated to providing food assistance to families throughout the United States. Started in 1994 by a pastor and his wife in rural northeast Georgia to help their neighbors, the ministry has expanded into 35 states and helps nearly 500,000 families each month. Every month the agency creates a box of fresh and frozen foods valued at about \$60.00, which they can sell for \$30.00 because their buying power, low overhead and non-profit status. One box assists in feeding a family of four for about a week or a single person for almost a month. There is no limit on the number of boxes a family can purchase and no screening for financial need. Webster United Methodist Church has been participating in this

program for more than a year, and Hope Lutheran Church is the distributor closest to us.


Members of the Missions Committee have been meeting with a group at Our Lady of Mercy to consider setting up a host site in the Northgate community. Several also volunteered at Hope Lutheran on the March 21 distribution day there to find out how the program worked. We would have to begin by ordering through Hope Lutheran until we have established a pattern of enough orders to open our own center. More information will be shared with the congregation as our plans develop.

APRIL 26 IS NATIVE AMERICAN MINISTRIES SUNDAY

United Methodists remember our Native American Ministries each year with a special offering. The Western New York Conference retains half the offering to support those ministries in our area since we are home to several reservations. The rest provides scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist and other approved schools.

We can't live on five pounds a year or even its modern equivalent, but we can examine the way we spend our money. Old guidelines for budgeting call for taking 10 % off the top to give to the church. We can't out give God, but we can put God first. The second 10% should go to savings—called “paying ourselves.” With the rest we should look for ways to maintain our lifestyle with less money (as a Jazz 90.1 DJ recently put it during a recent fund drive). Some of us may find that we have more to give; others will have to work toward those goals for tithing and saving. At no point does the Bible suggest that we are exempt from giving because we are feeling poor or that our giving should stop at 10%. We also should not turn our noses up at ways to earn more money. Even small amounts from short-term jobs can help to cover essentials or allow us to give more.

One last thought: Don't ever think of yourself as alone in these concerns. That's why we seek to live as a Christian community. Share your concerns and let others pray with you. Your openness can help others with the same worries.

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

For February 12, 2009 Meeting

This meeting featured a brief overview of year-end committee reports for 2008. Committee representatives highlighted top accomplishments or challenges they faced during the past year. Some offered a brief comment on the direction their committee work is heading in 2009. Written reports from each committee will be compiled into a complete document that will be available for reading by any church member.

Other agenda items were also addressed during the meeting. The first was a comment that the Nominations Committee is actively pursuing candidates to fill vacant leadership positions on various committees. More volunteers are needed.

The next topic discussed was a motion from the Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) regarding vacation time for some of the paid positions within the church. Two parts of the motion passed unanimously:

That the church Administrative Assistant receive forty-eight (48) hours of paid time off per year.


That the Christian Education Director receive six (6) paid vacation days per year, also forty-eight hours, of which not more than four (4) can be Sundays.

There was also discussion regarding clarification of the time off for the Choir Director and Organist positions, which needs further discussion. The goal is to add individual time off changes to each position's respective job description.

Finally, Gretchen Hughes introduced a motion requesting Council approve a fund raising goal of \$6,500 toward the Greece churches Habitat for Humanity project. There are currently six churches involved and they hope to get a few more to join their efforts. The amount represents 10% of the cost to build a new house on Whitney Street (off Jay Street). The motion was approved unanimously, and the first fundraiser is in the form of paper, house-shaped boxes in which to collect coins. The boxes were handed out at church and will be collected on Sunday, April 19.

New Orleans Mission Trip Highlights



Again, I want to thank all of you for your prayer and financial support of our mission trip to New Orleans in February 2009. Rich Keller, Candy and John Metzger, Laurie Ru-

ell, Colleen Tyler, and I were privileged to work with others from our District to help three different homeowners left destitute by Hurricane Katrina. There is still much work to be done, so we are planning another trip for next February. Why not prayerfully start considering your participation and set aside the time now?

Three of us (Candy, John, and Colleen) worked on Kate's house. Kate worked right along side the team all week. She was so grateful for the help that each day she brought goodies and loved showing off her city in the evenings when the work was done for the day. The primary work there was mudding, sanding, and priming drywall. Three of us (Laurie, Rich, and I) worked on another team. Four of the five days we all worked was on a home whose owner was staying in New Mexico, so we were unable to meet her. We also did some dry wall finishing and painting, laid tiles, and put up baseboards. This homeowner should be able to move back to

New Orleans very soon. One day some of us from the second team (including Rich and I) helped at Janice's home. There we did demolition work—removing drywall, ruined cabinets, and floor tile. She was thrilled that work was finally beginning.

We talked with many people and all of them had stories to tell. Janice's mother was buried the day before Katrina hit. She left town immediately and got out safely, but her daughter-in-law refused to leave with her two children. For a few days Janice had no idea what happened to her daughter-in-law and grandchildren. Then one day on CNN she saw her grandson being rescued off a roof by a helicopter. She knows that was God's way of letting her know her family was okay. At a Marti Gras parade, we talked with a policeman who had spent three weeks sleeping in his car after the disaster so he could be on duty. We talked with a man on the ferry who had been rescued from his roof by boat and then spent four days living on a bridge until he was rescued from there.

We know God used us in many ways to proclaim the Good News of his love during our five days there and on our four travel days. It is a wonderful feeling to know God has touched the homeowners, their neighbors, and others we talked with his love through our work and words. I hope you'll join us on our next mission adventure.
