

FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

Dear Aldersgate Friends and Family:

As we come to the month of May, we celebrate many good things such as: lovely weather, spring flowers, Mother's Day, graduation etc. Then we end the month with Memorial Day—which too often is just another holiday. I do hope that you will pause with me and think about the real meaning of May 30th. This is well demonstrated by a true story entitled:

SIX BOYS AND THIRTEEN HANDS

Each year I am hired to go to Washington, DC, with the eighth grade class from Clinton, WI where I grew up, to videotape their trip. I greatly enjoy visiting our nation's capitol, and each year I take some special memories back with me. This fall's trip was especially memorable.

On the last night of our trip, we stopped at the Iwo Jima memorial. This memorial is the largest bronze statue in the world and depicts one of the most famous photographs in history—that of the six brave soldiers raising the American flag at the top of a rocky hill on the island of Iwo Jima, during WW II. Over 100 students and chaperones piled off the buses and headed towards the memorial. I noticed a solitary figure at the base of the statue, and as I got closer he asked, "Where are you guys from?" I told him that we were from Wisconsin, "Hey, I'm a cheese head, too! Come gather around, Cheese heads, and I will tell you a story."

(James Bradley just happened to be in Washington, DC to speak at the memorial the following day. He was there that night to say good night to his Dad, who had passed away. He was just about to leave when he saw the buses pull up. I videotaped him as he spoke to us, and received his permission to share what he said from my videotape. It is one thing to tour the incredible monuments filled with history in Washington, DC, but it is quite another to get the kind of insight we received that night.)

When all had gathered around he reverently began to speak. Here are his words that night. "My name is James Bradley and I'm from Antigo, Wisconsin. My Dad is on that statue, and I just wrote a book called "Flags of Our Fathers", which is #5 on the New York Times Best Seller list right now. It is the story of the six boys you see behind me. "Six boys raised the flag. The first guy putting the pole in the ground is Harlon Block. Harlon was an all-state football player. He enlisted in the Marine Corps with all the senior members of his football team. They were off to play another type of game: A game called "war". But it didn't turn out to be a game. Harlon, at the age of 21 died with his intestines in his hands. I don't say that to gross you out, I say that because there are people who stand in front of this statue and talk about the glory of war. You guys need to know that most of the boys on Iwo Jima were 17, 18, and 19 years old—and it was so hard that the ones who did make it home never even would talk to their families about it.

He pointed to the statue. "You see this next guy? That's Rene Gagnon from New Hampshire. If you took Rene's helmet off at the moment this photo was taken and looked in the webbing of that helmet, you would find a photograph...a photograph of his girlfriend. Rene put that in there for protection because he was scared. He was 18 years old. It was just boys who won the battle of Iwo Jima. Boys. Not old men. The next guy here, the third guy in this tableau, was Sergeant Mike Strank. Mike is my hero. He was the hero of all these guys. They called him the "old man" because he was so old. He was already 24. When

Mike would motivate his boys in training camp, he didn't say, "Lets go kill some Japanese" or "Let's die for our country." He knew he was talking to little boys,. Instead he would say, "You do what I say, and I'll get you home to your mothers."

"The last guy on this side of the statue is a Pima Indian from Arizona. Ira Hayes Ira Hayes was one who walked off Iwo Jima. He went into the White House with my Dad. President Truman told him, "you're a hero." He told reporters, "How can I feel like a hero when 250 of my buddies hit the island with me and only 27 of us walked off alive?" So you take your class at school, 250 of you spending a year together having fun, doing everything together. Then all 250 of you hit the beach, but only 27 of your classmates walk off alive. That was Ira Hayes. He had images of horror in his mind. Ira Hayes carried the pain home with him and eventually died dead drunk, face down at the age of 32. (Ten years after this picture was taken.).

"The next guy, going around the statue, is Franklin Sousley from Hilltop, Kentucky; a fun-lovin' hillbilly boy. His best friend, who is now 70 told me, "Yeah, you know, we took two cows up on the porch of the Hilltop General Store. Then we strung wire across the stairs so the cows couldn't get down. Then we fed them Epsom salts. Those cows crapped all night. "Yes, he was a fun-lovin' hillbilly boy. Franklin died on Iwo Jima at the age of 19. When the telegram came to tell his mother that he was dead, it went to the Hilltop General Store. A barefoot boy ran that telegram up to his mother's farm. The neighbors could hear her scream all night and into the morning. Those neighbors lived a quarter of a mile away.

"The next guy, as we continue to go around the statue, is my Dad, John Bradley from Antigo, Wisconsin,

RUMMAGE SALE COMING IN JUNE!

This year more than ever it's time to go through our attics, closets, and basements to clear away the clutter and simplify our lives. Most of us have both clothes and household items of good quality that we no longer use. Recycle them by donating to the annual Rummage Sale. They may be just the items someone else is looking for.

The rummage sale is the biggest fundraiser planned each year by our United Methodist Women. However, we could not carry it off without the help of the entire church. While it does raise money for missions and for our own church projects, it also helps

us individually to break that habit of hanging on to everything we own and serves as an outreach to the community around us by making many necessities available at a low cost.

We need **clean clothes in** good condition for men, women, and children in all sizes. It is especially helpful if the clothes are labeled for size. We sort by small, medium, large, and extra-large for men's, women's, boys' and girls' clothes. Other items that sell well include toys, games, puzzles, books, dishes, glassware, pots and pans, knickknacks, pictures, lamps, seasonal decorations, jewelry, clothing accessories, tools, sports equipment (no bowling balls!), household furnishings and small appliances. We do ask that you bring only items that are reasonably clean and appliances that are in working order.

The sale is scheduled for Thursday-Saturday, June 11, 12, & 13. For the first two days the items will be sold

individually, but there will be a bag sale on Saturday. We will sell baked goods all three days as we have in the past. You may start bringing your donations to the church on Monday, June 1. We really have no place to store them if you bring them earlier.

We will try to arrange help for you to get furniture or other large items to the church if help is needed. As useful as they are, we have found that hide-a-beds are usually heavier than we can manage. If you have questions, please feel free to call Gretchen Hughes (865-2822).

SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN MISSION

Interested in national and world affairs? Ever wonder just what the United Methodist Church is doing in mission around the world? Just like "going to school?" Every summer the WNY Conference United Methodist Women and the Conference Board of Global Ministries co-sponsor a School of Mission event. This year the school will be held on **Thursday-Saturday**, **July 23-25** at Daemen College in Amherst, NY.

The one-day sampler will be held on Saturday, July 25.

Everyone takes the Spiritual Growth study, which this year is "Food and Faith" taught by the Rev. David Lubba. Participants then choose between the area study and the social issue study. "The Beauty and Courage of Sudan" will be taught by Dr. David J. Snyder; and "Giving Our Hearts Away: Native American Survival" by Genie Banks, former WNY Conference UMW President and former President of the Women's Division.

The cost of the full session is \$185, which includes room and board. The one-day session will cost \$35.00, which includes lunch. Participants are expected to buy the appropriate study books available from the Service Center or at the School. Some scholarship money is available from the Aldersgate UMW if needed. Would you believe that **our highest Extra-Mile Giving** was last year for a total **of \$35,279!** The second highest was in 2007 for \$22,225.

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MISSIONS NEWS

MISSION SHARE OUTREACH CENTER

Perhaps you saw it in the D & C on Saturday, April 18. Maybe sometime back you picked up a brochure from the Mission Counter. If so, it will come as no surprise that Aldersgate is a supporting church for the new Mission Share Outreach Center at 10 Cedarfield Commons in Greece. We have already helped by contributing back-to-school supplies and taking families from their Christmas Hope list for our White Gifts program. Members of our Missions Committee have been attending the planning meetings for a couple of years in order to stay informed. In addition to continuing these activities, the Missions Committee has made a commitment to give \$100 a month toward the lease on the building, support of the part-time director, and other expenses. We plan to use our General Benevolence Fund while we seek other sources of income.

The new facility is open for business with a food pantry and clothing shelf that families in need will be able to access once a month. There is office space for a number of planned counseling and training services as well. For more information, check out the brochures on the Missions Counter.

FEED THE HUNGRY

A wise man once commented, "Justice is important, but supper is essential." If you read a lot on this page and in the upcoming weeks about food ministries, it is because the Missions Committee is responding to God's call to "feed the hungry."

The most immediate need now is to stock the Mission Share food pantry with staples. Each participating church was asked to hold a short drive to gather three items. Aldersgate representatives agreed to collect syrup, two-pound bags of rice, and boxes of macaroni & cheese.

the entry for you to put in your donations. We hope you will add these
three items to your grocery list right
away and bring them in to share with
our neighbors. Let's get the Mission

where I was raised. My Dad lived until 1994, but would never give interviews. When Walter Cronkite's producers or the New York Times would call, we were trained as little kids to say, "no, I'm sorry, sir, my Dad's not here. He is in Canada fishing. No, there is no phone there, sir. No, we don't know when he is coming back." My Dad never fished or even went to Canada. Usually, he was sitting there right at the table eating his Campbell's soup. But we had to tell the press that he was out fishing. He didn't want to talk to the press. You see, like Ira Hayes, my Dad didn't see himself as a hero. Everyone thinks these guys are heroes, 'cause they are in a photo and on a monument. My Dad knew better. He was a medic. John Bradley from Wisconsin was a caregiver. In Iwo Jima he probably held over 200 boys as they

died. And when boys died in Iwo

Jima, they writhed and screamed, without any medication or help with the pain.

"When I was a little boy, my third grade teacher told me that my Dad was a hero. When I went home and told my Dad that, he looked at me and said, "I want you always to remember that the heroes of Iwo Jima are the guys who

did not come back. Did NOT come back." "So that's the story about six nice young boys. Three died on Iwo Jima and three came back as national heroes. Overall, 7,000 boys died on Iwo Jima in the worst battle in the history of the Marine Corps. My voice is giving out, so I will end here. Thank you for your time."

Suddenly, the monument wasn't just a big old piece of metal with a flag sticking out of the top. It came to life before

our eyes with the heartfelt works of a son who did indeed have a father who was a hero. Maybe not a hero for the reasons most people would believe, but a hero nonetheless.

We need to remember that God

created this vast and glorious world for us to live in, freely, but also at great sacrifice.

PS One thing I learned while on tour with my 8th grade students in DC that is not mentioned here is that if you look at the statue very closely and count the number of "hands" raising the flag, there are 13. When the man who made the statue was asked why there were 13 he simply said the 13th hand was the hand of God.

May God bless all who have and are serving our country in the preservation of the great freedoms we enjoy,.

church contribute through our church rather than giving it privately. The Christmas White Gifts program at \$5043.70 was the second largest amount, and that figure does not take into account those

families who provided full support out of their own pockets rather than through the church.

Our support of Doug Hess through our Ministerial Education Support program totaled \$4655. Funds used for the Katrina Mission Trip were \$281414 and \$2115.95 was spent for the Youth Mission Trip. We met our \$2500 commitment to the support of Meri Whitaker and gave \$907 toward the capital campaign at Cookson Hills Center for a new reception building. We sent \$1000 to the support of a doctor at Ganta Hospital.

That brief list gives you some picture of the generosity and the range of missions supported by our church. To see the whole list, ask for a copy of the 2008 Annual Report.

That's not all—we again paid our Conference and District **apportion-ments of \$39,401** in full. That is the support asked of us by the Annual Conference to support the ministries of the Genesee Valley District, the WNY Conference, and the denomination.

Just a thought about the rest of your question: notice that we call all that support of various forms of outreach "Extra-Mile Giving." That's a reminder that our "First-Mile Giving" is for the support of the on-going ministries at our church. Always in the Old Testament the first tithe (10%) was for the support of the priests and the temple. "Offerings" were given in addition to the tithe. We need to apply that same principle. At church we find the primary ministries that nourish our spiritual growth—worship, Bible study, prayer, Christian fellowship. Even when our "first fruits" go there, God promises that we'll still have enough for ourselves and for every good cause.

Amazing!

These are the qualities you need, and if you have them in abundance, they will make you active and effective in your knowledge of Jesus Christ." (2 Peter 1:3-9)

What are some of the opportunities offered at Aldersgate that can help move you along in your spiritual journey?

- * Sign up and attend the membership class. This is not just for those new to the church. Many of us who are long-time members would no doubt benefit from a review of what it means to be a member. Pastor Anne has a new class starting on May 6.
- * Attend Sunday School. An adult class meets during

 When you find one you like, you can probably find it on Amazon or at a local bookstore. The good ones stay in print for years.
- * Check the bulletin and Hinge for upcoming mission projects and social events. Sign up and attend. These offer the opportunity for both service and fellowship and most can be "first serve" opportunities. You will become better acquainted with others in the church; yet, if you find you don't have an aptitude for that particular project, move on to another one. Learning what we aren't good at can be as important as learning what we can do. Sometimes God surprises us. After all, he does promise to equip us for the tasks to which he calls us.

This is just a start on a life-long journey. The joy of being part of a church is that we can move along the path together.
