FROM YOUR PASTOR...

Inside this issue:

November is a time of taking stock. On All Saint's Day, we remember those who have gone before us and give thanks for their part in making it possible for us to be a part of the Aldersgate Church today.

On November 8, we'll reflect on our service to Christ. There will be a mission fair and potluck meal following the 11 AM worship service. We will be kicking off the "90 in 90" challenge. Everyone in the congregation will be encouraged to give 90 minutes in joyful service in our community over the next 90 days (that's 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours over three months). We all should be able to do that. Be sure to tell me about your experience.

Later in the month, we'll take time to count our blessings and give thanks to God for the multitude of blessings we have received. This year several churches are gathering for a Thanksgiving service that will be held on Monday, Nov. 23 at 7 PM at Bethany Presbyterian Church, on Dewey Avenue near Maiden Lane. I hope you'll join us for this special time of worship and giving thanks.

November 29 marks the beginning of the Christian year and Advent. Advent means "coming." As Christians we prepare for the celebration of the coming of Christ to a stable in Bethlehem, the coming of Christ in our lives today, and the coming of Christ in final victory at the end of time.

In our society, much of the preparation is not so much about the coming of Christ as it is for a day of self-indulgence. I've already (in mid-October) been in stores where the Christmas decorations have been brought out. People have already started buying gifts or will do so soon. So I'd like to offer some thoughts on gift giving.

There is nothing wrong with giving gifts to our family and friends at Christmas as long as we do so in the spirit of Christ and don't go overboard. Michael Slaughter writes, "I often say that Christmas is not our birthday; it is Jesus' birthday. We should stop acting as if it's our birthday. We should do what honors Jesus on Jesus' birthday. Yet most Christians tend to miss the real meaning of Christmas and continue its celebration through self-focused practices that fulfill the materialistic desires of friends and family." We need to focus on the real meaning for Christmas.

Never go into debt or further into debt to pay for Christmas gifts. Consider giving things of lasting value--maybe something you've made, or a promise of future service. My dad has pretty much everything he needs, so for the last several years our Christmas gift to him has been a donation in his honor to a charity that he values.

Consider purchasing gifts from a "Fair Trade" organization. Trade As One says, "One billion people live on less than one dollar a day. If every churchgoer in America purchased just one Fair Trade gift this Christmas, one million families would be lifted out of poverty for one whole year. Our gift giving can literally be life giving for someone living in extreme poverty. These gifts can be purchased at several web sites. A couple of these are www.tradeasone.com; and <a h



FROM THE PASTOR OF VISITATION AND MEMBERSHIP CARE

Dear Aldersgate Family,

Can it be November already? The month to celebrate Veteran's Day and Thanksgiving? The year 2009 is almost history. What can I share with you that would be appropriate? I think that a story I received recently reflects both our appreciation of our servicemen and servicewomen, as well as our need to express thanksgiving It is titled:

The Sack Lunches

I put my carry-on in the luggage compartment and sat down in my assigned seat. It was going to be a long flight. "I'm glad that I have a good book to read. Perhaps I will get a short nap," I thought. Just before take-off, a line of soldiers came down the aisle and filled all the vacant seats, totally surrounding me. I decided to start a conversation. "Where are you headed?" I asked the soldier seated nearest to me. "Petawawa. We'll be there for two weeks for special training, and then we're being deployed to Afghanistan."

After flying for about an hour, an announcement was made that sack lunches were available for five dollars. It would be several hours before we reached the east, and I quickly decided a lunch would help pass the time. As I reached for my wallet, I overheard a soldier ask his buddy if he planned to buy lunch. "No, that seems like a lot of money for just a sack lunch. Probably wouldn't be worth five bucks. I'll wait till we get to base". His friend agreed. I looked around at the other soldiers. None were buying lunch. I walked to the back of the plan and handed the flight attendant a fifty dollar bill. "Take a lunch to all those soldiers." She

grabbed my arms and squeezed tightly. Her eyes wet with tears, she thanked me. "My son was a solider in Iraq; it's almost like you are doing it for him."

Picking up ten sacks, she headed up the aisle to where the soldiers were seated. She stopped at my seat and asked, "Which do you like best, beef or chicken? "Chicken" I replied, wondering why she asked. She turned and went to the front of the plane, returning a minute later with a dinner plate from first class. "This is your thanks." After we finished eating, I went again to the back of the plane, heading for the rest room. A man stopped me. "I saw what you did. I want to be part of it. Here, take this." He handed me twentyfive dollars.

Soon after I returned to my seat, I saw the Flight Captain coming down the aisle, looking at the aisle numbers as he walked, I hoped he was not looking for me, but noticed he was looking at the numbers only on my side of the plane. When he got to my row he stopped, smiled, held out his hand, and said, "I want to shake your hand."

Quickly unfastening my seatbelt I stood and took the Captain's hand. With a booming voice, he said, "I was a soldier and I was a military pilot. Once, someone bought me a lunch. It was an act of kindness I never forgot." I was embarrassed when applause was heard from all of the passengers.

Later I walked to the front of the plane so I could stretch my legs. A man who was seated about six rows in front of me reached out his hand, wanting to shake mine. He left another twenty-five dollars in my palm.

When we landed I gathered my

belongings and started to deplane. Waiting just inside the airplane door was a man who stopped me, put something in my shirt pocket, turned, and walked away without saying a word. Another twenty-five dollars!

Upon entering the terminal, I saw the soldiers gathering for their trip to the base. I walked over to them and handed them seventy-five dollars. "It will take you some time to reach the base. It will be about time for a sandwich. God Bless You."

Ten young men left that flight feeling the love and respect of their fellow travelers. As I walked briskly to my car, I whispered a prayer for their safe return.

These soldiers were giving their all for our country. I could only give them a couple of meals.

It seemed so little...A veteran

is someone who, at one point in his life, wrote a blank check made payable to the United State of America for an amount of up to and including my life. That is Honor, and there are way too many people in this country who no longer understand it.

May God give you the strength and courage to say "thank you" to all who have made a significant contribution to your life, especially to those who serve in the military.

HOME DEVOTIONS FOR ADVENT

Beginning November 29, the season of Advent invites us to take time away from the hustle and bustle of our daily lives. As is the tradition at Aldersgate, we will again provide booklets of home devotions which will offer you the opportunity to spend some time reflecting on and preparing for Christ's coming among us.

For families, we have chosen *Wait for the Light*. As we Christians wait not only for Christmas but for the coming of the Lord, we gain much from the examples of biblical and even some contemporary figures. Author Anne Neuberger tells stories in a way that children and adults can both appreciate. Her suggestions for discussion also offer families an opportunity to explore their own reactions and ideas to stories of faith, courage and hope in difficult times. Each devotion ends with a prayer and a familiar seasonal song.

For older youth and adults *A Grand Miracle: Advent Devotions based on the thoughts of C. S. Lewis* has been chosen. Let C. S. Lewis, one of the greatest Christian apologists of the 20th century, lead you through Advent. C. S. Lewis scholar Dr. Joel Heck's thoughtful daily devotions based on C. S. Lewis quotations explore the "Grand Miracle" – God's coming in human flesh. The themes each week are the Incarnation, Immanuel (God-with-us), the Christ-Figure in Narnia, and Jesus' mission to make us his "new creation." Each devotion concludes with a prayer and a Scripture verse tied intimately to the day's thought.

These booklets will be available later in November on the Mission's table in the Gathering Space. Be sure to pick one up!

Get involved with the White Gifts program and help purchase gifts and food for those in need. This is a long running important ministry at Aldersgate.

Pray about giving a special financial gift to missions. Five years ago, Michael Slaughter (who reminded us that it's Jesus' birthday not ours) challenged the Ginghamsberg United Methodist Church congregation, to make a miracle offering for missions on Christmas. He suggested that each family bring as an offering an amount to equal to what they spent on their family and friends. Many did that and have continued to do so each year. They have raised several million dollars and built an amazing ministry in Darfur in the Sudan. They have built over 160 schools that, in addition to teaching both boys and girls, provide children with one meal a day all year. For half the year that's likely to be the only meal they receive. This mission has built wells in the communities so children don't have to travel miles in unsafe areas to draw water for their families. They have helped thousands of farmers build new lives for themselves and their families by a sustainable agriculture program. It's truly amazing what one congregation can do when they devote themselves to serving Christ.

We are blessed to be a blessing. Let's bless others with our time and our gifts this year.

SUCCESSFUL CRAFT SHOW

Thanks to all of you who helped, our 2009 Crafts & Collectibles Show & Sale was successful in many ways. After expenses for supplies and advertising, our **net proceeds were \$1,554.67**. Half of this money will be used by the Missions Committee to complete our Global Missions Partners commitment to support of Meri Whitaker, our missionary in Oklahoma, and of the doctor at Ganta Hospital in Liberia. The other half will be used by the UMW for their end-of-year missions giving, which usually includes substantial gifts for programs like the White Gifts Program, the Greece Food Shelf, and Cameron Community Ministries.

We increased the number of vendors this year, filling the Ide Center both days and adding eight spaces on Saturday in the Gathering Space. While not all the vendors did well in sales, they were happy with our arrangements and nearly all indicated a desire to return. Most felt that the current economic climate was largely responsible for the reduced sales.

We appreciated that more of you came to view the displays. It is very important to the vendors that our own church members come to support this effort. (They actually can tell.)

We have already set the date for **next year**: Friday and Saturday, **October 15 & 16, 2010**. Mark this on your calendar now and plan to participate in some way with this project.

UMCOR KITS DELIVERED

A record number of kits for the United Methodist Com-

mittee on Relief were assembled at the September 24 UMW meeting and delivered to Mission Central in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania, by Floyd & Gretchen Hughes

the following week. With the supplies gathered over the summer, 161 School Bags were filled and 156 Health Kits were put together (half again as many as we have been able to do in prior years.) In addition, the UMW sent a

check for \$500 to Mission Central to help defray the costs of adding toothpaste to the Health Kits and of transporting the kits to the locations where they will ultimately be distributed.

We never know just where "our" kits go. The warehouse at Mission Central responds primarily to disasters in the Northeastern United States, including Puerto Rico, but it ships containers of supplies all over the world. Recently they sent a full container to Nicaragua.

On one Monday morning in mid-August, Eric De-Walt, the Executive Director, checked his voice mail from the weekend to learn that a major flood had hit Gowanda and Silver Creek in Western New York. A few minutes later he had a phone call from Rev. Carl Chamberlain, our conference coordinator for disaster relief, saying that a large truck would arrive around 10 AM to pick up 900 flood buckets and as many health kits as they could get in the truck. Eric is the only full-time employee at Mission Central and the two half-time employees were not due in. However, volunteers that were supposed to come on Thursday got their dates mixed up and came that Monday, bringing fifteen people rather than the six expected. The truck got there on time, and they were able to fill it up and send it on its way back by 10:45. That's just one of the "miracle" stories Eric has to tell.

School supplies are often sent to United Methodist missions overseas, but they are also given out after disasters to children who have lost their homes and all their belongings—as after Katrina and other hurricanes in the south, or used by inner-city or rural ministries in the U. S. in their work with children.

While we focus on this effort primarily in the summer, Mission Central is a year-round ministry to people in need. Please keep it in your prayers and feel free to visit if you get near the area. You will find it a rewarding use of your time.

"THREE CUPS OF TEA" IS THE SELECTION FOR READING CIRCLE



Since the program was established, we have given three scholarships. DEAR SALLY STEWARDSHIP

Dear Sally Stewardship,

Every once in a while someone at church says something about "apportionments." What does that mean? I found "apportion" in the dictionary, but not apportionments."

I Don't Know If This Is Really Important

Dear I Don't Know,

Oh, it's important all right; and this is a good time to ask since we are close to preparing the budget for our church ministries for the coming year. My dictionary says that "apportion" means "to divide and assign proportionally; allot."

"Apportionments" is a Methodist term. (Apparently there aren't quite enough of us for the word to make it into the dictionary.) The United Methodist Church is a connectional organization. Unlike the many independent churches, when we join a local UM church, we are also joining a larger group. To quote from a short article on United Methodist giving in—of all places—the official church program calendar, "The United Methodist Church believes in joining hands across our connected congregations to help all of God's children wherever and whenever we can.... Our ministries are numerous and varied; and because we are a connectional church, we can do more together than any one congregation can do alone. Our money accomplishes great things, all in the name of Jesus Christ—feeding the hungry, welcoming the stranger, clothing the poor, caring for the sick, visiting the prisoner and more."

Each year our representatives at Annual Conference—our clergy and lay members—decide on the conference program and its budget. Our share of funding that budget based on our financial strength is our apportionment. (The formula for determining financial strength is complicated, but every attempt is made to be fair. For instance, our need to pay for building new facilities is taken into account.) The Western New York Conference has tried to keep that allocation to 15% or less of the local church budget.

In recent years a clearer term like "shared ministries" has been used rather than the unusual "apportionments" to describe these funds. Among those shared ministries are the World Service Fund, which is the funding lifeline for a long list of Christian missions and ministries throughout the world. (Although we have covenant relationships with individuals, our missionaries do not have to visit churches to gather financial support before they can go to the field.) The Africa University Fund supports the young men and women who come from 22 countries in Africa for post-secondary study in many fields, developing Christian leaders on that continent. The Ministerial Education Fund helps to defray the costs of a seminary education and continuing education for our pastors. The Black College Fund supports the 11 historically Black United Methodist-related colleges whose programs have produced many of our country's leaders. The salaries, office expenses, travel, pensions, and health benefits of our 50 bishops and 19 Central Conference bishops are covered by the Episcopal Fund. Finally, we have a voice in a number of worldwide ecumenical and interreligious organizations because of the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund.

What is our share? For 2009 it is close to \$36,000. Now before you get any ideas about how we could use that money locally, keep in mind that one of our longstanding values here at Aldersgate is doing our share. We have paid our apportionments in full every year since—I think—1972. Even then we fell short by what in today's terms was only a small amount of money. One of the reasons we are able to meet our commitment each year is that we send the money as we go, forwarding to the conference each month approximately one-twelfth of the total, rather than waiting until the end of the year and hoping there'll be enough. It's very important for us as a church to model the faithfulness we expect of the members of our congregation.

How about a short, easy question sometime?
