From Your Pastor

There are several different things on my mind as I write this article.

Thanks to all who participated in the 90 in 90 Challenge, to Jane Shukitis who organized the celebration on February 14, and to those who shared their service experiences. The challenge period may be over, but our service must continue, if we are going to follow Christ each day. Remember we are servants of Christ, serving as he calls us, not volunteers doing what we want to do.

I pray you are finding our Lenten study on the "24 Hours that Changed the World" meaningful. Through March we will continue to focus on the last 24 hours of Jesus' earthly ministry. Palm/Passion Sunday (March 28) will mark the beginning of Holy Week as we celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and his death less than a week later. During Holy Week, there will be special services at 7:00 PM on Maundy Thursday (April 1) and on Good Friday (April 2). I hope you will join us for all of these services that are intended to help us fully prepare for the joyous celebration of Easter on April 4.

By now you should be aware that we are going to New Orleans April 17-25 to continue the rebuilding effort there. There will be mission trips to other places, but this is likely to be the last year we go to New Orleans, because the United Methodist Committee on Relief is running out of funds to support the work there.

It's not too late to sign up to go, but you need to do so soon. Don't' miss this great opportunity to serve. Talk to anyone who went in 2008 or 2009 and you'll discover how meaningful it was for them. Contact me *today* for more information or to sign up.

The Nominations Committee is hard at work seeking those we believe God may be calling to special service within in the church. If you are asked to serve, I encourage you to prayerfully consider if God is indeed calling you to that ministry. If you sense God may be calling you to serve in a certain area, be sure to let me know soon. "We have many parts in the one body and all these parts have different functions. In the same way, though we are many, we are one body in union with Christ, and we are all joined to each other as different parts of one body. So, we are to use our different gifts in accordance with the grace that God had given us." (Romans 12:4-6a) Many thanks to all who serve God in and through Aldersgate!



Dear Aldersgate Friends,

As we come to the month of March, we hope the worst of winter is behind us! The period of the church year known as Lent is well under way. This is the season of preparation for the celebration of our Lord's resurrection on Easter! (April 4th)

Perhaps you have felt alone and fearful as you journey through Lent. If so, you may relate to the story of:

The Legend of the Cherokee Indian

Do you know the legend of the Cherokee Indian youth's rite of passage?

His father takes him into the forest, blindfolds him and leaves him alone. He is required to sit on a stump the whole night and not remove the blindfold until the rays of the morning sun shine through it. He cannot cry out for help to anyone.

Once he survives the night, he is a

MAN.

He cannot tell the other boys of this experience because each lad must come into manhood on his own. The boy is naturally terrified. He can hear all kinds of noises. Wild beasts must surely be all around him. Maybe even some human might do him harm. The wind blew the grass and earth, and shook his stump but he sat stoically, never removing the blindfold. It would be the only way he could become a man!

Finally, after a horrific night the sun appeared and he removed his blindfold. It was then that he discovered his father sitting on the stump next to him. He had been at watch the entire night, protecting his son from harm.

We too, are never alone. Even when we don't know it, God is watch-

ing over us, sitting on the stump beside us. When trouble comes, all we have to do is reach out to Him.

Moral of the story: Just because you can't see God, doesn't mean he is not there. 'For we walk by faith, not by sight.'

This story reminds me of a sermon Tony Campolo preached titled, "It's Friday — but Sunday's Coming"! You may feel like the disciples did on Good Friday — but remember Easter Sunday is coming!!!

ANGEL FOOD MINISTRIES OFF TO A GREAT START

Angel Food Ministries at Aldersgate served 13 individuals and families in January and nearly doubled that number in February, according to a report to the Missions Committee by **Mary Sims**, chair of the program. Participating in this program is an outreach to our community, but it is intended to benefit members of our congregation as well. There are no maximum income requirements. That sort of information is not collected. You only need to be someone who eats, which covers us all.

What do you get? For \$30, the Signature box includes a variety of nutritious, restaurant grade food, enough to feed a family of four for one week. The

same items purchased at a local grocery would cost between \$50-\$60. The Senior Box includes ready-to-eat meals in smaller portions for \$28.00. There is a new menu each month. You can get more information at Angelfoodministries.com.

Menus are available in a notebook pocket posted on the Opportunities Board. Your order must be in by Tuesday, March 16, and you need to pay for the food when you order. Pick up is on the third Saturday of the month, this month March 20, from 8:30-10:30 AM in the Ide Center.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

Aldersgate will join with United Methodist congregations around the world for a special offering to underwrite the administrative costs for the United Methodist Committee on Relief. It is this offering on **March 14** that makes it possible for them to promise that all other gifts to UMCOR projects go to those projects in full. No part is needed to cover home office expenses. The core work of UMCOR—responding to disasters like the recent earthquake in Haiti, fighting hunger, alleviating poverty, providing relief supplies around the world, and offering hospitality to immigrants and refugees—gets 100% of the money donated for those purposes.

Any funds gathered from this offering, beyond what is needed for "doing business", are directed to projects not otherwise fully funded by designated gifts. Because of your giving, UMCOR is also able to attract matching funding from other charitable organizations.

Whether it is providing shelter, food on the table, access to health care, a well or a fuel-efficient stove, your dollars are at work around the world the year round. One of the reasons that two UMCOR executives were killed during the recent earthquake was that Haiti was already on their "radar screen," and they were there to assess on-going medical needs and find ways UMCOR could help address those issues. The year-round work is made possible by your One Great Hour of Sharing gift. The \$3220 that you gave in response to the recent disaster will go specifically toward earthquake relief in Haiti. VOLUNTEER NEEDED FOR NEW HABITAT PROJECT

The Greece Coalition of Habitat for Humanity has a new source of income, a St. Pauly Textiles drop-off box located at the Greece United Methodist Church on Maiden Lane. St. Pauly will pays the sponsoring organization each month based on the pounds of clothes picked up at the site. Our responsibility is to keep the drop-off box in good order for pickup each Friday. Each church participating has been assigned one week of every six for the rest of this year. Our first week is March 20-26. The task is simple and shouldn't take much time. GOAL MET AND EXCEEDED

We were hoping to collect enough supplies to assemble 100 Health Kits for UMCOR to send to Haiti. With the short notice we were given, that seemed reasonable. On Thursday, February 11, a group of ladies, including one very young lady (aged six), in a very short time put together **145 kits!** The kits were delivered the next day to Webster United Methodist Church, where they were picked up by a WNY Conference truck for transportation to Mission Central in Mechanicsburg, PA. Thanks to our General Benevolence Fund, we were also able to send \$300 to pay for toothpaste and transportation of the kits. We are most grateful for your generosity.

It may also interest you to know that Mission Central has already shipped out a container of 20,000 health kits to Haiti and expects to get additional requests from UMCOR for both health and school kits. Keep that in mind as you think ahead to our annual summer collection of school and health supplies.

EASTER OFFERING SUPPORTS OUR MISSIONARY

The special Easter Offering on April 4 is designated for the support of our covenant missionary, **Meri Whitaker**, who is a Church and Community Worker at Cookson Hills, in Eastern Oklahoma. We have an ongoing commitment to give \$2500 each year toward her salary support and have been faithful in keeping that commitment for many years. Your gifts in the Easter Offering help to make that possible.

Church Council and Charge Conference Notes for January 21, 2010

Church Council's major item of business this month was to receive 2009 Annual Reports from all Committees and Work Areas. From those reports some items to note are:

- ONE Sunday's receipts for Haitian Relief totaled \$870.00!
- Regarding the upcoming 3rd Capital Campaign:

Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally,

I hear people talking about a third capital campaign—but when does the second one end?

Dear Confused,
