
June 20 is Father's Day. That day, our youth will lead both services. We will also be recognizing our High School and College graduates. Be there!



## Faith Factor Youth Ministry

In April seven of us went to Syracuse for the 4Word youth gathering. This is an annual gathering of youth from the four upstate New York conferences: Western, North Central, Wyoming, and Troy. We worshiped with music and heard testimonies and sermons from youth speakers. We attended workshops, speakers, and late night activities like 4Square and dancing. ## RUMMAGE SALE TIME—JUNE 10, 11 & 12

Starting **Monday, May 31**, you may **drop off** those bags of clothes and boxes of books, toys, and household items you have been saving for the Annual Rummage Sale. We do ask that you bring only items that are **clean** and appliances that are **in working order**.

The sale itself will be held on the **second weekend in June**. We are beginning and ending the sale an hour earlier this year than we have in previous years: Thursday and Friday from 8:00 AM – 6:00 PM and Saturday (the Bag Sale) from 8:00 AM – Noon.



Please **bring your donations no later than noon on Wednesday, June 9**. We would like to be finished with set-up for the sale by the end of the afternoon that day so that all the workers can get a good night's rest before the sale begins.

We will need your help with sorting and pricing the incoming donations and with staffing each day of the sale. We'll be working every day except Sunday. Please note that on **Monday and Tuesday, June 7 & 8**, we will have **evening work hours** from 6:30 – 9:00 PM. (Go early to Applebees.)

People are needed to come in promptly at **noon on Saturday to help clean up** because Bill Webster of The Blessing Barn will be there at 1:00 PM to pick up the left-over items. We also would like to package up the clothing to take to the St. Paul's collection box at Greece UMC to benefit our next Greece Habitat project. At 3:00 a youth choir from Atlanta will be coming in to rehearse and eat in the Ide Center in preparation for their next stop.

We also need your fine baked goods. Our bake sales have become a significant "profit center" with regular customers! The sign-up sheet has space for fresh goods each day. Pies, cakes, cookies, brownies, fudge, cupcakes, breads, and home-made candy all sell well. We sell goodies like cookies and brownies packaged by the dozen, half-dozen, or pairs. We often slice larger cakes and sell them piece by piece to people who don't think they can eat a whole cake. (People don't seem to have the same problem with pies!)



A successful Rummage Sale requires help from the whole church and benefits the whole church. While it is a major fundraiser for the missions projects of the UMW, half of the proceeds are used for a local church

project. While currently undesignated, the latter funds in the recent years have been used to help fund the sound system improvements and to purchase tables, chairs, and hymnals. Get on board! The Rummage Sale is a lot of work, but it's also a lot of fun! You never know what treasure you'll find while working!

## REGISTER TO ATTEND 2010 SCHOOL OF MISSION EVENT JULY 29-31

The last Western New York School of Christian Mission Event will be held at Daemon College in Amherst Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 29-31. There will also be a **One Day Overview** for adults and a **Youth Day** (grades 7-12) on Saturday, July 31, from 8:30 AM – 4:30 PM. The study topics selected for this year are as follows:

- Spiritual Growth – For the Love of God, John's Letters,
- Geographic: The Beauty and Courage of Sudan and
- Social Issue: Joy to the World: Mission in an Age of Global Christianity.

Everyone participates in the spiritual growth study and chooses either the geographic or social issue for a second course of study.

For the full course of study for adults the registration fee is \$50 and the room and board cost is \$145 for a total of \$195. The One Day Overview, which includes lunch, is \$40; and the Youth Day is \$15.00 each or \$50 for four from the same church. **Registrations and fees are due Tuesday, July 5**. ### RED BIRD MISSION SCHOOL NEWS

The Red Bird Mission Board voted on May 13, 2010, to suspend all classes at the Red Bird School for the 2010-2011 school year in order to establish a firmer financial base and more regular flow of funds to support the expenses of the school. This last year 245 students in this remote region were served by Red Bird School. It is the hope of the Board that they will be able to re-open for the 2011-2012 school year. They are seeking new donors willing to make a long-term commitment to support the school or to sponsor students. The other ministries of the Mission will still go on—the Medical and Dental Clinic, Elderly Housing, Community Housing Improvement, Community Outreach, Craft Store, Community Store, etc..

A telephone call to Red Bird Mission verified that the mission still needs the Campbell Soup UPC's and Box Tops for Education. Their other educational activities also qualify for funding through both programs. Thanks to all of you who so carefully clip the coupons and Dick Harmer who trims and sorts them to mail in when he's here, we were able to send over **1200 Campbell's UPC's and 413 Box Tops** this year.

We will continue to collect both Campbell's UPC's and GM Box Tops for Red Bird Mission. The UMW, the Missions Committee, and some individuals have each year sent some limited funds to support the work at Red Bird School. At upcoming meetings we will be considering what further commitments we may be able to make. ## Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally,

This current Capital Campaign has me a little confused. What's the difference between giving to the Capital Campaign and giving to the Building Fund? How does our annual pledge to the church fit in?

Oh! Another question—How are we doing in paying off the principal on the mortgage?

Need to Clarify

Dear Ms./Mr. Clarify:

Good questions! I have a sneaking suspicion that you are not the only person "confused." These questions have come up several times lately.

First, let me give you the good news. (There is no bad news.) The loan that allowed us to complete our building project was for \$2,100,000. We are now 5.5 years into that 20-year loan. As of May 15, 2010, the balance on the loan was \$1,583,750. That means that **we have paid off \$516,250**, almost a quarter of the loan so far. (Remember that we had raised and paid off almost a million dollars of the cost of the building before we even sold the bonds that provided the mortgage.) We have not missed one of the \$17,461 monthly payments. This is a generous and responsible congregation.

This was our third "capital campaign" for the purpose of raising money for the Building Fund. "Capital campaigns" have that name because they are for the purpose of raising larger amounts of money specifically for major projects such as new facilities. Capital funds are in addition to the regular budget, the annual plan for covering the ongoing expenses of running an organization. Our first capital campaign was held in May 2004 and the second in May 2007. Pledges were for three years in each case. The members of our congregation have a very good track record of completing pledges we make; so almost everyone

had paid in full the pledges made in the 2007 campaign by last month.

This third campaign is for money to support the Building Fund from which we will make payments on the mortgage for the next three years. The commitment period is from June 1, 2010, to May 31, 2013.

Will we keep on holding capital campaigns every three years until the mortgage is paid off? That's up to you! Short of a *very* large gift, we may. (That's one reason there is a reminder each month in the bulletin to remember Aldersgate in your will!)

There is another way: to begin to move the mortgage payment into our regular budget—which gets to the other area of confusion. Each fall we hold an *Annual Financial Campaign* when we ask for pledges to support our on-going ministries—worship, Christian education, music, youth programs, small groups, outreach, and upkeep of our church and parsonage. That's the "Budget" category on the offering envelopes. In spite of the current economic climate, our giving to support those ministries has remained relatively steady; but it has not been growing. To move away from holding capital campaigns every three years, we need to "grow" our giving to on-going ministries at the same time we meet out capital campaign pledges—possible, but not necessarily easy to do.

It's a challenge, but it can be done. When we started, we did make a commitment not to cut back on our mission in order to pay for a building and we have not. As Pastor Anne pointed out in her sermon on May 23, we are using our new facilities for further outreach to the community around us.

God has blessed us mightily. Our prayers and our cheerful response to God's great generosity to us will lead us forward on the right path. Hoping this explanation was helpful.
