What difference does being a Christian make in your life?

We recently asked this question at Church Council. Some of the answers shared were: it relieves stress; it gives a center that's greater than me; it makes me care more about others; it gives something/someone to lean on; it is a reminder I'm not alone; it gives me purpose. There were other answers as well.

I know that being a Christian (A Christian is someone who has through the grace of God received Jesus Christ by faith as their Savior and is striving to serve Him as Lord.) has changed my life. Jesus has filled the emptiness I felt before and given me a purpose. He's forgiven me for past sins that I can leave behind and live each day more fully. 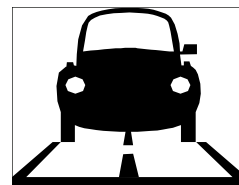

ELECTION DAY BAKE SALE SUPPORTS WORK OF MISSIONS COMMITTEE

Remember to vote on November 2—and to stop by the church (even if it's not your polling place) to purchase baked goods or Christmas crafts. Even when most of the election contests are local, we have a good sale. However, to have a good sale, we must have the goods! People come in the morning expecting to find cookies, brownies, and breads to take to work with them. Throughout the day we have “regulars” who look forward to the mouth-watering pies and cakes they find here every year.



The first call on the funds raised will be to complete our Global Missions Partner commitment to the support of a physician at Ganta Hospital in Liberia, Africa. Any remaining money will go to our General Benevolence Fund, upon which the Missions Committee draws to support other mission projects.

Sign-up sheets will be posted after the Craft Show for you to indicate your willingness to contribute both the product of your baking skills and your service in staffing the sale.

WORLD COMMUNION OFFERING PROVIDES CRUSADE SCHOLARSHIPS

Half the funds from the special offering on World Communion Sunday, **October 3**, will be used to support Crusade Scholarships for students primarily from the Asia/Pacific region, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Europe who don't normally have access to funding for graduate-level education. Students who plan to study in health-related fields, rural development, social work, teaching, theology, pastoral care, environmental studies, and agriculture are given priority. The students are expected to return to their home communities to use the skills learned for at least five years after finishing their studies. Any remaining funds are used to provide Ethnic Scholarships for undergraduates, with fifteen percent reserved to fund programs for ethnic people seeking second careers in church-related callings.

RED BIRD SCHOOL OPENS 90TH YEAR

Because they received significant contributions from individuals and churches through a more aggressive fund-raising effort led by their new director, Red Bird Mission School was able to reopen this fall with reduced enrollment but with classes for all grades. The elementary grades will be placed in combined classrooms. Last year's enrollment averaged 220, but this year's is expected to be around 150. Staff has been reduced by fifty percent. The new director of the school, Dr. O. Taylor Collins said, “We will operate the school that we can afford until we are able to afford the school we envision—a school for the formation of Christian leaders from the Cumberland Mountains.” Dr. Collins is a graduate of Red Bird School, returning to work there after a distinguished career in public schools.

We can continue to support the school by collecting **General Mills Box Tops for Education** and **Campbell's Soup UPC codes**. Please put the labels you have saved in the green box on the Mission Counter. They are counted and sent to Red Bird on a regular basis by Dick Harmer. This is an inexpensive way to support a school that has been improving lives of young people in this very needy area for 90 years.

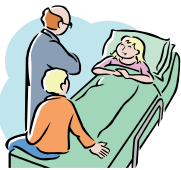

GREECE HABITAT BENEFITS FROM CLOTHING SHED

The Used Clothing Drop-Off Shed at Greece United Methodist Church at 1924 Maiden Lane helps us to raise money for the next Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity project in 2012. Clothing, shoes, sneakers, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, pillowcases, drapes, and stuffed toys are all accepted. It is very helpful to the members of our churches who are keeping the shed clean and organized if you have already put the donations in tied bags.

The donations are not cut up or shredded. They are sent to people who can use them all over the U. S. and the world. There are tax receipts at the shed so that you can get a tax deduction for your donation. (You are responsible for keeping the list of donations and valuing them.)

Please do not put rags, fabric scraps, pillows, toys, or household goods in the shed. That only creates a disposal expense for St. Pauly's, the organization that runs the program.

The bags are collected by St. Pauly's and weighed. Greece Habitat each month receives a check based on the weight of donations collected. It's not a lot of money each month, but like other small on-going fundraisers, over time the money adds up to a very helpful sum.

Once regular meetings have resumed to prepare for the next project—our fifth house—you will get regular updates on our progress.

MISSION SHARE NEEDS YOUR HELP

Mission Share Outreach Center at 10 Cedarfield Commons (off Long Pond Rd. north of the Greece Town Hall) needs additional volunteers. The resource center offers food and clothing as well as other services. The number of clients has continued to grow. If you could **help serve clients** on a regular basis, call 368-0744 for more information. There's a bit of paperwork, including a recommendation from Pastor Anne, but getting involved is easy.

Another ministry of the center is a **Veteran's Outreach**, which meets once a month. The Director, Tom Hakes, has asked that the member churches provide **two people to host** one of the monthly meetings. Hosting involves bringing refreshments, preparing a devotional moment, and getting the conversation going.

Everyone can help by bringing in **bathroom tissue and feminine hygiene products** for the clients. Each church is taking responsibility for a couple of items that are used regularly (most of the food comes from Foodlink). We started with this assignment in early summer and agreed to continue.
