From Your Pastor

It's freezing outside today, but everything is so beautiful. The sun is glistening on a fresh coat of snow that still clings to the branches and covers up all the dirt and imperfections. We have an amazing God who can bring beauty into the midst of the coldest seasons of our lives. And underneath the snow and cold are the seeds of new life waiting to spring forth in the warmth of God's love. What an awesome God we serve!

Over the last month we've focused on listening to what God wants to say to us. It's not something that should end with the conclusion of our study, but continue to be developed into a life long discipline of listening to what God wants to speak into our lives. But listening is only the beginning. Once we've heard from God, we must obey the promptings we've received. That's one of the reasons we are once again encouraging everyone in the congregation to participate in our 90 in 90 campaign. The idea is that each of us complete at least 90 minutes of service in our community during the next 90 days (that's only $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours out of the next 2160 hours). Continue to listen to God and ask him where and how he wants you to serve. Then do it. And don't forget to tell me about your experience. We will celebrate them on May 1.

The combination of listening to and obeying God is how we live out our mission of *transforming lives and serving Christ with joy*. It's my prayer that you will listen and hear what God wants to tell you and that you'll find true joy in serving him.



From the Pastor of Visitation and Membership Care

As we prepare to leave for Florida for our winter break, I'd like to share a little humor to help you through the snowy winter days in Rochester.

Humorist Phil Callaway shares the following excerpts from his book *Who Put the Skunk in the Trunk? Learning to Laugh When Life Stinks* in the periodical *The Joyful Noiseletter*. (used by permission):

In the third grade, I watched a friend put a salamander down Mrs. Hill's blouse (if you're reading this, Mrs. Hill, I trust you will remember my finer points and not seek legal counsel), but for some reason I didn't want to touch the salamander. I merely supplied the idea.

But the best impractical joke I ever had the joy of participating in was launched when my friend Bobby and I discovered a small skunk waddling through a neighbor's garden one hot summer evening.

The sun was sinking just beyond the pine trees, but it was not too late for some excitement. After managing to coax the critter across the backyard with a trail of lettuce leaves, we took the keys from the ignition and opened Mr. Finney's trunk.

Now Mr. Finney was our third-grade Sunday school teacher at the time, a fine accordion player, and just about the most nervous person I ever had the pleasure of sneezing behind. On Saturdays, he polished his late model Ford Fairlane until he could hardly see the initials the neighbor kids had etched into the hood. Mr. Finney was a particular man. He shined just about everything to which he was attached, and you rarely saw him with so much as a cuff link out of place. Though we didn't know it, this was the eve of the Finney family vacation. Mr. and Mrs. Finney and their children had carefully organized and packed everything they would need to have a peaceful holiday, free from the worries and cares of our small town.

As they slept, a vegetable trail led a hungry skunk past their bed of petunias, across their front yard and onto their wood box. From there it was an easy hop into the trunk where the poor skunk hunkered down between a suitcase and a sleeping bag, nibbling on a generous portion of carrots. Bobby and I cautiously shut the lid, replaced the keys, and went to bed.

About eight o'clock the next morning, we crept back

to the Finney house and waited behind a blue spruce tree while an unsuspecting Finney family filed down their front walk and climbed aboard the Fairlane, anticipation etched on their eager faces. What happened next I will carry with me into old age.

Mr. Finney started the car and revved the engine. Then he slipped her into gear. After a tight U-turn and about 30 feet of gravel, the car screeched to a halt, spewing stones in all directions. Inside, Mr. Finney glared at his wife with a wrinkled expression. Then he turned to the children with an accusing glance. Finally he thrust open the shiny door and sniffed the air. By the time the key was in the trunk, he had his suspicions. By the time he open it, they were confirmed.

Whatever glue had held the man together until this point in his life seemed to lose its grip then. Slamming the lid down, he stood with clenched fists, kicking the bumper, his language matching the color of his car — a deep blue. We watched from behind the spruce tree, Bobby and I, wondering if we should laugh or cry. Or go tell our mothers.

Later that summer I was informed that the Finneys were relocating. No one quite knew why. No one but Bobby and I.

What Mr. Finney, and Mrs. Hill, discovered during those unforgettable moments is something that all of us humans learn as we walk through this life: Sometimes life slithers. And sometimes it stinks.

I call people who have the ability to laugh in the face of life's surprises skunkbusters. That comes not from knowing the future or understanding the past, but from a choice we make.

One that says, "No matter what goes right, no matter what goes wrong, God is in control. And one day — maybe not tomorrow, or even next week — I'll see things His way.



ANGEL FOOD MINISTRY AT ALDERSGATE CONTINUES

Because the number of people taking advantage of the opportunity to order food through the Angel Food program here has dropped significantly, the Angel Food volunteers met in January to discuss whether or not to continue. Mary Sims, who heads up the program, did try to check out how other area programs are doing and why people who placed orders earlier are no longer doing so. Other programs have seen a similar drop; and, of the people called, one said the family no longer needed the help, another that there was so much food in the box ordered that it lasted them two months. None seemed to have complaints about the quality of the food or have any particular reason for not participating other than not getting around to ordering.

After some discussion the group decided to continue through May, at which time they will look at the circumstances again. The volunteers are really enjoying the work and are reluctant to cut off the people they are helping who really need it. They are also looking at other ways to expand the program to people who might need it, including the possibility of limited delivery of food orders to shut-ins.

If you have intended to place an order but have neglected to do so, this would be a very good time to check out this really outstanding opportunity to get good quality food for less than grocery store prices. You can place an order on-line. The directions are on the menu sheet in the Angel Food Ministry envelope on the Opportunities Board.



Otherwise, you can **place an order for February** on Saturday, February 12, from Noon to 2:00 PM or on Sunday, February 13, between services. Pickup will be on Saturday, February 19.

MISSION SHARE

Mission Share has had a very busy year of service in Greece. In 2010 alone, they gave out the food for 38,502 meals. In January Mission Share received official approval from the IRS as a 501(c)3 Corporation and tax-exempt status from NYS. Tom Hakes, the Director, also was moved from part-time to full-time service in May. The website went live at www.missionshareoutreach.org in June. Over 400 backpacks were assembled and distributed in September. The first Emergency Home Repair Team was put together in October to work on the home of a woman recovering from life-altering injuries. Thanksgiving Baskets and Christmas Hope helped many families in addition to their regular clients.

Here at Aldersgate the Missions Committee agreed to provide Mission Share with at least \$100 a month and to collect feminine hygiene products and toilet tissue to add to their food pantry. Our visits to deliver supplies showed us that the feminine products are the most needed. Thanks to your generosity, on the last trip we were able to fill a full shelf; but most of the time supplies were sparse. They hand out a full box of sanitary napkins, tampons, or liners, unlike Cameron where we put a few in each personal hygiene kit. As a result, we will be able to help more people if we buy smaller boxes, even if that makes the products more expensive per unit. Don't overlook the coupons that are often available to stretch your charitable dollars or store brand products.

Located in Cedarfield Commons off Long Pond Road, Mission Share has become a vibrant ecumenical ministry in our community.

The 2011 Church Budget of \$382,722.95 was approved at Church Conference on November 30

Dear Sally Stewardship:

I see the boxes in the Gathering Space where we collect donations for the Greece Food Shelf, Mission Share, and Cameron Community Ministries, and other local agencies; and I have seen the Hinge and bulletin notes requesting money for other causes. This must add up. How much does come in & where does it all go? Does it make a difference?

Curious

Dear Curious,

This is a giving congregation. We don't begin to track the many members who give their time and energy to serve others in our community or the in-kind donations that come in for the Food Shelf, Cameron, and Mission Share, or the charitable dollars given outside the church. We do track carefully the money that is given through the church.

Big picture first--according to our Financial Secretary's report, this year Aldersgate received a total income of \$594,387.49, which included \$230,419.59 for the Building Fund. Apportionments we paid totaled \$38,235.00. There was also \$31,309.12 of "second-mile" giving. The remainder—and largest portion—goes to support our staff, facilities, and programs here at Aldersgate. Total giving was up 5.19% from 2009. Considering the economy, that figure is impressive.

Apportionments are the amount we give as a church to support the work of our denomination, conference, and district—the other administrative units through which we are organized to carry out ministry. The World Service Fund, for instance, helps to build new churches, pay the salaries of missionaries (not all are covered by "covenant" relationships), expands Bible studies, provides leadership for youth ministries, and much, much more. Funds to support Africa University (whose choir will be in our area again this coming June), ministerial education, our eleven historically black colleges, the bishops, and our participation in work with the worldwide Christian church are all part of the apportionments. If we fall short, other churches have to make up the difference in order for this important work to continue. (Relax—we pay our share. The last time we didn't pay our apportionments in full was 1972.)

You are probably more interested in "second-mile giving," money that goes for mission and ministry beyond the apportionments and local church expenses. This includes the six Special Sunday offerings that you hear about over the course of the year. The next one coming up is the One

Great Hour of Sharing on the first Sunday in April. This is especially important because this offering provides funding for the administrative work of the United Methodist Committee on Relief so that your other second-mile giving to UMCOR can go directly to the cause you designate. This special offering also funds the disaster relief work and such projects as helping to provide safe drinking water in Nicaragua and teaching trades to HIV/AIDS orphans. This money is important for essential work that is not fully funded by designated gifts. Members gave to a number of UMCOR projects last year, but the largest was \$3,297.00 toward Haitian relief.

Included in our second-mile giving is the \$2500 we contribute to the support of Meri Whitaker and the \$1000 for a doctor in Liberia. \$1800 of that total is in the budget; the rest is from additional gifts.

Some members of our congregation also support through Elim Bible Institute the ministry of Fred & Annette Farrokh among Muslim background believers in the New York metropolitan area.

Another very large portion of our second-mile giving is the \$6506.26 for White Gifts at Christmas. That figure just includes dol-

lars given directly to the church for the program and not the dollars spent by people who took on families and paid for the food and gifts themselves. We also met our commitment of support to Mission Share by contributing \$1359.20 in addition to the in-kind donations collected in the Mission Share box.

These gifts allow the people of Aldersgate to be involved in essential ministries around the world that we could not support by ourselves. They

are only possible if we join our dollars with those of others—another advantage of being part of the *United Methodist Church*.

If you are interested in more detail, pick up your copy of the **2010 Annual Report** on the counter behind the Welcome Table. If it's financial detail you like, knock yourself out! It includes the reports of the Benevolence Treasurer, the Financial Secretary, the Treasurer of United Methodist Women, the 2010 expenditures and the 2011 Budget. If you want to under-

stand better the work of our groups and committees, read their reports. A lot goes on beneath the surface here. It's hard not to get excited when you realize how much ministry we carry out or share in here at Aldersgate.

Here's hoping you'll decide to read further!




