From Your Pastor

I pray you are continuing to listen for whispers from God each day through prayer, Bible Study, and meditation upon God's word. Remember, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correction and training in righteousness, so that all Gods' people may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." (2 Timothy 3:16-17)

I also pray that you are listening for God's whispers during our times of corporate worship each week. Recently I had a conversation with someone who told me that they listen for one or two "take-aways" from the message each week. They write them down and then try to live them out in their life. That seems like a great way to listen to the message each week because "through me or in spite of me" the Holy Spirit is at work bringing God's whispers to us. Many times someone has told me as they leave worship something to the effect of "God said this to me today." I'm no longer surprised to be surprised by what they heard. It may have nothing to do with what I thought the message was about, but it was what they needed to hear. I am thankful for the way the Spirit works to bring the message that is needed to each person who is willing to listen.

Lent begins Wednesday, March 9. That evening we will have a traditional Ash Wednesday service and I will begin a series on the "Questions God Asks Us" based on a book by Trevor Hudson that looks at questions that God asks people in the Bible. Some of those questions are: "Where are you?" "Where is your brother?" "Who do you say that I am?" "Why are you crying? I'm excited about it and pray it will bless and challenge you.

On March 20 from 4-6 PM at the Grace United Methodist Church, we will be joining with others from our district to worship and pray for our urban churches, their ministries and communities. Some of our Contemporary Worship Team will be helping to lead worship. This is a great opportunity to hear what's going on in our city churches and perhaps hear whispers from God about where we are called to serve. I pray you'll be joining me for this important event.



As we approach another season of the church year I'd like to share a helpful article by Lois Ward, which appeared in *The Joyful Newsletter* (used by permission):

Parable of the Four Sons in Search of a Pear Tree

A man who had four sons wanted his sons to learn not to judge things too quickly. So he sent them each on a quest, in turn, to go and look at a pear tree that was a great distance away.

The first son went in winter, the second in spring, the third in summer, and the youngest in the fall. When they had all gone and come back, he called the four together to describe the tree.

The first son said that the tree was ugly, bent, and twisted. The second son said no, it was covered with green buds and full of promise.

The third son disagreed; he said it was laden with blossoms that smelled so sweet and looked so beautiful, the most graceful thing he had ever seen.

May God help us all to not judge too quickly any situation but to see all our pains and pleasure in perspective. Remember, Jesus had to go through Good Friday to get to Easter Sunday!

A blessed Lent to all of you —

The youngest disagreed with all of them; he said it was ripe and drooping with fruit, full of life and fulfillment.

The man then explained to his sons that they were all right, because they had each seen only one season in the tree's life. He told them that you can not judge a tree, or a person, by only one season. The essence of who they are and the pleasure, joy, and love that comes from a life can only be measured at the end of all its seasons.

If you give up when it's winter, you will miss the promise of your spring, the beauty of your summer, and the fulfillment of your fall. Don't let the pain of one season destroy the joy of all the rest.

ASH WEDNESDAY OFFERING WILL BE USED FOR GOOD SAMARITAN FUND

Because this fund has no regular source of income beyond occasional special donations by individuals, the Missions Committee is again this year designating the **Ash Wednesday Offering** for this purpose. HABITAT COIN BOXES TO BE DISTRIBUTED FOR LENTEN GIVING

Aldersgate continues to take a strong role in supporting the Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity Coalition. The group has completed four homes in the City of Rochester and plans to built a fifth home in 2012. This current year is a year of fundraising for the project.

As an early project to encourage individual and family contributions, we will distribute **Habitat Coin Boxes** after each service on the **first Sunday of Lent, March 13**. Please put the boxes in a handy location in your home so that you can drop your change in the box on a regular basis. You won't miss the small amounts you add to the box each time, but they will add up to a helpful donation. Then we ask that you **return the boxes on the Sunday after Easter, May 1**. If you are not in church when the boxes are distributed, additional boxes will be available on the Mission Counter or from the Church Office for as long as they last.

Habitat homes make a real difference in stabilizing communities and improving the quality of life for both the new homeowners and the neighborhood. Please help us by supporting this ministry with your gifts and prayers.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING HELPS "KEEP THE LIGHTS ON"

Sunday, April 3, has been designated as the date for One Great Hour of Sharing, the special offering that supports the United Methodist Committee on Relief. Information on the United Methodist Communications website explains the purpose of this offering:

"UMCOR receives no World Service funds or any other apportionments. Your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing help to "keet the lights on" and cover UMCOR's costs of doing business. That means 100 percent of every dollar you give to designated UMCOR programs helps some of the world's most vulnerable people. We do not take anything from designated gifts to cover home-office administrative costs because of the broad support of United Methodists through this annual offering. UMCOR's ability to respond and remain until the job is done is in direct proportion to the generosity of United Methodists during One Great Hour of Sharing.

The website also describes one program created to rebuild a community after a disaster: "Chili farmers in the village of Lambeugak, Aceh Besar District, Indonesia, harvested two successful crops this past year with the help of an UMCOR-supported income-generation project.

"The chili crop-planting project began in 2008 through the Reconstruction and Development in Aceh program implemented by the UMCOR Indonesia field office. The project provided tsunami-affected community members with grants in the form of seeds, tools, and fertilizer packages to enable the farmers to grow the popular Aceh chili plants and generate income for their families.

"The first harvest took place during a period when the market price for chili was high, and the farmers made a significant profit. They repaid 50 percent of the value of the seed packages to a community-development fund, which was then used to purchase seeds for the second chili planting.

Waste from the chili plants went to an existing organic fertilizer business, part of a farmers' cooperative that UMCOR and the Lambeugak community seek to revitalize. UMCOR will provide infrastructure and equipment needed to expand the business. This will help community members diversify and increase their incomes.

"UMCOR programs like these help restore lives and seek to be good stewards of God's creation."

Please plan ahead to give generously to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering so that these important ministries have the support needed.

I'm writing because I know that time is a stewardship issue. I know that I should be spending more time reading the Bible and praying, but I just can't do it with our busy schedule. We both work full-time and we have children who need our time and attention. I'm at my multi-tasking limit!

Help Needed

Dear Help,

You are right. Most of us are caught up in this sort of busy pattern. Grandma (or great-grandma to you) may have worked from dawn to dusk, and you have the same 24 hours a day she had; but technology to make life "easier" has instead just increased expectations. Grandma probably washed on Monday and ironed on Tuesday. You are expected to do all the laundry at night or on Saturday between shuttling the kids to activities and getting to church meetings. (Notice that I'm assuming that a woman asked this question. I do know that men have busy lives, too.)

In addition, between cell phones and computers, more and more employers expect us to be available at all times. "After work" is becoming a strange concept.

The Adult Bible Class has been discussing meditations from John Piper's *Taste and See*. On a recent Sunday we looked at #20. The author quotes ten resolutions given by a favorite teacher. Three of them dealt

with time and helped us to look at our days differently.

"1. At least once every day I shall look steadily up at the sky and remember that I . . . am on a planet traveling in space with wonderfully mysterious things above and about me. [We can do that even with Rochester's cloudy skies.]

"3. I shall not fall into the falsehood that this day, or any day, is merely another ambiguous and plodding twenty-four hours, but rather a unique event filled, if I so wish, with worthy potentialities.

"6. I shall open my eyes and ears. Once every day I shall simply stare at a tree, a flower, a cloud, or a person. I shall not then be concerned at all to ask what they are but simply be glad that they are. I shall joyfully allow them the mystery of what Lewis [C. S.] calls their 'divine, magical, terrifying and ecstatic' existence."

Neither resolution one or six needs to take long, just long enough to ground us or to allow us to center ourselves for our busy day. I suspect that it's those "worthy potentialities" in resolution three that you are looking for.

You probably already know what you need to do. Is everything you are trying to get done really important? Can others help you—carpool, share the chores, etc. Are all activities equally important? Are you, your spouse, and your children getting enough rest?

Are you getting enough physical exercise? It's amazing how much faster things get done when everyone is rested and good-tempered. Do you have family time? Only you and your family can make those decisions.

You asked about reading Scripture and prayer. As we've been learning, when we think God is not paying attention to us, it's because we aren't listening.

Some very busy people get up a half hour earlier than usual for their devotions. (Personally I always found it easier to stay up later.) One friend listened to Bible tapes in the car while running errands—CD's must be available now. Another friend made it a point to pray while stopped at red lights—just don't close your eyes and wait for the driver behind you to let you know the light changed. Whatever your strategy it is important to establish a regular time and place to tell God what is on your heart and to listen to his message to you.

We are too busy, but let's not become so busy that we miss each day's "worthy potentialities."


