Alleluia! Christ Is Risen!





As we think about our Mothers — the remembrances are varied, especially for those of us whose mothers are no longer with us. This month I'd like to share with you a quote from Erma Bombeck, which emphasizes one important aspect of being a good Mom.

Loving Enough to Say "No!"

"You don't love me!" How many times have your kids laid that on you? And how many times have you, as a parent, resisted the urge to tell them how much?

"Some day when my children are old enough, I'll tell them: I loved you enough to bug you about where you were going, with whom and what time you would get home. I loved you enough to be silent and let you discover that your hand-picked friend was a 'creep.'

I loved you enough to make you return a Milky Way with a bite out of it to the store and confess, 'I stole this.' I loved you enough to stand over you for two hours while you cleaned your bedroom, a job that would have taken me 15 minutes. I loved you enough to not make excuses for

your lack of respect or lack of manners.

I loved you enough to ignore what 'every mother' did. I loved you enough to figure you would lie about the party being chaperoned but forgive you for it after discovering I was right. I loved you enough to let you stumble, fall, and fail so that you could learn to stand alone. I loved you enough to accept you for what you are, not what I wanted you to be. But most of all, I loved you enough to say 'No' when you hated me for it. That was the hardest part of all."

OUR RUMMAGE SALE—THE ULTIMATE RECYCLING EVENT



In bringing all that "stuff" for the Rummage Sale, we are also recycling. Your knickknack may be someone else's collectible. Each year a number of our customers are setting up new households because they are starting out or starting over.

ANGEL FOOD ACCEPTS FOOD STAMPS

Beginning with May, Aldersgate has been approved to accept food stamps in payment for the boxes of food provided by Angel Food Ministries. Mary Sims, the chair of the project, has the materials and has been trained in the required process. This opens the ministry to providing service to an additional group of people.

Orders may be placed in person on Saturday, May 7, from 12:00-2:00 PM, or on Sunday, May 8, between services. Pick up will be on Saturday, May 21, from 9:00 – 10:30 AM in the Ide Center. Payment must be by cash or money order at the time you place the order. You may also order on line. Directions and the menu for the month are available on the flyers in the envelope on the Opportunities Board. Be sure to tell your friends and neighbors about this program.

STICKY LIPS BBQ FUNDRAISER FOR GREECE HABITAT

The Greece Habitat Coalition of churches, using the popular Sticky Lips BBQ, will hold a joint fundraiser on **Thursday, May 26, at Hope Lutheran Church** on Vintage Lane. Take-out meals will be available from 3:30-7:00 PM. The dinners include one-quarter chicken and 2-3 pork ribs, corn bread and two sides (choice of Cajun corn, mustard coleslaw, BBQ beans, or macaroni salad). The cost will be just \$11 for each dinner. Sodas will be available for purchase at the time of pickup.

DR. CHRIS HENA’S STAY IN KAZAKHSTAN IS LIMITED

Chris Hena has returned to her medical work in Semey, Kazakhstan, but has been given a visa limiting her to 120 days a year there. That limitation will obviously significantly decrease the effectiveness of her work with Community-Based Health Teams there.

Increasing difficulty in renewing her visa led to her extended stay in Liberia, her home country. She has had to leave Kazakhstan every year to renew her visa anyway. Since she normally goes home for Christmas, she asked the Board of Global Ministries to reassign her temporarily to Ganta Hospital (the one we have helped to support for many years.)

In January she hosted a team from Colorado Springs who came to Liberia to do a documentary on Women’s Health. She escorted them to Ganta Hospital and back to the capital, Monrovia, where they met with the President of Liberia, Ellen Johnson Sirleaf. She then moved back to Ganta in northeastern Liberia for six weeks, where the hospital continues to rebuild the infrastructure destroyed in the 14-year civil war. Currently they are struggling with the influx of over 100,000 refugees from the Ivory Coast.

Her main assignment was to work with the Community-Health Care Team that goes out to different villages five days a week. Since there are no roads to some of the villages, they often had to walk to the villages carrying the supplies on their heads. There they gave routine checkups and vaccinations to children and taught the children and their parents health lessons about infectious diseases. Pregnant women were given information about HIV prevention and family planning. De-worming children and adults was a major part of their daily activities as well as the workshops on how to use the malaria nets provided to the families as part of the outreach.

Working in the villages with the traditional birth attendants, she learned something about traditional practices that she’d not known before. All deliveries take place in “White Houses” (actually painted white) built in the back of their villages. Men are NOT allowed to know of or be present at deliveries. A couple of days after the birth of the child, they are finally permitted to see the child if they have made the required payments to the birth attendant.

Please keep Dr. Hena’s future assignment in your prayers since she may not be able to stay in Kazakhstan.



Dear Sally,

I know we're enjoying our expanded facilities and appreciate all the compliments we get about how well-organized they are, but really—is there anything happening now that we couldn't have done with our previous space? How have our ministries benefited because we added these new facilities?

Just a Thought

Dear Justa,

This is a good question for us to think about. We've been using the expanded facilities long enough that some of us may have forgotten what going to the "old church" was like and substantial numbers of us have come since we added on to that building. I don't claim to have all the answers here, but I did check with some others for their thoughts.

The #1 benefit for many of us is handicapped accessibility. Only the sanctuary and the parlor were accessible—if you could get a spot in the small parking lot in front of the church off Dewey Avenue. The plans for accessibility that we looked at prior to building would have cost \$100,000 or more and would have cost us much-needed space.

On most Sundays of the year attendance in the second service exceeds or nearly exceeds the fire marshal's limits for the old sanctuary. Our choir has been able to add seating to accommodate its growth. The Contemporary Worship Team can leave its equipment in place rather than move it out before the 11:00 service. (That was always a challenge!) We have room

for a Bell Choir and storage space for the bells! There are just more ways for us to make a joyful noise unto the Lord!

The screens that we thought would be used primarily for the contemporary service have benefited those who have difficulty reading the words in the hymnal and bulletin in both services. In addition, they can be used before and after the services to let us know what is going on in the life of the church in the coming week. The quiet room behind the sanctuary allows parents of very young children to participate in the service without feeling uncomfortable when their children are restless. The nursery is better equipped and more accessible to parents.

The ability to expand the sanctuary into the Ide Center has allowed us to hold very large gatherings. The space has been needed by some funerals and more recently allowed us to host the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra for our community. We've finally been able to host the Cluster Choir festival.

Our entryway and gathering space allows us to have a Welcome Table and encourages fellowship before and after services. We can put our coats on without hitting someone in the nose. (Remember that?) The space can be an additional meeting area when needed. We have dedicated space for Sunday School classes, our youth groups, and AA groups to meet. Remember when the AA group had to tear down its setup to get ready for Sunday School and the UMW had to set up for AA in the morning? Some of us miss the interaction between groups, but we can put more of our energy into the programs now rather

than set up. We've been able to reach out to other community organizations like Northgate Neighbors and host Angel Food Ministries. We have been able to hold more multiple events at the same time when needed.

The Ide Center has allowed us to host conferences and other large multi-church gatherings as well as some of our own larger events. Proceeds from the Rummage Sale have more than doubled with our ability to expand displays in the new space. That provides financial support for our ministries that wasn't there before. This summer we will again welcome the Red Bird Craft Show, a larger event than we could have handled before.

Health and wellness have become an important part of our ministry. We are reminded in I Corinthians 6:19 that our bodies are the temple of the Holy Spirit, and we are to use them for God.

The Catch the Spirit exercise classes have become an important ministry for many of us. (You may not remember, but we tried to hold classes in the old library. It didn't work very well.) There is space for the youth and adults to play basketball, volleyball, and table tennis—good for our bodies and good for our fellowship together. We have enough room to host regular blood drives.

I'm sure you could add to this list from your own experience. How has the availability of ministry opportunities at Aldersgate helped you to grow socially, physically, and spiritually? I'd enjoy hearing from you.
