*He has gained renown by his wonderful deeds;*


*the Lord is gracious and merciful.* Psalm 111:1-4 (NRSV)

I'm giving thanks for the many ways we saw God's great works while we were on the mission trip in Cincinnati. God was already at work there and we were privileged to join God and others to make a difference. If you were in church on July 31, you had the opportunity to hear about many of the ways God is working. One of the ministries where we served is New Life Furniture. It was founded by two people who wanted to help one family with nothing get settled into an apartment. Step by step God has grown the ministry so that they now are serving several families each week providing them with quality used furniture. The day I served in that ministry picking up and delivering furniture, we saw God's wonderful work first hand. First, we went to one home to pick up a dining room table. When we arrived, the next door neighbor came over and asked if we had time to pick up some furniture he wanted to donate. He gave us several items including a rocking chair and a children's table and chairs. The daily plan is to pick up the items from one family and deliver them to the family in need the same day to minimize handling. When we attempted to make our second delivery of the day, the people weren't home. After several phone calls, the director was able to reschedule a delivery that was originally scheduled for later in the week. The family that was expecting delivery on Friday would now receive furniture on Wednesday. It turned out that what we picked up from the neighbor that was not on the original plan was just what the people who had their delivery moved up needed. God knew the need and pro-



## From the Pastor of Visitation and Membership Care

Dear Aldersgate Family

As I pen these lines in mid-August, I realize that summer and picnics and vacations will soon be over! Then, it is back to our regular routines.

During the summer, our Grief Share (grief support group) has been going out for lunch once a month. (The regular sessions each Saturday at 11:00 AM resume on September 10.) During one of the lunches, the owner stopped and was chatting with me. She commented, "These people are laughing and visiting and having such a good time. Are you sure they are grieving?"

Yes, there is healing for grief! This reminded me of an article which appeared in *The Joyful Noiseletter*, entitled:

### ***How do you maintain joy in the face of sorrow?***

(For 30 years, Rev. Elmer [Bud] Frimoth of Portland, OR, a Presbyterian minister disguised as "Doolotz" — a tramp clown, brought smiles and a message of good cheer and hope to patients in hospitals, nursing homes, and to the homeless.)

*I've been reading The Return of the Prodigal Son by Henri Nouwen, a delightful book with such positive insights in the struggle to maintain joy when faced with so much sorrow and darkness in the world. Nouwen was a Dutch Catholic priest whose books, like The Wounded Healer and Clowning in Rome, have been popular among both Protestants and Catholics. Nouwen shared the last years of his life with mentally handicapped people at l'Arche Community of Datbreak in Toronto. Here are some of Nouwen's observations from The Return of the Prodigal Son:*

*"Somehow I have become accustomed to living with sadness and so have lost the eye to see the joy and the ears to hear the gladness that belongs to God and which is to be found in the hidden corners of the world. I have a friend who is so deeply connected with God that he can see joy where I expect only sadness."*

*"Joy never denies sadness, but transforms it*

*to a fertile soil for more joy."*

*"(God's joy) is the joy of belonging to the household of God whose love is stronger than death and who empowers us to be in the world while already belonging to the kingdom of joy."*

*People who have come to know the joy of God do not deny the darkness, but they choose not to live in it. They claim that the light that shines in the darkness can be trusted more than the darkness itself and that a little bit of light can dispel darkness."*

*"Every moment of each day I have the chance to choose between cynicism and joy. Every thought I have can be cynical or joyful."*

*"Here on earth, joy means the absence of sorrow and sorrow the absence of joy. But such distinctions do not exist in God. Jesus, the Son of God, is the man of sorrows, but also the man of complete joy. We catch a glimpse of this when we realize that in the midst of his greatest suffering Jesus is never separated from his Father."*

*"His union with God is never broken even when he 'feels' abandoned by God. The joy of God belongs to his sonship and this joy of Jesus and his Father is offered to me... 'I have loved you, just as my Father has loved me', Jesus says. 'I have told you this, so that my own joy may be in you and your joy complete.'"*

# Aldersgate Youth Fellowship News

### not about us.

**"NOT Aldersgate"** started as a joke within our group at Kingdom Bound this summer. While our collective behavior at Darien Lake left much to be desired, we observed other youth groups with t-shirts and banners proudly identifying themselves. We agreed that if we wore t-shirts they should say "We're NOT Aldersgate UMC". Admittedly, that would only draw *more* attention to us; but now that little joke reminds us that our youth ministry is about so much more than us and even our church.

One of the things that can happen in a church is that the youth ministry becomes separated from what's going on in the "real" congregation - the adults. The adults do ministry and the youth prepare to do ministry. The actual congregation meets in the sanctuary and the youth meet in the basement. The congregation goes by the name of the church, but the youth get a catchy name like "Faith Factor". In effect, the youth are minor league disciples preparing for the Big League.

But as baptized members of the community of faith, our youth - like us - are called by God to participate in the full life of the church. And just as God calls this congregation outside of itself and into our community and world, so God calls our young people. It's not about us or the youth group or the church; it's about becoming the kind of disciples God wants us to be.

It's still important for our youth to fellowship with one another, but let's not forget to involve them in all aspects of our ministry here at Aldersgate. We'll still meet in the basement, but we're losing the Faith Factor name in favor of no name (we'll use Aldersgate Youth Fellowship when we have to).

As the theme for this year's youth ministry kick-off, "**NOT Aldersgate**" reminds us that our people - young and old - are more than the name of a church or a youth group; we are who God says we are: beloved children of God and disciples of Jesus Christ.

As a church family, let us commit ourselves to a ministry that empowers our young people to do ministry with, for and maybe even *to* us.

## STICKY LIPS BBQ IS BACK

The Sticky Lips Barbecue fundraiser held in May was so successful (raised over \$1500) that the **Greece Habitat for Humanity Team** decided to do it again on **Thursday, September 22**. The drive thru pick-up will be from 3:30 – 7:00 PM, again at Hope Church, 1301 Vintage Lane. The dinner will include a quarter charcoal cooked, basted chicken; smoked St. Louis cut rib (2-3 bones); fresh cornbread; and two home-made sides for just \$12.00.

Tickets will be available in the Gathering Space after services starting on September 4. The goal is to build a new house in 2012.



## MISSION SHARE UPDATE

Requests for food and clothing have been especially heavy since June. In July, for instance, there were 153 visits from families representing 464 individuals served. At the Friday, August 19, Advisory Team meeting, team members saw **nearly empty food and personal hygiene shelves**. Foodlink will meet the food needs—although additional peanut butter and jelly from churches would be helpful. Personal supplies like **soap, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, toilet tissue and feminine hygiene products** are all collected in the partner churches and are always in short supply. Your travel-size soaps, shampoos, etc. are always welcome. Put your donations for Mission Share in the blue box behind the Welcome Table.

For the **school backpacks** we were able to provide 19 single subject spiral-bound notebooks, 99 two-pocket folders, 49 bottles of school glue, 65 glue sticks, and 386 pencil-cap style erasers. Volunteers from Aldersgate participated in the nights for filling backpacks and for distributing them.

The **Literacy Light Project** has already begun intake interviews for potential learners. The program will help adults reach about a sixth grade reading and writing level, enough for basic literacy tasks. Those who wish to go further will be referred to Literacy Volunteers of Rochester or Mercy Bridges. Volunteers are needed to serve as tutors. A series of training classes will be held in the fall at Mission Share, starting with an introductory class on Saturday, Sep-

tember 17. Potential tutors may attend that class without committing to take a learner. Volunteer forms with more information are available in the church office.

Remodeling of the space to be used by **Crossroads Pregnancy Center** is well underway thanks to the auction in June that raised over \$7000. The opening is planned for October 17. In September, we will be doing a church-wide 360 as part of our work toward becoming a "missional church." ### **DR. CHRIS HENA TO BE REASSIGNED**

Dr. Hena, whose ministry and adventures we have followed from Russia to Kazakhstan, is back in Atlanta, Georgia, awaiting a new assignment. Kazakhstan is now only giving visas for 120 days, after which mission workers have to leave the country and reapply. Because that practice severely disrupts ongoing projects, the General Board of Global Ministries plans to assign Dr. Hena somewhere in Africa soon. Although she is Liberian, she may not be assigned to that country. Please pray for discernment as GBGM makes the decision about Dr. Hena's next placement.

### **LETTER FROM MERI WHITAKER**

The latest letter from our covenant missionary, Meri Whitaker was sent June 27, too late for our last issue of the Hinge.

*Dear Friends,*

*"For everything there is a season" and what a season of seasons we have had in 2011. We had record cold in the winter, record cold in spring combined with tornadoes and floods. My ranch was flooded and I lost several pieces of equipment and a bunch of barbed wire fence. It stayed cold all through May. Then it turned hot and dry, record heat. It is 102° today with an index of 110°. I love the heat but even I am saying, "This is hot!"*

*Things here in Cookson are moving along at a very steady pace. The new cottage industries that we have here are blooming. The jewelry group is doing outstanding work and they have formed a bond with each other that is great. I sit in my office and listen as they laugh and tease with each other. We were able to introduce our communion chalices at annual conference this year and we came home with forty orders! The embroidery department is requesting the addition of one new machine and one more worker because of the volume of work they are doing and the silk screeners have been busy for months.*

*Our children's program started on June 15 and we have had over forty children attend each day. It keeps the staff and volunteers very busy planning and implementing these activities. Our youth will be traveling to Clinton, OK to teach VBS later on this month at the Clinton Childcare's Mission. They are very excited.*

*I was able to travel to Austin, Texas, to speak to the District UMW and preach in the lake Travis UMC and then to Nebraska, where I also spoke at a District UMW meeting and preached in three churches. I continue to make my way around the state preaching and meeting people who are interested in the ministry here. This year I have added several revivals to my speaking engagements and it has been really good for me to go back to the grass roots and preach.*

*The church is doing well and continues to see changes in people's lives. Two weeks ago we held the first funeral of a church member in the church. It was very sad. She had worked hard to escape from alcohol but she was simply unable to turn it over and it took her life. It is a grim reminder of the seriousness of this disease. The church has responded beautifully to the family offering their support, providing meals, cards and phone calls.*

*We were also privileged to marry two people who have come to us straight out of prison. They have been in recovery for two years and had their lives restored. They had a beautiful wedding and we all wish them well.*

*It is rodeo season and I have gone to two already this year. I love the rodeo and it is such a blessing to sit outside at night under the stars and watch the events that take place.*

*The seasons change and they change quickly. It will be fall before we know it and we will be moving into all the programs and activities that are a part of fall. It seems that we just get into one season and we are moving into another. It is so anchoring to know that while our lives and our seasons change, God never does. He remains faithful to this ministry and its purpose and we can run back to Him for guidance and stability anytime we need to. God lifts us up on Eagle's wings and it is our hope and prayer that it is God who is pleased with our efforts each and every day.*

*I want to thank all of you who have sent in covenant dollars to the GBGM [General Board of Global Ministries]. It is wonderful to receive those reports and take a moment to pray for you and think about each one of you and to know that you were thinking about me when you sent in your support. Thank you!*

Dear Sally Stewardship,

I haven't heard anything recently about how our last capital campaign is doing. Are members paying their pledges? Are we able to meet our monthly mortgage payments? How about an update!

Interested & Concerned

Dear Interested & Concerned,

Oops! Sorry about that! We've given Church Council regular updates on our accounts and the amount received for the Building Fund is reported in the bulletin each week. But, unless you are tediously tracking those figures each week or month like the Financial Secretary, you have no context, no way of knowing if there is *enough*. It's good to know that you are not only curious, you also care enough to be concerned.

For starters, no news is really good news. If there were a drastic problem, you'd have heard about it. Of course, if we had received a major legacy that paid a lot off, we'd have announced that, too.

The last capital campaign produced \$588,331 in pledges. To date we have received \$262,314 in pledges and gifts—pretty much on track. One of the “gifts” would be the \$3110 received from Applebee's so far in this campaign period. In addition, about \$9000 in bonds has been surrendered to the fund. Every month that \$17,461 payment has been met.

Has it been tight? Yes. We were anticipating a shortfall one month recently. It was mentioned briefly in a couple of meetings and some who heard advanced their planned payments and the problem was resolved. There is a little over \$6000 in a Vanguard account in reserve that could be used if needed. It would be nice to have a full payment in reserve, but that's not the way the

Lord seems to be working. Like manna, He makes sure we have *enough*.

What does the future hold? We know that the pledge total was about \$40,000 short of what would be needed over three years. That's actually why it's a little tight every month. You may have noticed that we have been encouraging putting more fundraising money into the Building Fund. We've been able to do it without cutting off other needed church or mission projects.

It's never too late to begin making regular contributions to the Building Fund. You may not have felt able to make a pledge when we held the campaign and your circumstances have changed. You may be relatively new to the church and not have realized the need. Please don't just move your regular contribution from the “budget” line to the Building Fund. Our ongoing ministries need your support, too.

By the way, you may ask, “Who's ‘we’?” We are the Stewardship Development Team and the Finance Committee. Both report to Church Council. Almost all of us are in church every Sunday; so feel free to let us know what questions (or suggestions) you may have. If we don't have the current information, we can get it for you or refer you to the person who does have the answers.

This is a Good News report. Think about it. As a church, have more than doubled our giving over what it was at the turn of the century. (I love saying “turn of the century.”) That's really quite remarkable. So celebrate! God is good.
