From Your Pastor

By now I hope you have picked up a copy of this year's Lenten devotional, *Journey to the Cross: 40 days of discovery*. Spiritual disciplines are important all the time, but are a particular emphasis of the season of Lent which calls us to walk with Jesus through his suffering and death so we can fully appreciate and celebrate his resurrection on Easter. This year in addition to Bible reading, reflection, and prayer, there is an opportunity to write your reflections. I encourage you to do that and then at the end of Lent look back over what you've written. It will help you more clearly hear what God is saying to you. Also as we consider Jesus' suffering, death, and ultimately his resurrection, we are reminded that even in the face of uncertain times, troubles, illness, and death, we have hope and assurance that God is with us and will see us through.

In addition to personal study and reflection, corporate worship is important to a growing and vital relationship with God in Christ. I know there are lots of things that pull us in other directions on Sunday morning, but I encourage you to make attending worship a priority for God's sake and for yours.

Other spiritual disciplines to consider practicing during Lent are fasting (it could be refraining from food for a day each week, from chocolate for six weeks, or from something like watching TV or playing computer games), service (taking time to help out somewhere that you normally wouldn't), giving (making an additional monetary gift to the work of God through the church), and witness (staying open to and taking opportunities to share the difference a relationship with Jesus makes in your life). As we do these things that John Wesley called, "means of grace," our lives will be transformed. We will enjoy a deeper and more vibrant relationship with Jesus Christ and discover the true joy of following and serving the Lord.


That is my prayer for each of us this season.



With unemployment in Nicaragua at 65-70%, it is important that people there become skilled enough to take advantage of whatever opportunities to work that exist. Ray Poling has agreed to head up Aldersgate involvement with the Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity. He has taken responsibility for our turn to check the St. Pauly's Textiles shed at Greece UMC and started attending the monthly coalition meetings. He will be leading the effort to sign up volunteers to build the house when we get nearer the construction date.

We wish to thank **Kathy Peck**, who has been checking the shed for Aldersgate since it was opened up over a year ago. Kathy has since become a volunteer counselor for Crossroads Pregnancy Care Center at Mission Share.

Habitat homes make a real difference in stabilizing communities and improving the quality of life for both the new homeowners and the neighborhood. Recent statistics show that Habitat homeowners stay in their homes, and their children are significantly more likely to complete high school and to attend college than comparable families. Concentrating rebuilding in a single neighborhood drives out drug dealers and drives down crime in general, lifting the whole neighborhood. Small Groups at Aldersgate

More Mission News

AFRICA UNIVERSITY FEATURED AT WORSHIP SERVICES ON MARCH 25

One million dollars in three years—that's the fundraising goal set by Upper New York Annual Conference to support the Africa University Endowment Campaign. As part of that campaign, we are one of twelve churches across the conference to host speakers on March 25 so that we have this outstanding opportunity to learn more about this unique institution and its very real impact on the continent. The University, located in Zimbabwe, has continued to grow and carry out its mission in spite of the troubled political and economic conditions in that country. It prepares students from across the continent to become pastors, teachers, health workers, agricultural specialists, child development specialists, and so on—skills that prepare Africans to care for their own people and become less dependent on outside help.

The Rev. Joseph Abram, Jr., a pastor in the South Carolina Annual Conference and a member of the Africa University Advisory Development Committee, will be at Aldersgate to speak at both services. Please be sure you are present that day to meet him and hear about what is happening today at Africa University and how they plan to carry out their vision for the future.

Dear Sally,

I've been hearing rumors that our church finances are running short. How are we doing? If there's a problem, I'd like to know. Perhaps I could make arrangements to give a little more.

Dear Concerned Giver,

The short answer is, "Yes." Giving to both the accounts that pay current expenses supporting our regular ministries and the mortgage on our building are running behind needs. At the end of 2011, total giving through regular offerings, which cover current expenses, was behind giving for 2009 by \$1730 and behind 2010 by \$15,835. Further, we were \$5601 short of paying our apportionments in full, the first time we have failed to do so since 1972. We are falling behind when expenses continue to increase.

The sky has not fallen. Even though giving to support on-going ministries was short of the two previous years, it still totaled \$287,606.77 in 2011. And giving toward paying off our mortgage—the building fund—from May 20, 2010 (the beginning of the current capital campaign) to December 31, 2011 was \$347,555.67. That's not insignificant. Those figures still represent a strong commitment to our ministries.

Why has this happened? We suspect the down economy may be catching up to us, and we know we have lost several regular givers through death and life changes. The \$40,000 shortfall in pledges to the capital campaign is catching up to us. Grants that had been helping fill that gap in previous years have run out. Applebee's has been helpful, but will hardly do the rest of the job.

The Finance Committee has looked at the situation, and there are not large changes we could make in our current expenses without cutting staff. Our staff members and work areas have been consistently quite frugal. We have looked at the possibility of refinancing the mortgage at lower rates, but could create easily \$50,000-\$60,000 in closing costs, require paying off currently held bonds and either going through another bond sale or seeking financing from local banks or as yet unexplored sources. We are frankly reluctant to recommend any such measures for a problem that could very well be temporary. We were

"holding our own" through most of last year; however, we did not get our usual upturn in giving at the end of the year and the pattern has continued forward into 2012.

Right now we are making the mortgage payments in full because a few people aware of the situation have advanced pledge payments, others are making additional gifts, and we have borrowed from our Pass-Thru accounts. In February we received a gift of **\$3000** from the accumulated funds of the **Aldersgate Actors Guild** that helped us make the payment, which was wonderful.

But that was last month. For the building fund, we need an additional \$3500-\$4000 in addition to the regular pledges each month. (The projections we've seen on refinancing wouldn't make the monthly payments that much lower.) A similar increase in giving to the regular offering would pay the bills on time. As the old joke goes, we've got the money—but it's still in our pockets!

I'm sorry this isn't the usual cheerful, upbeat letter I like to write. On the other hand, this is a problem that's quite solvable—and the solution lies in the willingness of each of us to commit to further support the ministries here at the church that provides our spiritual strength and guidance. Just as we believe that the Lord will provide for our church and we will move forward, we also believe that the Lord provides the resources from which each of us can make the commitment to additional giving. Meeting this challenge will bring both blessings and spiritual growth to our church and to us as individuals.

Yes, please follow through. There are two things you can do. The first is to give more. Not all of us can give the same amount—the Lord expects giving in proportion to our resources—but all of us have something to give. If you haven't already begun tithing (giving 10% your income, make a commitment now to work toward that goal. Second, put the church's finances specifically on your daily prayer list. Pray rather than worry!
