From Your Pastor

I seem to recall a song that said something like "Summertime and the living is easy." In my experience, most of the time, summer is anything but easy. We not only have our "normal" things to do (earning a living, nurturing relationships, caring for dependents, getting some exercise, cleaning the house, etc.), but we have outside maintenance, picnics, graduation parties, festivals, weddings, and all those other outdoor activities that we can't do any other time of the year. It's exhausting just thinking about it. So much activity, while good is not healthy if we don't take time to actually rest. We need times of rest and relaxation to balance our times of activity. That's in part why God commanded, "Observe the Sabbath day by keeping it holy, as the Lord your God has commanded you. 

I’ve found that humor is one of the best ways to relax and get through even difficult times! I agree with John Wesley in a letter that was quoted in the Joyful Noiseletter.

A letter from John Wesley

Rev. Dale Schoening of Slater & Sheldahl United Methodist Churches, IA, unearthed this excerpt from John Wesley’s *Letters, Vol. 1*:

“You seem to apprehend that I believe religion to be inconsistent with cheerfulness and with a sociable, friendly temper. So far from it that I am convinced, as true religion or holiness cannot be without cheerfulness, so steady cheerfulness, on the other hand, cannot be without holiness or true religion.

And I am equally convinced that true religion has nothing sour, austere, unsociable, unfriendly in it. Are you for having so much cheerfulness as you can? So am I.”

So, in the spirit of Wesley I share with you a little summer humor from the Joyful Noiseletter to brighten your day.

“During a service with our school children on Friday the 13th I was talking about superstitions. Discussing the Last Supper (in which Christ and the 12 Apostles had a betrayer in their midst), I asked, ‘Why do people consider 13 an unlucky number?’”

SCHOOL SUPPLIES ALSO NEEDED FOR MISSION SHARE AND EMMANUEL UMC

In addition to the supplies collected for UMCOR, we try to collect as many items as we can for local students. Both Mission Share Outreach Center and Emmanuel United Methodist Church distribute backpacks filled with school supplies to local youngsters who need them. Both need these supplies by mid-August.

These are the supplies needed by **Mission Share**: **24-count boxes of crayons, white glue, wide-ruled notebook paper, two-pocket folders, 1-subject spiral-bound notebooks, rulers, and pencil-tip erasers**. The backpacks will be filled on Thursday, August 23, from 7:00-8:00 PM at Mission Share and distributed on Thursday, August 30, from 6:00-9:00 PM. Sign-up sheets will be posted on the Opportunities Board if you wish to help either time.

Emmanuel UMC would like to fill their backpacks with the following items: **pencils, ball-point pens, notebooks, dictionaries** (both Spanish/English-English/Spanish and English/English), **erasers, pencil sharpeners, calculators, rulers, thumb drives (1 GB or higher) highlighters, pencil cases, glue sticks, drawing paper, construction paper, and index cards**. Bilingual New Testaments will be included in each backpack.

Totes labeled for Mission Share and Emmanuel will be under the coat rack with the UMCOR supply boxes. Your generosity will help support students both here in Greece and in the City of Rochester.

RUMMAGE SALE SETS ANOTHER RECORD

Our total receipts from the Rummage Sale so far are \$5227.00, about one hundred dollars higher than last year. Of that amount \$2600 has been donated to the Building Fund. The remainder after some minor expenses will help the UMW complete its Pledge to Mission and fund our activities and outreach for the rest of the year.

What happens to the goods left over? We bagged the remaining clothing and took it to the St. Pauly's Shed at Greece UMC. The money that comes in from that shed goes to Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity. Mothers In Need Of Others took two van loads of furniture and other household items they could use. The books were given to Greece UMC for the sale they had the following weekend, and the rest is to be picked up by the Volunteers of America.

COLLECTING FOR UMCOR KITS BEGINS

Start watching now for sale ads for school supplies. They traditionally start shortly after July 4. We will once again be putting together **School, Health, and Layette Kits for the United Methodist Committee on Relief** at the UMW meeting on September 27. We start the collection early in order to get the best prices and to reach our goals for each kind of kit. In the past we aimed for 150 each of the school and health kits and 50 layette kits. Unless we have an additional driver willing to make the trip to deliver kits, we'd like to have more health and layette kits and fewer school kits. The crayons and paper supplies in the school kits make them very heavy to transport. The trip last year was a concern until the supplies were delivered safely.

As we have in past summers, totes for each type of kit will be placed under the coat racks in the entry for you to deposit your contributions. UMW members will be counting and storing the items on a regular basis as the totes become full. All items must be new.

Each **School Kit** includes the following: **1 pair blunt scissors (rounded tip), 3 pads (or 150 sheets of loose leaf) of 8 1/2" x 11" ruled paper, 1 30-centimeter ruler, 1 hand-held pencil sharpener, 6 new pencils with erasers, 1 eraser (2 1/2"), and 1 box of 24 crayons.**

For **Health Kits** we need these items: **hand towels (15"x25" to 17"x27"); washcloths; large, sturdy combs at least 8" long (rattail combs and combs without handles are acceptable); nail files or fingernail clippers; bath-sized (3 oz. or more) bars of soap; adult-sized toothbrushes in original wrappers; and adhesive plastic strip sterile bandages.**

Layette Kits include **cloth diapers pre-folded or plain, shirts or onsies, baby washcloths, baby gowns or sleepers, diaper pins, sweaters or hooded sweatshirts open in the front, and receiving blankets 30"x 30" or 30" x 32".**

Members of **Sew 'n Sew's** are busy making School Bags, baby gowns, and sweaters. We are also making pillowcase dresses to send to Mission Central for shipment overseas. Anyone interested in helping is welcome to join the group, which will continue to meet at 1:00 PM in Room 1 on the second Monday of each month throughout the summer. If you are not free at that time and would like to work at home, Joyce Farrok has the patterns for the school bags, baby gowns, and pillowcase dresses.

Last year we delivered 163 School Kits, 166 Health Kits, and 45 Layette Kits to the Mission Central Hub at Cortland UMC. Through these kits we touch lives around the world by providing supplies for disaster relief and education programs.

The Reading Circle meets in the church library the first Thursday of each month throughout the year, starting at 1:00 PM. A hostess each month prepares light refreshments. APPLEBEE'S NIGHTS CONTINUE

Dear Sally Stewardship,

The church is bringing in someone to talk about planned giving. Doesn't all that talk about saving up and planning inheritances go against what Jesus said about storing up our treasures in heaven rather than down here and trusting that God will take care of us like he does the ravens and the lilies?

Dear Confused,

I assume you are talking about Luke 12:22-34. In my Bible that section is headed, "Do not worry." More than once Jesus told those following him to "sell all they had and give to the poor." The concern expressed here & elsewhere is our very human tendency to become too attached to our possessions, too eager to acquire more, and too afraid we won't have "enough," whatever that is.

He is not suggesting that we shouldn't be working hard, planning ahead, and taking care of our families. In fact Jesus pointed out the hypocrisy of the Pharisees in Matthew 15:5. Where the scriptures say to "honor your father and mother," Jesus told them,

"But you say that if a man says to his father or mother, 'Whatever help you might otherwise have received from me is a gift devoted to God,' he is not to 'honor his father' with it. Thus you nullify the word of God for the sake of your tradition." In other words, to tell your parents, "I was going to help you out, but I decided to give that money to God," is pure nonsense. It's just an excuse to get out of a responsibility.

In II Corinthians the Apostle Paul had much to say about the importance of giving and giving freely and cheerfully. However, in 12:14 he clearly implies that people should be taking care of their own needs and preparing to help their children, "After all, children should not have to save up for their parents, but parents for their children."

Bottom line—everything we have is a gift from God. We should be wisely planning our giving and our living. Whether we are giving a tithe or more, with the rest of the gifts we have been given, we should be taking care of our families and planning for our own future. It is

essential to plan for our care should we become ill; to make wills and set up trusts if the resources are there; to decide how much we want to leave to our children, other family and friends; to determine what kind of legacy we can leave to our church. If we don't plan, the government and the executors of our estates will.

What we don't know can hurt us. As a church we should be helping to make information available to you so that you can make good and prayer-filled decisions. Now is not the time to get skittish about our futures and the future uses of those resources God has given us. There's more to the message than, "Don't worry; be happy." Good plans make it easier for God to free us up from worry so that we can concentrate on building His kingdom!
