From Your Pastor

February is the month we celebrate love. As Christians, we first celebrate God's love. John writes, "Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. Dear friends, since God so loved us, we ought to love one another." (1 John 4:7-11) Love begins and ends with God. It is because God has first loved us that we can love one another.

This love that God enables is greater than we are and greater than our feelings for one another. Love is a way of acting toward others that shows forth the love of God. The Apostle Paul puts it this way, "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails. (1 Corinthians 13:4-8a) It's a tall order, but with God all things are possible. So let's focus on loving others as Christ loves us.

February 13 is the beginning of Lent, the Forty day period of preparation for Easter. It's a time to reflect on God's amazing love for us in Jesus' death and resurrection and to examine our love for God and others. I encourage you to join us for worship at 7 PM on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 13) and to use the "Committed to Christ" daily devotion-al guide that will supplement weekly Sunday messages. These will be available at church.

My prayer for Lent is that we grow in love and commitment during this Holy season.

2013 "MISSION u" ANNOUNCED

The School of Christian Mission has been re-named. It is now "Mission u." The purpose and format remain the same, an opportunity each summer to spend a short time in focused study of the Scripture, social issues, and mission around the world. Although sponsored by United Methodist Women, the school is open to all.

This summer's spiritual growth study will be "Living Sacramentally &

Walking Justly"; the geographic study will be "The Roma of Europe"; and the social issue will again be "Poverty." The format allows participants to take only two of the studies. The spiritual growth study is required and is new every year. The other two are repeated in alternate years so that students ultimately have a chance to study each topic if they choose.

"Mission u" will continue to be held in three locations in the Upper New York Conference, and are open to everyone interested. The first

will be held at Cazenovia College, Cazenovia, on July 12-14; the second at Camp Asbury, Silver Lake, on July 18-20, and the third at Silver Bay, Lake George, on September 13-15.

BABY SHOWER FOR WOMEN'S CARE CENTER AT MORNING CIRCLE

GREAT NEWS! LAST PAYMENT MADE ON HABITAT HOUSE

To the surprise of most of us who have been following these developments, our representative Ray Poling brought back from the last committee meeting the announcement that the last payment had been made to Flower City Habitat on the current house project. (Flower City fronts the money used in building.) Most of us were anticipating having to continue to raise money to finish paying for the house after it was built as we have at times in the past. Currently it costs \$65,000 in cash and in kind donations to build a house. With the small surplus remaining, the committee plans to purchase an appliance for the home as we have also done when we could. When asked if there were plans for a sixth house, Ray just smiled and said, "They were making plans for fundraisers for later this year."

Work on the house is not yet complete. On January 13 Pastor Anne announced two more dates when Aldersgaters were scheduled to work. The dedication will probably be held in early February.

CHRISTMAS OFFERING REPORT

Thank you for your very generous Christmas Offering. Our Benevolence Treasurer was able to add \$590 toward payment of our Shared Ministry apportionments and sent \$585 to Gateway-Longview to continue their caring work with Western New York children, youth, and families. Your Christian love is shown in your willingness to give freely to support God's work outside our walls as well as within.

MISSION CENTRAL REPORTS

After we put together school, health, and layette kits each fall, we take them to Mission Central, a large warehouse in Mechanicsburg, PA, or to the Cortland, NY hub. Mission Central is a Disaster Response ministry of the Susquehanna Conference of The United Methodist Church that works with the United Methodist Committee on Relief.

Their year-end statistics give us all some picture of the size of the need and the response of the churches in this whole Northeastern part of the United States, who use the warehouse as a collection point. From this warehouse in 2012, 8% of the items collected were sent to meet needs in Pennsylvania, 32% elsewhere in the U. S., and 60% globally. They had more than 7,000 volunteers join them in their work at the warehouse this year, the equivalent of

14 full-time employees. (They only have two or three paid employees.) The warehouse also provides storage space for a number of local and national non-profit service agencies.

MERI WHITAKER'S CHRISTMAS LETTER

We have been supporting Meri Whitaker, a United Methodist missionary assigned to work at Cookson Hills Center in Eastern Oklahoma. Meri graduated from SUNY Brockport and was originally connected with the Western New York Annual Conference. Her Christmas letter reminds us again of God's faithfulness in providing just what we need.

After reminding us unnecessarily about the warm weather in Oklahoma at the beginning of December, Meri wrote:

"I look back over 2012 and I am so grateful for God's continued grace on the ministry and mission here at Cookson. As you know, we have been working for six years to raise enough money to build a new Ministry Center. The hub of the work is housed in the first building that was ever built for us in 1948. It is dangerously close to falling down. We moved the old clinic, which was the original building, up on the hill to make room for the new Ministry Center. We needed \$600,000. A year ago we flatlined. We have raised \$300,000 through gifts and grants but we just could not seem to move off that number. I didn't know what to think. Someone suggested that we buy the restaurant next door, as it was for sale. They were asking \$800,000. I just laughed; we certainly didn't need a restaurant and we didn't have that kind of money. After about three months, we heard that the restaurant was filing for bankruptcy and going into foreclosure. We began to inquire and our lawyer, Mr. Lloyd Cole began to research the auction and try to buy the building, if at all possible; and Mike Wiley headed up the effort. We went back to the Woodworth Foundation and asked for an additional \$50,000 and they agreed. To make a long story short, we were able to buy the building and all of its contents for \$340,000. We were unable to raise any more money because we were not going to NEED any more money.

"We have cleaned out the building and sold all of the kitchen equipment. We are presently converting the heat from propane to natural gas and the office walls will begin going up this month. We are hoping to begin moving right after the first of the year."

Just a note: Our own Carole Jermyn was at Cookson Hills Center the day the sale went through and

DEAR SALLY STEWARDSHIP:

I haven't heard anything for a while. How are we coming along in paying down the mortgage on our new facilities?

A Little Concerned

Dear Concerned,

You're right. It's been awhile and I do have some information for you. First of all, yes, we have been making the nearly \$17,500 payments on time each month. We've not been without challenges some months, but God does provide. Just as Meri Whitaker noted, God does not necessarily give us a surplus, but He gives us ENOUGH! (We, of course, would be more comfortable with a surplus, but that kind of comfort doesn't seem to be among His promises.) Sometimes we have to borrow from other church accounts; then a bequest or a little larger gift comes along so that we can pay the borrowed amount back and move forward.

Jan Winter, our Financial Secretary, checked with Trust Management about the amount of principal still owed on the mortgage. As of December 10, we owed \$1,268,750. Of the original \$2.1 million borrowed in December 2004, **we have paid off \$831,250.** Because the loan was financed with bond sales rather than a traditional mortgage (which we couldn't find at the time), the amount of principal owed adjusts on June 10 and December 10 when bonds are retired. It is a 20-year mortgage, so we have a way to go. But as a congregation you have been generous and responsible.

You refer to our "new" facilities. You are no doubt a long-time member. We have reached a point where many who have joined us in recent years don't remember our church facilities being any other way. Some may not even realize that we do have a rather large mortgage payment to make each month and that many of the activities we now take for granted were not possible just eight years ago.

Your question also comes at a particularly good time. We are about to launch our fourth campaign for pledges to make those monthly payments for the next three years. Only with a large bequest or a very large response to the campaign can we be in a position to pay off the mortgage early. Don't groan--celebrate! This is a time to praise God for what He has done for us. It will be a time to look back to appreciate the benefits of using this wonderful building for the last seven plus years, and a time to consider what we could do if we were free of the mortgage. It's a time to build stronger connections with each other, to work with others with whom we are not yet well acquainted, to strengthen our faith and relationship with God.

You'll be hearing from your capital campaign committee soon!

In fact the manager has not had to "recruit" workers for a long time for what is ordinarily a very slow night! Until people quit showing up, we plan to continue and so does Applebee's.

So be sure to join us on **Monday, February 4**, between 4:00 and 9:00 PM at Applebee's at Paddy Creek Circle off Ridge Road West. Be there or be square--as someone used to say.

has had a tour of the restaurant.

In other news Meri wrote:

"The Christmas store is in full swing and people are lining up to take advantage of their shopping time. The food boxes are full and everyone who comes to the Christmas Store will also have everything that they need for Christmas dinner. The wood has been cut and we will deliver several ricks to needy families when we deliver Christmas boxes to our shut-ins.

"Both of my parents live in Oklahoma now and they are experiencing all of the difficulties of aging. We thought we were going to lose my Dad two weeks ago but he has rallied and seems to be doing ok for now. My Mom gets more and more confused everyday and we have to watch her very closely to make sure she takes her medicine and eats. She still comes to my house every night for dinner.

"I have the little boy back again that I had two years ago. He is five, now, and in kindergarten. He

came to live with me in early July. I get up at 5:30 every morning to pack a lunch and get him ready to catch the 7am bus. We do homework every night and he loves to ride his horse. He is a delight and I am enjoying every minute that I am able to spend with him. Being a "mom" at 60 does pose some challenges, however, but I am looking forward to Christmas with him.

"The church is still my fortress. The family that I have there is wonderful and so supportive. They are always willing to help in anyway that they can and I don't know what I would do without them.

"I hope that you are enjoying the grace and peace of this season and that every day is a celebration of the birth of our Lord and not just another day full of tasks and responsibilities. May this time of year remind you that God came to us and He is still with us, no matter what life throws at us. He has promised to carry our burdens, if we will let Him. He has promised to always love us

and God always keeps God's promises."

Just as a reminder, Aldersgate did play a small part in helping Cookson Hills Center to gather the original \$300,000 needed for the purchase of their new facility. Half the Annual Auction proceeds in both 2008 and 2009 were donated to Cookson Hills Center toward their building program. We also help to support Meri herself through our annual Easter offering each year. Your continued prayers and financial support are always needed.
