

From the Pastor

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I pray you've had a wonderful summer. It's been a great one at Aldersgate! We held our first community dinner in July. A team of seven adults went to Owego and made a difference for Christ helping to rehab a home that had been damaged two years ago in a flood. Several youth attended Kingdom Bound. Vacation Bible School was lots of fun and reached many children and families in our community. And that's just a few of the things.

As good as the summer has been, I'm excited about the fall when the church will be back in full swing. I look forward to several things in September.

September 8 is "Rally Day," the day when Sunday school starts the fall programming.

Some of our small groups that have not met regularly over the summer will be re-starting. It's a great time to get connected with a small group if you aren't already. We'll have tables set up in the Ide Center on September 8 to help you sign up for one of the existing groups or join a new group.

We plan to expand our reading program at English Village School and are looking for people who can spend a half hour to an hour each week reading with a young student. (If you are gone for a couple weeks from time to time, you can still be a part of this important ministry.) Those who worked with the students this past year made a difference in the lives of children and found it very rewarding. Sign up on the 8th or contact Pastor Anne.

Also on the 8th there will be an opportunity to learn more about RAIHN (Rochester Area Interfaith Hospitality Network) and their work with the homeless. You can join others from Aldersgate and serve in this important ministry. There is training for people wanting to serve in that ministry on Oct. 3 at 7 p.m. at the Summerville Presbyterian Church. On Sept. 8th, you can also sign up to help at the September Community Dinner.

On September 8 we start our emphasis on Focus on Our Future. We will be asking everyone to begin or to continue being intentional about praying for Aldersgate's future. As the world changes around us so, too, we need to change to embrace our future. Focus on Our Future will have two parts. There will be a yearlong emphasis called: "ALL IN." ALL of us will be challenged to INTERcede (pray) for people we know who are not part of a worshipping community and/or do not know Jesus. Those who can't name anyone outside of the church will be encouraged to get involved in activities that help them meet

Prayer Chains



From the Pastor of Visitation and Membership Care

Dear Aldersgate Friends,

September is the beginning of a new year in schools, in Sunday school, as well as a new program year in the church.

With this month, comes many opportunities and challenges. In all, a sense of humor will help us meet the challenges. Laurie Copeland shared with us an excerpt from her book *Humor for a Teacher's Heart* in the *Joyful Noiseletter* (used by permission). It is entitled:

Principal Gets Last Laugh

How do teachers strike that delicate balance between maintaining classroom control, having fun with their students, and not pulling out their chalk-dusted hair in the process? Bill Barker instinctively knew how to accomplish that difficult task.

As a teacher and principal at the elementary, high school, and college levels, he combined his sense of humor with his disciplinary obligations.

After he retired, Bill was asked to be an interim principal at Greece Olympia High School, where he had taught many years earlier. The administrators knew of his love for the students and his silly shenanigans that made school a fun place to attend, and they were having serious discipline problems. Bill was the man for the job.

One day Bill was walking down the hallway toward his office when a pungent smell drifted out of the boy's bathroom: cigarette smoke. He immediately detoured into the tiled room.

A lone young man was there, quickly stuffing something into his jeans pocket. He looked so guilty that Bill's scheming sense of humor took over.

He engaged him in a lengthy conversation as smoked curled up and out of the student's pocket. The boy became increasingly uneasy, rocking from one foot to the other.

Finally, faced twisted, he let out a yelp and yanked his hand from his pocket, dragging with it the smoldering remains of a Lucky Strike. It was weeks before the student could see any humor in his trip to the bathroom. But ultimately he did – and thought twice before ever lighting up again!

Sometimes being a good teacher means simply knowing how to outwit 'em.

As each of us face a new September, let's keep a good sense of humor in whatever we face!

some new people. Step Two is to INvest in the lives of those we are praying for. Spend time with them. Get to know them as you pray for them. Then at some point, we trust that God will provide an opportunity to INvite them to worship or another church activity. As a church we will covenant to help you INtroduce them to Christ and INclude and INVolve them in the life of the church. It's something ALL of us can be a part of. Our work isn't done until ALL are IN Christ Jesus. Jesus calls us to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

In addition to starting to pray for the people you name for "ALL IN," each family will receive a copy of

"Remember the Future" by Bishop Robert Schnase. This is an exciting 28-day devotional leading us to pray for the church and change. The Church Council thinks it is such a good book that they want everyone to read and pray through it. We will add short-term weekly "Feedback Forums for our Future" so everyone will have a chance to talk about what they are reading and praying about. Those who are in small groups and Adult Sunday School classes will be doing the same thing during September and October. Forums, groups, and classes will be asked to record the main things that come out of each session that they want to share with the Church Council.

I pray you will take the time to be a part of this important time in the life of our church.

Our thanks go to all those who have faithfully been bringing in supplies for School, Health, and Layette Kits for the United Methodist Committee on Relief. We do still need more supplies of all kinds. The next big task will be to put the kits together ready to send to the Cortland HUB of Mission Central.

Come one; come all! Kit assembly night will be **Thursday, September 26**, at the UMW General Meeting. Our goal is to complete at least 100 School Kits, 200 Health Kits, and 50 Layettes—more would be nice. We have tasks for those who need to sit as well as those who prefer to work the assembly line. Men, youth, and children are as welcome as the women who usually attend. Children as young as six have helped in the past.

Shopping lists are on the Mission Counter in the Gathering Space. Check the bulletin each week to see what supplies are still needed. Additional supplies may still be brought that evening. Any “leftovers” will be sent along to fill kits assembled at Mission Central.

The evening will begin with a light soup, salad, and dessert supper at **6:15 p.m.**, although work will start as soon as people arrive. Before the close of the evening, there will be a brief business meeting primarily to formally approve our Pledge to Mission for 2014.

The **cost of the supper** continues to be just **\$3.00 per person** payable at the door. Please do **sign up** on the bulletin board in advance, however, so that we know how many places to set at the table.

The money raised by this event helps the Missions Committee to fund our commitments to Greece area social service agencies such as Mission Share. The UMW uses their portion to help fund White Gifts and to make contributions to other church and area ministries.

Mission News

Update From Mission Central

Mission Central is a warehouse located in Mechanicsburg, PA, that is sponsored by the Susquehanna Annual Conference to serve this Northeastern region. In recent years they have established HUBs at locations around the area to serve as collection and distribution points. (We use the HUB at the Cortland UMC.) The supplies and kits that are collected for the United Methodist Committee on Relief are shipped directly to disaster sites or sent to the Sager-Brown UMCOR warehouse in Louisiana. We have been involved with Mission Central mostly through our collection of supplies for School, Health, and Layette Kits.

To give you an idea of the size of the operation, for Sandy Relief alone Mission Central sent 5,800 cleaning buckets, over 50,000 lbs. of other goods, and \$37,000. The "other goods" included items like replacement computers for a Learning Lab from the Computer Ministry at Mission Central, new and used clothing, baby supplies, and household appliances.

A recent newsletter reported that this month they sent 324 cleaning buckets for the flooding in Oneida, NY. They transferred 936 cleaning buckets to the Mission Barn in Castle, PA, and sent a 53' trailer of kits to Sager-Brown. Included in the latter load were 17,871 Health; 1,180 Birthing; 741 School; 2,160 Layette; and 3,879 unverified School Kits. They are currently preparing for a September shipment to Ghana.

Where do they get all these kits? From lots of churches like Aldersgate that make a regular commitment to use the resources God has given them to serve others in this ministry. By working together, we make a massive difference in the lives of others.

Red Bird Mission School Renamed

The Red Bird Mission board of directors voted in May to change the name of the school to Red Bird Christian School in order to project the purpose and mission of the school more clearly. After an accreditation review by Christian Schools International last spring, the school was awarded full accredited status. It is still, of course, a United Methodist school and part of Red Bird Mission.

You can continue to support Red Bird Christian School by collecting and bringing your Campbell's Soup Company "Labels for Education" symbols and the General Mills Boxtops for Education to the green box on the Missions

Counter. This collection helps the school to acquire much needed school equipment and supplies.

Stories From Mission Share

Occasionally when the Advisory Board meets, Mission Share Director Tom Hakes relates some personal stories of the impact of the ministry. Recently he told us about Ruby and Angela (names changed). Ruby is a grandmother who has custody of three of her grandchildren. She lives in a tiny house and sacrifices many luxuries to care for the children. When she first came to Mission Share, she was completely overwhelmed and needed help with a number of home projects. Mission Share was able to arrange for a youth group to help, and Ruby and her grandchildren have been regularly attending one of the sponsoring churches.

Angela was a recent widow with no children and only one close relative, a sister. Overwhelmed and depressed, she needed help with food and projects around the house. Mission Share provided workers to install vinyl soffits and paint the exterior of her house. She has not yet made a commitment to the Lord, but Mission Share is continuing to demonstrate the love of God in tangible ways.

The Summer 2013 newsletter (copies on the Mission Counter) called attention again to the uses of the new box truck. The volunteers at Mission Share have been able to pick up couches, beds, and household appliances from donors and deliver them to people who need them. Mission Share has no space for storage; but, if you have a piece of still usable furniture and don't need it moved immediately, let them know and they will find a home for it. They then can pick it up and deliver it the same day!

Dear Sally Stewardship,

We have a lot more space to heat – and now to cool – with the added facilities. Isn't that costing quite a bit of money? Is anyone looking to see if we can find some savings in utility and maintenance costs?

Cost Conscious

Dear Cost Conscious,

The Trustees are on it! We've been getting regular reports at Church Council about some of the changes they are making. Last winter they changed the sources of our electric and gas supply. By comparing invoices, they calculated that they reduced the electric supply cost by 44%, resulting in a total electric reduction of over 27% (distribution costs are from RG&E and remain the same) with about a \$400 savings that month. The gas supply cost was reduced by 38.3%, which could result in a dollar savings of about \$400-\$750 a month during the heating season based on last winter's heating invoices.

If you are wondering why you found the Ide Center a little cool last winter or may have been a little warm at times in the sanctuary this summer, the Trustees have been working to find optimum settings for the thermostats so that heating is not turned up too soon or too high and the cooling temperature not set too low. The thermostats are programmable and they do check the activities in each area for the week before setting the temperatures.

Why is it taking so long to get the elevator fixed? Again, as urgent as the need is, they are trying to do some comparison shopping both to find which company can do the job well at the best price and to determine just exactly what it is in the computer board that needs to be fixed.


None of this is to suggest that previous Trustees were less careful. Each class of Trustees has had a different skill set from which we have benefited, whether it's in repairing equipment, recruiting volunteers for clean-up days, understanding how the water and heating work, etc. We have been fortunate to have some who have continued to be active long after their specified assignment was completed.

The next time you talk with the Trustees, be sure to thank them for their service! We have been blessed with committed servants.




Successful Vacation Bible School Week in August
