


## Prayer Chains Being Revised



Dear Aldersgate Family,

Last Sunday I preached on the topic of gratitude and reminded us all that saying “thank you” is always a statement of: 1. Character, 2. Faith, 3. Grace, and 4. Worship. This is true of our words, our gifts and our commitments.

The film does end with a hopeful message: the victims can be set free and go on to live extraordinary lives. Recognition of the problem is growing and the fight to stop this evil is increasingly effective. Shown on CNN more than a year ago, last fall it was also shown on WXXI and at the Little Theater.

After time for discussion, we will hold a short business meeting before adjourning to work on our needlework projects: school bags, baby gowns, Warm-Up Rochester afghans, children’s quilts, etc., until 2:30-3:00 p.m.

## Morning Circle Will Prepare Baskets for Shut-Ins — Donations Welcomed!

Join the members on **Tuesday, November 19**, in the Ide Center at 11:00 a.m. to help **prepare holiday baskets** for shut-ins who are part of our church family. To be sure we have a variety of items, we ask that those who are willing to bring items for the baskets sign up on the Opportunities Board with your name and the item you are able to contribute. Then we may be able to use UMW money allocated to the Morning Circle to purchase additional gifts. To be quite clear, the sign-up sheet is not for attendance purposes, since some people may not be able to attend but may still wish to contribute. For the first three Sundays in November there will be a large basket on the Missions Counter in which you may leave your donations before the meeting.

**Some of the suggested items** include *packets of tissue, anti-bacterial hand sanitizer, playing cards; wrapped hard candy (regular and sugar-free), cookies, and gum; packaged chips, pretzels, or crackers; pocket calendars; pens; plastic rain scarves; small devotional books; stamps, notepaper; postcards, tea (regular or herbal); lotion; combs or brushes; toothbrushes/toothpaste; and book-marks.* This is not intended as a comprehensive list, nor will all baskets be alike.

Join us both in contributing items and in assembling the baskets to remind these friends that we are still thinking of them.

- This year we assembled and delivered 200 health kits, 101 school kits, 50 layette kits, and 42 pillowcase dresses for the United Methodist Committee on Relief.

### Election Day Bake Sale Supports Community Dinners

We are required by law to purchase the desserts we serve at the monthly Community Dinners, but we can help to support those dinners with our home baking for the **Election Day Bake Sale on November 5**. Much of the food served at the dinners is donated by area businesses or church members, but some supplies need to be purchased. To provide a dedicated source of funds to support the dinners, the Missions Committee this year decided to designate the funds from the Election Day Bake Sale for this purpose.

So, once again we call on our excellent Aldersgate bakers to help us out. We have a reputation to uphold. People in our area come in expecting to find good, fresh baked goods to take to work as a snack, dessert for supper, or refills for their freezers for the upcoming holidays. **Pies, small cakes, cupcakes, cookies, brownies, breads**, etc. all find a home if we have them for sale. Be sure to mark on your donation what kind it is and whether or not it contains nuts.

And for the rest of you, after you vote on **November 5**, be sure to stop by the church to see what is available. You may even want to come in more than once because new pies and cookies have a way of appearing throughout the day. Christmas crafts will also be available for sale. The sale will open at 7:00 in the morning and continue until all is sold or it's 6:30 p.m.

There is a sign-up sheet on the Opportunities Board for those of you who can contribute home baked goods or can help staff the sale.

### "Food for Friends" on November 24

You can bring canned and boxed food for the Greece Food Shelf throughout the year and it is delivered to them regularly. The Greece Food Shelf volunteers keep track of how many pounds of food come from each source. On October 14, they reported that **so far in 2013** Aldersgate had donated a total of **1,767 pounds** of food. The community's thanks go to all of you who have been faithful in bringing food each week.

However, the Missions Committee selects four Sundays a year as "**Food for Friends**" **Sunday**, days on which we place a **special emphasis** on bringing in food for the

hungry families in our community. For the **Sunday before Thanksgiving, November 24**, we ask you to bring a bag of groceries to help fill their shelves.

If you have been reading the paper or watching the news, you know that with the shutdown, government surplus supplies are not being sent to Foodlink, the main source for area food banks. At the same time there is an increasing number of hungry seniors and children particularly. This is one very important way we can show our love for others. The ushers will remind you the Sunday before by distributing grocery bags as you leave the sanctuary. The community in need counts on your continued support.

### Remember St. Pauly's Shed

The St. Pauly's shed at Greece United Methodist Church raises money every month for the Greece Churches Habitat project. It is a good place to donate clothing – if you can't wait for the Rummage Sale. Please remember, however, that they do not take other household items like furniture, appliances, etc. All those items have to be placed in the dumpster by the church liaisons who check the shed before the St. Pauly's truck comes to pick up the clothing. Your donated items and your discretion are appreciated.
