

From the Pastor

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Spring cleaning can be a spiritual exercise. The Tuesday small group just started a study called *Satisfied*. Its focus is discovering contentment in a world of consumption. Most of us don't even realize how much stuff we accumulate. The "homework" for the first week asked us to count our shoes and our shirts just to prove the point. Yikes! What an eye opener. I confess I tried to count shoes (which includes dress shoes, casual shoes, boots, sports shoes, sandals and flip-flops, slippers, and more). I have over 45 pair of shoes and I'm not sure I counted them all. I didn't even try to count shirts (which included sweaters, sweatshirts, tee shirts, dress shirts, and more.) I decided I didn't have time because there are so many! Granted some of the shoes and shirts were purchased eons ago. Hey, they still fit and maybe I'll want to wear them again. It's a great excuse to keep things around. The sad part of this is before spring is over, I'm likely to be tempted to buy another pair and can always find a way to justify it. The question is would my life be any less happy if I only had, say, 25 pairs of shoes?

The Bible is full of verses that warn us that an abundance of things will not make us happy. Some Bible passages make most of us uncomfortable like this one from Acts 4:32 (NLT): "All believers were united in heart and mind. And they felt that what they owned was not their own, so they shared everything they had." That's a whole different attitude than most of us have. We tend to think that we've earned what we have so it's ours. But we aren't content. Paul writes, "I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or want. I can do all this through him who gives me strength." (Phil. 4:11b-13)

With God's help, we can learn to be content. It may not come easily, but most of us can learn to live with less so we can share more with others. The second part of the homework assignment was to give something of value away. It can be something you haven't used for a while but still someone else might be able to use and enjoy. I used this assignment to start "spring cleaning" by setting aside several things to donate to the rummage sale at the end of the month and made a promise to God and myself to look for more things to add to it. For my spiritual (and economic) health the other thing I need to do is resist the urge to replace them with new things. Then money I "save" by not making a purchase that in truth I can live well without can be better used by God as I give it back to God through my Sunday offering. I am convinced that living more simply will bring greater joy than all the things I have and that God will give me strength to live it out.

I encourage you to count your shoes (or shirts), give something of value away, and see what God might do. Consider your spring cleaning a spiritual exercise that can bless you and others.





From the Pastor of Visitation and Membership Care

Dear Aldersgate Family and Friends:

As I pen this note for the *Hinge* we are getting ready to start our trip back to Rochester. While attending the Ash Wednesday service at St. Luke's UMC, we realized that we are beginning the season of reflection on the death and resurrection of our Lord. We are anxious to get back to Aldersgate and share this Holy Season with you.

We have enjoyed the pansies, petunias and many other flowers during our Florida stay. However, most years we especially enjoy the fresh foliage and many flowering trees as we drive north. (We wonder if they will be blossoming this year.) This reminded me of an item that appeared in the *Joyful Noiseletter* (used by permission) entitled:

THERE OUGHT TO BE A MOTHER'S MONTH

I'm a fortunate man. In the course of my time, I've had a close relationship with two mothers. One gave existence to my life. The other gave life to my existence.

Audry Mae Brown became Mrs. George A. Goldtrap, Sr. and consequently my birth mother. I'm grateful. She was the source of my earliest recognition of life's values...from the simplest recognition of the beauty of a buttercup, the magnificence of a symphony and the priceless nature of human life with its values and purposes.

My mother wasn't perfect. She even let me see her flaws. She showed me mine. But the love in our home was not scored like grades at school. It was etched into our hearts with the lasting effect of a chisel into granite.

I enjoyed the benefits of this motherly relationship for 21 years.

Peggy Sue Garrett became Mrs. George A. Goldtrap, Jr. and consequently the mother of my children... and the mother of others who unfortunately had temporarily lost their mother.

I'm equally grateful for this second relationship with a mother. She expanded my recognition of life's

values and helped me to survive their ever-changing nature.

This second relationship with a mother is a longer and closer one. It too exposes flaws...but enclosed in love, grows on the strength of its own existence until somewhere on the journey the relationship becomes self-sustaining.

With Peggy I learned to wait...to appreciate...to expect...to behold...and most importantly...to learn.

Peggy also helped me realize there was value in a willingness to unlearn...to recognize change as challenge, not fear it as an enemy...to see criticism or momentary rejection as a speed bump, not a stop sign.

Peggy also taught me to love. It began with a first kiss...it continues as understanding...it will endure as acceptance, without fear, of the things we cannot yet control.

Thank you, mothers. The cord cut, but no wise mother would have it otherwise. Good mothers teach us to depend on a different life support, and we're the better for it.

It has always bothered me that we have a whole month in honor of pickles and only one day in honor of mothers. Shouldn't it be the other way around?

I'll conclude my *Hinge* reflections with two more Mother's Day quotes from the *Joyful Noiseletter*:

Overheard: An elderly man recalling his boyhood days, telling a friend, "I can remember the first time my mother taught me religion. She said, 'You better pray that jelly stain will come out of the carpet!'"

"Your readers might enjoy an old saying my Mother taught me: 'Hearts like doors open with ease, with very, very little keys. Now don't forget that two of these are, 'Thank you' and 'If you please'."

The Annual Rummage Sale is set for **Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 5, 6 & 7**. For the first two days, items are sold individually, but Saturday is a bag sale day. We also sell baked goods on Thursday and Friday.

The Rummage Sale is a major fundraiser for the UMW, but it is also a whole church function. Half the money raised is used for our UMW program and mission projects and half is used to meet a need in our own church. This year we are designating \$1,000 of the church proceeds for the van needed for our Hispanic and youth ministries with the remainder going to the Building Fund.

Please bring **clean clothes in good condition** for men, women, and children in all sizes. It is especially helpful if the clothes are labeled for size. We sort by small, medium, large, and extra-large for men's, women's, boys' and girls' clothes. Other items that sell well include **toys, games, puzzles, books, dishes, glassware, pots and pans, knickknacks, pictures, lamps, seasonal decorations, jewelry, clothing accessories, tools, sports equipment** (no bowling balls or ski equipment!), **household furnishings and small appliances**. Bring only items that are **reasonably clean** and appliances that are in **working order**.

Donation drop-offs begin on Memorial Day, May 26. We will try to arrange help for you to get furniture or other large items to the church if needed. As useful as they are, we have found that hide-a-beds and sofas are usually heavier than we can manage. **Please bring all items no later than Wednesday morning, June 4**. Native American Ministries Sunday is May 4

Did you know that your special gift for ministries among Native Americans supports work here in Western New York as well as seminary scholarships for United Methodist Native Americans? About 119,000 members and 225 United Methodist churches in the United States identify themselves as Native American. Because Upper New York Annual Conference has substantial work among Native Americans, half our offering stays in our own annual conference. Your gift helps both those who are studying to become pastors as well as those they serve. Sticky Lips BBQ Continues as a Fundraiser for Greece Habitat for Humanity

Repeated successful fundraisers with Sticky Lips BBQ have led the Greece Coalition of Habitat for Humanity to approach them again to serve up their very popular dinners on **Thursday, May 22, at Hope Lutheran Church** on Vintage Lane. Take-out meals will be available from **3:30-6:30 p.m.** for **\$13.00 each** and include BBQ chicken and ribs, macaroni salad, and cornbread.

Pre-order tickets will be available after each service starting **May 4** from **Bud Kress**, who is our Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity representative. Those of you unable to reserve meals in advance, plan to go early to be sure to get a dinner. (The coalition does need to sell 250 advance tickets to be sure that Sticky Lips will cook on-site and make walk-in dinners possible.)

The Greece Coalition now has nearly \$25,000 in its treasury toward the sixth house. We need closer to \$65,000. We can help move this very important project along and enjoy some good eating at the same time. Be sure to tell your friends.

Growing Needs Felt in Calls to Mission: Share for Service

The number of individuals provided with food in January 2014 was 962, an increase of 163 over 2013. The number provided clothing increased by 150. In February the 687 people provided food was an increase of 104; and the 621 given clothing was an increase of 242. Based on the

entry interviews, this likely represents both an increase in need and an increase in the awareness in the community of the services provided at Mission: Share. The Greece Food Shelf and Mission: Share are in frequent contact with each other both to avoid duplication of services and to make referrals to the other when one can't provide the needed service.

One new development at Mission: Share is the requirement that clients complete a five-week financial literacy course by internet or phone to continue eligibility. (The requirement is waived when it's deemed inappropriate, e.g., senior citizens who already know how to pinch a penny twice before it leaves their hands.) The course is made available by a financial advisor who regularly volunteers her services to Mission: Share clients.

Because of our long-term commitment to the Greece Food Shelf, Aldersgate has not been asked to participate in their regular food drives. **Our commitment** instead is to provide much-needed **feminine products and toilet tissue**. Those items are necessary to the largely female clientele and often too expensive for their budget. Because of your generosity, we have been able to deliver a good supply every month, sometimes twice a month. In spite of the quantities delivered, our volunteers do find the shelves empty or nearly empty each visit, so that our arrival is a most welcome "just in time" event.

Thank you for your continued effort to bring toilet tissue and feminine products to fill the blue Mission: Share box behind the Welcome Table. Keep up the good work!

Golden Cross Supports Ministry in Retirement Community

There are six United-Methodist-related senior-living facilities in the Upper New York Annual Conference, one of which is Wesley Gardens located on East Avenue here in Rochester.

The Golden Cross offering each year on Mother's Day helps to support chaplains working in these communities to offer visitation, Bible study and worship opportunities. Their programs are essential to the total well-being of the residents. Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally,

Why do we have so many “special” offerings? I do trust the church that the money is going to meet valid needs, but I’m finding it difficult to keep up. I made pledges to the Building Fund last May and to the church budget last fall and I feel a bit guilty about not responding to all these specials, too. Help!

Dear Concerned,

Believe me, I do understand. I have finally learned to say “no” to telephone solicitations and to toss out the pleas that come in the mail (except those I already support) without feeling too guilty. I think I’m on everybody’s list. Because the church is fairly transparent about how and what missions are supported, I do trust their requests. But respond to all of them? Most of us have to use some discernment.

How did we get here? At some point in the distant past – or so I’m told – the church had a single budget to support all its ministries. As funds got tighter or the number of ministries increased, people realized that some ministries were more “appealing” than others, say a youth program vs. garbage collection. (Although garbage collection could become VERY appealing in short order if we didn’t pay the bill!) New ministries are sometimes approved if they can generate their own income.

Keep in mind that it’s not just the church doing this. Remember when the Community Chest or United Way covered most of the appeals in town? The practice is hardly unique to Aldersgate or The United Methodist Church.

What to do? Our first obligation is to support our local church and through it our basic denominational ministries. Biblically the tithe or the first 10% of income (crops and animals in the agricultural society of the Old Testament) was given for support of the temple and the

priests who maintained it and led worship. Offerings or additional tithes were designated for other purposes, for example, a service to thank God for a special blessing or care for widows and orphans.

That makes sense. If we read the Old Testament, we see over and over what happened to the religious life of the Israelites if they neglected the temple and its priests. We can’t offer a youth program or a community dinner – both popular at Aldersgate – if we don’t maintain our staff or keep up our facilities or pay the mortgage!

So, first, we complete our pledges or designate our giving to the regular budget that covers staff, program, and facility upkeep and to the Building Fund from which the mortgage is paid. That’s basic. Then, if God has so blessed us, we give further prayerful consideration to the many requests for “second-mile” giving. *No one is expected to respond to every request.* God really does call some ministries to our attention more than others and gives us a way to respond. And he doesn’t call everyone to the same ministry. If it’s important to Him and if we are paying attention, it will get covered. Many times it is through the accumulated small donations of many people; other times it is from a single large gift.

As you read through this *Hinge*, note that many features, such as the pastors’ letters, Christian Education activities – and the *Hinge* itself – are supported by our budget. Many others are reports of ministries accomplished through second-mile giving. Read through them with a sense of blessing. They are all opportunities for us to see how God is working and how he is calling us to serve not just with our financial resources, but also with our time and talents. If God is calling, there is a way to answer!


