



From the Pastor of Visitation and Membership Care

Dear Aldersgate Family and Friends:

May 10, 2014

On July 1, 1950 I was appointed to my first pastoral appointment in Waterloo, Iowa. In that occasion my parents gave me a copy of the record book published by Cokesbury entitled, "My Pastoral Record."

I have faithfully kept that record as I have served 11 churches, officiated at 403 weddings, 1,025 funerals, and preached 3,272 sermons in the last 64 years.

When I retired the first time in 1997, Bill Burdick asked if I'd like to help out at Aldersgate for about 10 hours a week as visitation Pastor. I agreed and was hired "for a little while" 17 years ago.

Now that I'm 86 years old, I've decided that it is time to retire a second time.

So, if the Staff-Parish Relations Committee approves, as of July 1, 2014, I will no longer be a part of the paid staff – but will be a volunteer. (See copy to the right of the letter submitted to SPRC, the Church Council, and Pastor Anne.)

To Whom It May Concern:

Seventeen years ago I retired from being a full time pastor. One month after retirement I was employed as a part time Pastor of Visitation and Membership Care here at Aldersgate UMC and I have enjoyed serving in this capacity these many years.

After much prayerful consideration, I've come to the decision that it is now time to start winding down a bit. Therefore, I would like to retire from this paid position as of June 30, 2014.

As I have discussed with Pastor Anne, I would be happy to continue on in a part time unpaid position as a "Pastor Emeritus" or whatever term you would like to use. In this capacity I would be happy to preach occasionally or make hospital calls, etc. as needed.

I would be happy to discuss this proposal with your committee and/or Pastor Anne if you wish. Thank you for your consideration.

Update on the *Remember the Future*

Study

A team made up of a person from each of the groups that did the study took all your input and made a list of what we consider "big rocks" (the things that we should focus on as we move forward). We came up with a list of seven "big rocks." The team met with a consultant, Aaron Bouwens, the Upper New York Annual Conference Director of Vital Congregations. With his help we chose one to focus on during the next 12 months or so. We selected developing a Discipleship Program that will provide a clear path for those who come into the church or are already part of the church to grow in faith

and discipleship. We decided to work on this first, because without it, we believe that it will be harder to retain people and help them become the disciples God intends them to be.

If you have some thoughts about what should be included in a discipleship program, write them down and get them to Dennis or Pastor Anne.

This is just the first "big rock" to be addressed. When we have the discipleship program in place we will move on

Asbury Camp and Retreat Center will once again host Mission u for Region 3 of the Upper New York Conference United Methodist Women and United Methodist Church held July 17-19. "How Is It With Your Soul?" will be the Spiritual Growth Study taught by Kathy Burkhart,

an active United Methodist Woman from Pennsylvania. The Rev. Sewing Up a Storm!

On the second Monday of every month, you are invited to join the **Sew 'n Sews**, who meet from 1:00 - 2:30 in the sewing room. We do sew up a storm! Many of our sewing projects will help those affected by natural disasters. So far we have made 95 school bags, 27 layette gowns, 73 receiving blankets, 102 baby washcloths, and 2 baby sweaters, which means we have a good start on our UMCOR kits that we will assemble at our first evening meeting in the fall. We will put bins out in July to start collecting supplies for school kits, and also for the health kits and layette kits. In addition to this, our nimble and nifty knitters have made 14 afghans to donate to homeless shelters, and 5 prayer shawls to give to members of our own congregation.

Our Annual Rummage Sale is June 6-8

Now is the time to clear out cupboards, closets, sheds, and basements. Don't forget to look for items that may just be sitting around in plain sight not being used. Don't wait until June 8 and wish you had done more!

The biggest recycling event of our church year starts **Monday, May 26**, when you may **drop off** those bags of clothes and boxes of books, toys, and household items you have been saving for the Annual Rummage Sale. Please bring only items that are **clean** and appliances that are **in working order** and bring them in through the north doors of the Ide Center during the day. We do not take hideabeds. As useful as they are, they are too heavy for most of us to move. Also, please **don't bring bowling balls or ski equipment**. Neither seems to sell and no one will pick them up except the trash company.

If you need help with larger items, please call Gretchen Hughes (865-2822) by May 31. She will try to make arrangements for pickup. If any of you have trailers, vans, or trucks and could **help with pickup**, please let her know, also.

Please try to **bring your donations no later than noon on Wednesday, June 4**. We would like to finish setting up for the sale by the end of that afternoon so that all the workers can get a good night's rest before the sale begins.

The hours of the sale are as follows: **Thursday and Friday from 9:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. and Saturday (the Bag Sale) from 9:00 a.m. – Noon.**

We need your help with sorting and pricing the incoming donations and with staffing each day of the sale. We'll be working from 9:00 a.m. till 4:00 p.m. every day except Sunday. The sign-up sheet has just morning and afternoon shifts, but come even if you only have an hour or two to help out on any given day. We never seem to run out of work. Please note that on **Monday and Tuesday, June 2 & 3**, we will have **evening work** hours from 6:30 – 9:00 p.m. if some of you sign up in advance. (Go early to Ruby Tuesday's!)

People are needed to come in promptly at **noon on Saturday to help clean up**. We will also pack up the clothing to take to the St. Pauly's collection box at Greece UMC to benefit our next Greece Habitat project. We need those of you with pickups and vans again to help take the rest of the leftover items to the Goodwill Store.

We also **need your fine baked goods**. Our bake sales have become a significant "profit center" with regular customers! The sign-up sheet has space for fresh goods **Thursday and Friday**. Pies, cakes, cookies, brownies, fudge, cupcakes, breads, and homemade candy all sell well. We sell goodies like cookies and brownies packaged by the dozen, half-dozen, or pairs. We often slice larger cakes and sell them piece by piece to people who don't think they can eat a whole cake. Please label your baked goods so that we know what kind of cookies, etc. we are selling and whether or not the recipe includes nuts.

Where does the money go? Half is used to support the mission projects of the UMW. Not only do we support national and international mission work through our annual Pledge to Mission, we also donate to a number of local ministries, such as Mission Share, Greece Food Shelf, and our church Christmas White Gifts program. The other half again is designated for our church, with \$1,000 going toward purchase of the van for Hispanic ministries and the remainder to the Building Fund.

Get on board! The Rummage Sale is a lot of work, but it's also a lot of fun and a great way to get acquainted. See you there!

Second-Quarter Food Drive Set

Families whose children normally get free/reduced-price lunches at school struggle to put enough food on the table for three meals in the summer. Many seniors are having difficulty making their pension/social security checks last the whole month. People who are no longer eligible for unemployment assistance but yet don't have jobs need help. These are just three of the situations encountered by those who seek help at the Greece Food Shelf in the summer.

Our next major **Food for Friends** Drive is scheduled for June 22. Grocery bags will be distributed the Sunday before to remind you to make an extra effort. Among the


If we all make the effort to bring a bag of groceries, we will make a big difference in the lives of our neighbors.

Our Response to Recent U.S. Disasters

The best way to help victims of the recent floods in New York, tornadoes in the Midwest and South, and wildfires in the West is to contribute to the United Methodist Committee on Relief. The staff members are currently on site assessing needs to find how best their efforts can be used for immediate relief and for long-term recovery. Your check payable to **Aldersgate UMC** marked "**USA Disaster Relief**" or your gift in a pew envelope so marked will go directly to UMCOR.



Be thinking ahead also to **our annual collection of supplies for Health Kits**, the kit most often distributed during relief efforts; and start purchasing washcloths, towels (15"x 25" or 17"x27"), sturdy combs, toothbrushes, soap, fingernail files or clippers, and plastic bandages. Our efforts each year help to keep the warehouse shelves filled for immediate shipment to disaster sites. We will start collecting in July.
