### Did You Know . . .

- This year we assembled and delivered 200 health kits, 100 school kits, and 45 layette kits for the United Methodist Committee on Relief.
- Four members of our Reading Circle received certificates for the UMW Reading Program at the District

- Our Aldersgate unit was also recognized for being a Five-Star Unit and a Gold Mission Today Unit.

### Crafts & Collectibles Proceeds Exceed Expectations

After expenses, the proceeds of our 7<sup>th</sup> Indoor Crafts & Collectibles Show totaled **\$2,413.33**, the highest ever. (One of these days we'll have to drop "Indoor" from the name; many members of our congregation weren't even here when we had an outdoor show.) We had a total of 33 different vendors plus the church craft booth over the two days, filling 37 spaces.

The proceeds were divided between the UMW and the church missions committee. The UMW will decide at its November General Meeting how much will go to each of our regular mission programs. The church missions money will be used primarily to complete our commitment to the support of Mission: Share.

We appreciate all those who stepped up to help. We had an excellent supply of baked goods and sold more lunches than ever. The church craft booth was well stocked. Notable this year was the help we received to set up for the show and to clean up afterwards because expanding into the sanctuary made the work more challenging.

We also thank everyone who took the time out of your busy schedules to shop. Your participation is key to our being able to continue successfully. Without each and every one of you we could not carry out this project.

### **Fearless Giving**

Do you know the joy of selfless giving and love for others? True love doesn't calculate – it spends lavishly! Jesus drove this point home to his disciples while sitting in the temple and observing people offering their tithes. Jesus praised a poor widow who gave the smallest of coins in contrast with the rich who gave greater sums. How can someone in poverty give more than someone who has ample means? Jesus' answer is very simple: love is more precious than gold or wealth!

Jesus taught that real giving must come from the heart. A gift that is given with a grudge or for display loses its value. But a gift given out of love, with a spirit of generosity and sacrifice, is precious. The amount or size of the gift doesn't matter as much as the cost to the giver. The poor widow could have kept one of her coins, but instead she fearlessly gave away all she had.

We aren't asking you to give away all you have, but it's not too late to fearlessly turn in your financial commitment to Aldersgate for 2015.

Why do we have an annual finance campaign and get asked to make a pledge for all of next year? We may be moving and I don't know if I'll be able to pay a pledge all year. I understand that many churches don't use pledge programs, but rely on whatever comes in.

Dear Nervous,

Your uncertainty is understandable, and a good reason to think in terms of "fearless generosity." If we give only what we have to spare, or only what we think is "reasonable," where is the fearlessness? Where is the faith? That's why we also ask you first to pray about your

Credo (Confirmation Class 2014/2015) is off and running, meeting on the 1st and 3rd Sundays at 11 a.m. We have awesome kids! Elijah, Zach, Matthew, Kennedy, Michelle, Sammy, Marie. They're the best kids ever! They are great at eating pizza, great at playing 4 square, and great at remembering Bible verses! We all know now that to be a "Disciple" of Jesus means to follow Him. We will all have to WORSHIP Him, LEARN about Him, and SERVE Him to be true disciples.

It will be a great year; one that we will all remember and treasure! Please, everyone, pray for the Confirmands, mentors (they are absolutely the best!), and the leaders.

pledge and to follow God's leading. We must recognize that God does challenge our assumptions about what we "are able" to do and asks us to trust Him to provide.

Other churches do have different practices. Frankly, tithing is more widely practiced in some areas of our country than in others, making church financial support a little easier. It is God's plan after all. (We actually do have a fair number of tithers.) There are churches that ask you to turn in your tax return annually to be sure that you are tithing. Some carry on fundraising year-round just to support their basic programs or issue regular calls to pay bills. Some pass the plate repeatedly in the Sunday service until they have enough. Some just cut staff and programs when there isn't enough money. There are probably more ways to approach this issue than I know about.

We choose to ask for pledges. Pledges give you an opportunity to demonstrate your trust in God's ability to provide and allow us to trust Him in making plans for ministry for the year ahead. Even then, as you know, there are blips with unexpected expenses; but we really don't have to run a constant campaign for basic financial support. In our practical experience, most people pay pledges in full and don't only when there have been serious changes in their lives, such as needing to move. Even then, they often try to complete what they started.

Don't ask me to cite references, but I have also read in the books about church financing that churches with a pledge program get stronger financial support than those who do not.

Having pledges has allowed us to focus our special offerings and fundraising throughout the year largely on outreach such as support for Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity, Mission: Share, Meri Whitaker, the Greece Food Shelf, Christmas White Gifts, Mission Trips, etc. We've had some very tight moments – and indeed are not currently paying our apportionments in full – but one commitment we made as a church when we built the addition was to continue to reach out in mission rather than focus inward. That commitment and the facilities we built have allowed us to grow in that respect. That outreach is the reason many new people cite for choosing Aldersgate.

Even if we approach our pledges with some queasiness, count on God to teach us how to be fearless givers.

As we age we develop health issues and it is increasingly difficult to get things done that were once routine and enjoyable. I was unable to do the yard work at my home this year. It was a concern that the work would not get done.

With God's help I recently met Ken and Nancy Rex from your Helping Hearts program. It has been a pleasure getting to know them. They completed all the work they said they would do. They were very respectful at all times. They always asked before they did something to be sure that the work would be done to my satisfaction.

The yard work had gotten out of hand for me to do. The flowerbeds were all overgrown and full of weeds. With winter coming I was worried that I would not be able to clean the yard up before the snow season started. Ken and Nancy Rex from Helping Hearts came to my rescue and cleaned up the entire yard. Now it looks much neater and cleaner. They did an outstanding job and they did just as I would have done myself if I were able. They even put covers on the window wells to keep the rain and melting snow from getting into the house as it had done in the past.

There was also an issue with finding someone to maintain the furnace who would be trustworthy and would not try to sell me something I did not need or could not afford. Tyler from Triple-O Mechanical is taking care of the heating and air conditioner. He is a very pleasant young man and seems to be very honest and trustworthy. If possible, please put your donations into tied or closed bags. Your donated items and your discretion are appreciated.


### **United Methodist Student Day Nov. 30**
