Life with God doesn't have to be the same old, same old (although at times there is comfort in that). Life with God can always be exciting, fresh and new. What do you see God doing around you?

It's my prayer that during this season you will have a fresh epiphany of our loving Lord!

Dear Sally Stewardship,

I know we worry from time to time about paying the church mortgage or paying our bills, especially when something unexpected comes up. If you don't mind my asking, what did the end of the year look like for us?

Dear Concerned,

Thank you. Those of us on Finance and Stewardship Committees do appreciate your concern. Better concerned than oblivious. And, no, we don't mind your asking. You clearly care.

Our Financial Secretary, Jan Winter, reported at Church Council in January that Building Fund donations totaled \$194,561.61 for 2014, and Current Expense Offerings (giving toward ongoing ministries or "the budget") totaled \$285,172.50. The combined total of \$479,734.11 is a pretty impressive figure.

Had we not received an additional \$50,000 from the John Haldane estate, however, we would have had great difficulty in meeting the monthly mortgage payment that is – need I remind you? – still close to \$17,500 a month. It's an example of how important it can be to make arrangements to leave a legacy of giving to our church.

On the current expense side, our work areas as usual were very careful in their spending. However, one of the most significant reasons we were able to pay local bills was that we only paid \$29,900 or 78% of the \$38,717 apportionments or ministry shares due to the Upper New York Annual Conference. "Ministry Shares" is the new name given to support our District, Conference, and Denomination. We are not happy about this. From 1973-

2011 we were always able to pay our share in full. The figure looks high, but it is based on the financial strength (not our attendance) that we have demonstrated in past years. It may not seem like it, but we are one of the larger and stronger churches in the conference. (Our Hispanic Ministry alone is larger than many of the stand-alone churches in our district and contributes significantly to our budget.)

There are bright spots. Room rental income was up, and the rental of the house next door contributed to our income. Thanks to the energy and experience of Bob Thayer, we have begun to receive income from donated vehicles to support Trustee projects and the current expense budget. The success of both the Rummage Sale and the Auction made possible strong contributions to the Building Fund toward the mortgage. Ruby Tuesday's continues to work for us. The church van was paid for in full. It has been used for youth and mission trips and is now being used to transport members in need of transportation to both our 11:00 and 3:00 services. Our giving to missions remains strong – more on that another day. We've come through another year with the bills paid!

God does provide. (I know – God puts the money in our pockets first and we have to be willing to pass it on to the church!) But Aldersgate is an exciting place to be in ministry these days. The beginning of a new year is the time to ask ourselves, "Am I doing all I can to help this ministry grow with both my money and my service? Am I doing all I can to 'transform lives and serve Christ with joy?'" I hope you are as inspired as I am!

Dear Ken and Nancy,

I feel that the work done was very well done and thoroughly done.

This work was extremely important! We had no working furnace and a bathroom that was not working except for a toilet. Ken and his team (Nancy, Tyler, Andrea and Nick and others I do not know the names of) worked hard to make sure that the furnace was up and running before cold weather hit and we love our new shower. Both projects were necessary projects that we could not afford to hire anyone for and without the Helping Hands Ministry we would have suffered through this winter.

To me, this ministry and the people involved are like a small hug from God that reminded me I was not a lost and forgotten sheep. I had tried all the proper govt and social agencies, even begging family and friends. I felt like I was speaking to walls. Then I prayed for God to take over, I cried as I prayed because I had reached that point where I felt there was no way up. The very next day (no joke) I received a call from Ken Rex, saying they had heard we may be a family in need of their help. I am not alone in this need. There are many, many people and families hurting and feeling lost. The Helping Hands Ministry is a true blessing and as I got to know each of the members I met, I could tell it was a heartfelt blessing. Thank you again for all your help.

I think it is a wonderful expression of what being a Christian means. There was no judgment or any attempts to push anyone in my home to find God. Instead they showed with their actions and with prayer, what it means to live a Christian life. That is something I appreciate for a few reasons. I myself know God. My daughter prays but is not totally sure. But my son was a doubter, one of those people who says, if I cannot see it, it is not real. Now he is not sure, but is willing to accept there may be a God. For me this was a bigger gift than the furnace and bathroom (although I am still grateful for them). I think Helping Hands Ministry is truly a blessing that is guided by our Lord and I thank all of them and all of you for your prayers and well-wishes.

Work Task Needs and Wish List

Thank you all for helping completing a number of tasks in the past year. Following are Tasks and Wish List Items that the Trustees have identified as needs at Aldersgate. If you are willing to donate your gifts of time or talents to work on one or coordinate a small team for a project, please contact the Trustees so that materials and work can be coordinated and so we avoid duplicate effort. Contact Rich Mohrmann at 225-1526 or RMohrmann@rochester.rr.com, or Mike Smith at 865-3809.

- The exposed roof trusses at the front (east) and back end of the chapel need a second coat of paint in the spring.
- 2. Put a second coat of paint on the new south gutters and downspouts in the Spring.
- Sand, fill gouges, and refinish with polyurethane the Kitchen Doors to IDE, IDE Center side lower part of door, and then need hard clear plastic panel for outside of Kitchen Doors to IDE, to protect them from food carts scratching the doors.
- 4. For the Flood Lights shining on the outside front wall of the Sanctuary: In the Spring re-align the fixtures and then tighten the fasteners.

Greece Food Shelf

Marilyn Sobus reported that we collected a **total of 2,659 lbs. of food** for the Greece Food Shelf **in 2014**. That includes both our quarterly "Food for Friends" emphasis and our weekly collections. Your regularly remembering to include the Greece Food Shelf when shopping really adds up to important support for members of our community who face temporary food shortage crises. The Food Shelf also received a total of **\$951** from Aldersgate donations in addition to the \$300 sent by Aldersgate United Methodist Women in December.

The Church World Service **Crop Walk** for Hunger held last May raised **\$1,798** for the Greece Food Shelf. The financial donations help with the purchase of perishable foods like milk and bread for the clients of the Food Shelf. Joyce Farrokh will chair the event again in **2015**. Plan now to set aside the afternoon of **Sunday, May 3**, to participate in order to make this the best year ever!

- 9. Connect HVAC ventilation to Family Bathroom by Office Hallway.
- 10. Clean & paint the hallway outside of the Chapel and Room 8. (Holes are filled and sanded.)
- 11. Maintain air-controlled thermostat system for boiler heating system.
- 12. Sanctuary ceiling fans to help push heat downward during heating season.
- 13. Humidifiers for HVAC units for heating season in Sanctuary, Office, etc.
- 14. Add storm windows, or replacement windows to two outside facing windows of the Parlor.
- 15. Replacement windows for education wing.
- 16. Vestibule to improve heat and AC control into the Gathering Space Sanctuary.
- 17. Complete some painting on rental property house, such as the back wall under the gutter.
