### From the Pastor

Lent began on February 18 with the celebration of Ash Wednesday. Lent is the 40-day period (excluding Sundays) of preparation for Easter. Traditionally it is a time for self-examination and repentance (turning from sin and turning toward God). Many people "give something up" for Lent, sacrificing something that is important to them to help them focus on the sacrifice Jesus made in dying on the cross for everyone. Other people add elements to their devotional lives—additional personal prayer time, corporate worship, and/or service.

I encourage you to plan now to attend the special worship services during Holy Week: On Sunday, March 29 we will hold our annual Palm/Passion Sunday; on Maundy Thursday, April 2, at 7 p.m. we will celebrate the last supper; on Good Friday, April 3, at 7 p.m. we will take time to remember Jesus' suffering and death on the cross on our behalf. On Good Friday, there will also be a prayer vigil during the day. There will be more information about these things in the April *Hinge*.

This year our theme for Lent is "This Love Changes Everything." Sermons and Sunday school lessons will be focusing on this truth. If you haven't already done so, I encourage you to add the spiritual discipline of journaling to your devotional time during this season. There are prayer journals in the Gathering Space for you to use. If you choose not to journal, pick up a copy of the daily devotional, *The Nail*, and add it to your daily prayer time. Be sure pick up a bookmark and nail also available in the Gathering Space.

Observing Lent by taking time to focus on God's amazing love in Christ Jesus is vital to a truly joy-filled celebration of Easter. In Jesus Christ we know a love so great that he holds nothing back. Jesus Christ "who being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!" (Philippians 2:6-8) It is only by Jesus' sacrificial death that resurrection becomes possible.

I pray you will make a conscious effort to celebrate a Holy Lent, practicing the age old traditions of self-examination, confession, and repentance that ultimately leads to life in Christ now and forever.

## Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally Stewardship,

I'm new to attending church. I like being a part of Aldersgate, and I understand that it costs money to support our worship services, to keep the building warm, and to offer all the other programs I enjoy. I want to contribute, but I don't know where to start. How much should I be giving?

Dear Newby,

That's a good question. Thank you for asking. (Isn't that how responders start while they are stalling for a good answer during a Q & A?)

Seriously, it is a good question. And you are already a step ahead of many people in recognizing that staff, maintenance, and programs in church cost money. It is true that God is working behind the scene to see that our churches have the money they need. However, the money doesn't appear magically. If we are listening, he provides the prompts – as he is right now.

Biblical giving is both systematic and spontaneous. The Old Testament standard of regular giving is a tithe -10% – of our income off the top. Periodically a second and even a third tithe is called for to provide for the priests, the temple, and the poor. Special occasions had prescribed offerings. Then there are examples of spontaneous offerings, such as a call to bring gifts to help build the temple. (A couple of times so much came in that people were told to stop!)

The NIV Stewardship Study Bible quotes Andy Stanley, a well-known pastor and teacher, who likes to emphasize the New Testament verse, "Each man should give what

he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:7)

He explains that God "doesn't want you to give reactively. He wants you to go home, look at your bucket of seed, and determine in your heart how much you'd like to sow. He wants you to consider thoughtfully your current circumstances, your life, your potential, and your finances. He wants you to involve your family. He wants you to pray about it. And then he wants you to come up with a plan. It may be a percentage or an amount." (p. 599) He and other Christian financial writers use a number of "p" words to describe Godly giving: proportionate, planned, precommitted, priority, percentage, progressive, and prompted.

Whatever we decide to do, our generosity should be coupled with cheerfulness. (We used to say, "Give until it feels good.")

Supporting the church financially is more complicated than dividing up the cost among all those who attend. Our resources differ, and they will change over the course of our lives. But whatever our circumstances, Andy's advice will work. Prayer is the key word. God does know what you can do and will share that knowledge with you if you ask and then listen to the answer. And don't be surprised or let it scare you if it is more than you think you can give! God does like to challenge us.


### Christian Education

## Stewardship Update

## The Wearing of the Green...the Color of March

Green shamrocks were used by St. Patrick to explain the trinity to the pagan Irish. Through his evangelism, he became the patron saint of Ireland. The celebration on March 17<sup>th</sup> coincides with the date of his death, and originally began as a church festival with feasts and activities showcasing Ireland and its culture.

The 'wearing of the green' is more a national symbol. Green was worn by Irish nationalists who launched a rebellion against the British in the late 1790s. This color is worn as a symbol of their martyrdom.

But green is also associated with other events in March. Spring begins on March 20<sup>th</sup>, with hopefully, more green visible on the ground than white. And this year, we'll be waiving green reeds on Palm Sunday, March 29<sup>th</sup>.

During this Lenten period leading up to Palm Sunday and Easter, Anne's messages will be focusing on how God's love helps us to change our priorities. The message on March 15 will be from Galatians 5:13-14:

"For, brethren, ye have been called unto liberty, only use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another. For all the law is fulfilled in one word; even in this; thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

One of the ways we can serve others and show how God's love is alive is through the body of the church. This brings me to Stewardship's favorite topic, "The Sharing of the Green."

Our tithes and gifts freely given to the church provide the vital funding for Aldersgate to be able to reach out to others through the various ministries our members are involved in. Whether we like to think about it or not, the church requires a significant amount of money in order to pay the mortgage, provide light and heat, pay the salaries

of our small, but vital staff, cover our apportionments to the greater UM church, and pay all other expenses associated with worship (bulletins, projector lights, music, Christian education, just to name a few).

During Lent this year, prayerfully consider how God's love shapes your priorities around your financial giving to Aldersgate. Instead of giving

up chocolate or your daily Starbucks coffee for Lent, increase your weekly or monthly giving to the church by 2% - you may be surprised at how easy this is to do...and can continue even after Lent!

If you are already tithing, consider '2<sup>nd</sup> mile giving' toward the 'Projector Bulb Replacement' fund or the Building Fund.

"May the road rise up to meet you, may the wind be always at your back.

May the sun shine warm upon your face, the rain fall soft upon your fields

And until we meet again, May God hold you in the palm of his hand."

### Keep UMCOR Working Thru "One Great Hour of Sharing"

**Sunday, March 1**, has been designated as the date for **One Great Hour of Sharing**, the special offering that supports the administrative costs of running the United Methodist Committee on Relief. This offering is important because UMCOR does not receive funds from the general budget of the United Methodist Church for its operations. But because this offering covers those operating costs, your gifts later to specific Advance Specials or Disaster Relief efforts go entirely to that cause.

Greg Forrester, who is now the Assistant General Secretary for UMCOR primarily responsible for U. S. and Caribbean Disaster Relief, spoke at a recent District event. He told attendees that UMCOR's work is divided into five areas: U.S. Disaster Response, International Disaster Response, Development, Health, and Material Supply Network (think UMCOR kits). We frequently hear about disaster relief and recovery work, but we may be less familiar with their work in Health and Development. The focus in health care right now is on the Imagine No Malaria campaign and on child and maternal health. The development work includes preventive projects to reduce risk in future disasters, digging wells and improving water supplies, building fish farms for nutrition and economic development, and landmine removal to reduce injuries and create more usable farmland in African countries. One of the more interesting wells in Africa uses a children's merry-go-round to power the water pump! Please plan now to give generously to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering so that this important work

In April Mission: Share will begin its **7**<sup>th</sup> year of operation. They are approaching the "half a million meals served" mark. Each year the number of families served by their Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets and gifts has increased. This important outreach to Greece is growing. The goal, however, is not just to give people food and clothes, but also to lead them to Christ. Christian witness is an important part of the ministry.

Your support is essential. Volunteers staff the ministry on a regular basis, sorting and organizing donations, helping clients choose the items they need, etc. Special events like the Back2School Outreach require large numbers of one-time helpers to distribute backpacks and to reach out to the families that come. Providing emergency home repairs is another important outreach.

Aldersgate has made a commitment to providing \$1,200 each year in financial support, all from second-mile giving. Your check payable to *Aldersgate UMC* marked for Mission: Share can help us reach that goal. In addition, we collect feminine hygiene products and toilet tissue to deliver each month.

Another way to support this valuable outreach program is by participating in their **annual auction**, which will be held this year on **Sunday**, **April 19**, **from 12:30-2:30 p.m. at the Greece Assembly of God**. Most items are bid on in a silent auction, with only a few higher-priced ones (\$1,000+) selling through a live auction.
