Now is the time to clear out cupboards, closets, sheds and basements. Don't forget to look for items that may just be sitting around in plain sight not being used. Don't wait until June 7 and wish you had done more!

Please bring your donations no later than noon on Wednesday, June 3. We would like to finish setting up for the sale by the end of that afternoon so that all the workers can get a good night's rest before the sale begins. We are looking for clean clothes in good condition, books, games, dishes and pans, household linens and accessories, toys, furniture, tools, etc. We are often surprised at what does and what doesn't sell.

Please bring only items that are **clean** and appliances that are **in working order** and bring them in through the north doors of the Ide Center during the day. Keep in mind that we do not take hideabeds. As useful as they are, they are too heavy for most of us to move. Also, please **don't bring bowling balls or ski equipment**. Neither seems to sell and no one will pick them up except the trash company, for a charge.

If you need help with larger items, please call Gretchen Hughes (865-2822) by May 31. She will try to make arrangements for pickup. If any of you have trailers, vans, or trucks and could **help with pickup**, please let her know!

We need help sorting and pricing incoming donations and with staffing each day of the sale. We'll be working from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. every day except Sunday. The sign-up sheet has just morning and afternoon shifts, but come even if you only have an hour or two to help out on any given day. We never seem to run out of work. Please note that on **Monday and Tuesday, June 1 & 2**, we will have evening work hours from 6:30 – 9:00 p.m. if some of you sign up in advance. (Go early to Ruby Tuesday's!)

The hours of the sale are: Thursday and Friday from 9:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. and Saturday (the Bag Sale) from 9:00 a.m. – Noon.



People are needed to come in promptly at **noon on Sat-urday to help clean up**. We will also pack up the clothing to take to the St. Pauly's collection box at Greece UMC to benefit our next Greece Habitat project. We need those of you with pickups and vans again to help take the rest of the leftover items to the Goodwill Store.

For the summer, Sew 'n Sew's will concentrate largely on layette items for local hospitals or UMCOR Layette Kits. Marinated Carrots

(Served at the Mother/Daughter/Friends Dinner)

2-3 pounds whole carrots peeled and sliced into rounds, cooked until tender & drained

Dear Sally Stewardship & Stewardship Update

Dear Sally,

I know it is a challenge every month for our church to pay all of its bills, especially the \$17,500+ monthly mortgage. Mortgage rates were quite high by today's levels when we financed through those bonds. Wouldn't it be a good idea to refinance?

Wondering

Dear Wondering,

Funny you should ask! We are looking into the possibility now. Not only are rates down, but also the amount we owe is less than half what we had to borrow to complete the church. At the time we built, area banks were interested until they found out how much we needed. Church bonds were the only possibility open. Even now, the transition is not likely to be as easy as refinancing a home mortgage, nor are the rates as low. Please read carefully the article to the right for more information and join us in praying for guidance!

Possible Church Re-financing

The Stewardship and Finance Committees have been discussing the possibility of refinancing the church mortgage. This would mean that we would be paying off the bonds early. Currently, it looks as though we can save approximately \$8,000-\$10,000 per month if we refinance at a lower interest rate.

As of 6/14/15, the pay-off value of the mortgage is \$1,012,000 with 10 years to go on our current mortgage. If we refinance at approximately 4.6%, we can save a substantial amount of money.

Approval by the congregation will be required to do this,

so hopefully, we will be making an announcement shortly. We do not know exactly how long the process will take. Although we have a couple of banks interested, we still need to be approved for that amount.

Second Quarter Food Drive Set

Families whose children normally get free/reduced price lunches at school struggle to put enough food on the table for three daily meals in the summer. Many seniors have difficulty making their pension/social security checks last the whole month. People who are no longer eligible for unemployment assistance but yet don't have jobs need help. These are just three of the situations encountered by those who seek help at the Greece Ecumenical Food Shelf in the summer.

Our next major Food for Friends Drive is scheduled for June 21. Grocery bags will be distributed the Sunday before to remind you to make an extra effort. Among the items suggested are the following: canned tuna and other canned meat (like Spam), pork and beans, canned fruit and fruit juice, jelly, spaghetti sauce, boxed hot cereal, boxed potatoes, Jell-O and puddings.



Money donations help the food shelf buy fresh food. If you prefer, you may write a check to Aldersgate UMC designated for "Greece Food Shelf" or put cash in an envelope so marked. If we all make the effort to FEED THE bring a bag of groceries or make an extra \overline{HUNGRY} donation, we will make a big difference in the lives of our neighbors.

God's Perfect Timing: Helping Hearts Update

As many of you know, Nancy and I are working in our community reaching people and families who are down on their luck or simply unable to do some of the things that need to be done to have a safe and healthy home. Because of your referrals we have reached several homes and we continue to be astonished at the level of need right here in our own community!

Last October we had just spent most of our time and resources at the home of Felicia Miller. There was more work to be done but we didn't have the money or the manpower or materials to take on a much-needed wheelchair ramp.

With winter just around the corner we decided to pray and wait for God's answer to this dilemma until spring. Over the winter months we had a person come forward and offer to pay for all the materials! Within a couple of weeks we got a call from a young man who was a carpenter. He told us that he would bring in a crew and we would get this done when the weather breaks. The Millers now have their wheelchair ramp!
