## Dear Sally Stewardship

## Dear Sally,

Why is it so important that I turn in a Commitment Card? I already support the church as much as I can.

Feeling Pressured

Dear Pressured,
Thank you. That's an honest, understandable concern. There are a number of reasons for churches to use a pledge program with commitment cards. Some of those reasons benefit you and some benefit the church.

Pastor Paul (the Apostle) spoke about giving to the Corinthians in a couple of places. In First Corinthians 16:1 he recommended setting aside a planned gift you can afford for each first day of the week so that a promised collection could be completed on time and without lastminute stress. Later in Second Corinthians 9 \& 10, he cites the example of the Macedonians who gave generously of what they had even though they were very poor and also the example of Christ who gave himself. He emphasized that he wanted theirs to be a real gift, not one they felt pressured into giving. He also went on to stress the spiritual rewards of that kind of giving.

There is no doubt that there is a connection between our giving and our spiritual life - not so much in the gross amount we give as in the proportion of our resources that we give. A pledge campaign gives each of us an opportunity to focus on our giving: to figure out what portion of our resources we are currently giving and to consider whether or not we are giving in a way that shows God how grateful we are. The planning ahead of which Pastor Paul spoke implied more than checking our pockets each Sunday as the plate is passed to see what we have available. He is telling us to set a goal that we can afford and that represents God's will for us and to put a regular sum aside each week that will allow us to reach that goal comfortably. He also reassures us that we will have enough left to meet our own needs as well to help out with other worthy causes that may come up. In so doing we will be reflecting the grace God has given us.

Most of us find that writing down things we need to do will make it more likely that the jobs will get done. Whatever amount we set in our minds, we are more likely to follow through if we make a written commitment.

That written commitment also benefits the church. That more likely follow through means that the ministries of the church are more strongly supported. Traditionally we schedule the finance campaign in the fall so that the leaders of the church can plan the ministries of the next year with a budget relative to that promised amount. Those who study such topics consistently report that churches that conduct pledge campaigns are more fully supported than those who do not.

It is never too late to turn in a Commitment Card. If you have not yet done so for the current finance campaign, your card received this month will still be counted as support for our planning. We do also receive Commitment or Pledge Cards during the year from people who are new to the church or who newly see the value in making such a commitment. Those cards and gifts are always welcomed as a sign of a church not only growing in numbers but in spirit as well.

Be honest with yourself. Are you really comfortable that you are giving as much as you can afford? You may find after a review that you are indeed. If not, you may or may not be able to increase your gift all at once. In her message on October 18, Pastor Anne challenged us to increase our goals by one percent each year until we reach a tithe $-10 \%$. Some of us may find that giving more than a tithe is appropriate.

I hope this response will answer your question. Avoid the pressure; plan ahead!

One assignment we were given last month during Pastor Anne's series of sermons on "Living Satisfied" was to take the time to make a list of our blessings. If you haven't already done so, this is a good time of the year to sit down with pen \& paper (or computer) to start that list.

The Sunday before Thanksgiving we have traditionally brought in a special Thank Offering as a way of honoring the presence of God in our lives and the blessings he has given us.
