

From the Pastor

What do you want for Christmas? This time of year it seems I keep asking it of others. My four-year-old grandson has quite a list that includes Ninja Turtle things. Others who are more politically correct might respond, "world peace." And wouldn't that truly be wonderful. Some respond that they simply want to survive all the craziness of the season. Others hope for a wonderful time with family and friends.

Then I ask myself, what do I want for Christmas? Maybe all of the above (except for the Ninja Turtles). But what I really want is for Christ to come in a fresh way into my life and into the life of the church and the world. I want to grow in my relationship with Jesus and I want for the same thing for each of you and for everyone. I don't really need another sweater, but do I need to be able to give myself more fully to Jesus and to others on his behalf.



2nd Annual Celebration of Life of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. to Be Held at Next General Meeting

Our next General Meeting will be on Monday, **January 18**, the day our nation celebrates the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday. We will start the morning at 9:30 with a short service of celebration in the **Chapel**.

Because a service day is an especially appropriate way to celebrate Dr. King's birthday, we'll move to **Fellowship Hall** and get to work on our needlework projects: baby gowns, receiving blankets, school bags, Warm-Up Rochester afghans, prayer shawls, and children's quilts. While working, we will have an appropriate video to watch. Around noon we'll break for lunch and a short business meeting to set our budget for the year; then we'll go back to work until around 2:00 p.m.

Please invite your friends and family to join us for all or part of the day. We ask a donation of \$5.00, which will cover the cost of food and help subsidize the cost of some of the materials we will be using. The sign-up sheet will be on the Opportunities Board in January.

End-of-Year Giving by AUMW

The General Meeting of the Aldersgate United Methodist Women on November 7 featured a speaker from The Center for Youth and a Project Day. The Center for Youth is a local not-for-profit agency that offers multiple services for troubled youth in our county, such as providing temporary housing and care for very young children in an emergency, housing for young men who have aged out of foster care but are not yet prepared to live on their own, housing and training for young single mothers, housing and support for youth who are homeless, school support, prevention counseling for youth and families, mobile vans for Street Outreach to provide outreach services, teen court to divert first-time offenders from the school to jail pipeline, etc.

After the program the members of UMW held a short business meeting, primarily to determine their end-of-year giving. United Methodist Women are required to "empty their treasuries" for mission at the end of each year, keeping only enough for expenses anticipated in the very near future.

From the **Craft & Collectibles Show** net proceeds of **\$2,377.65**, half was put in the General Benevolence Fund of the church to be used by the Missions Committee. Individual pledges to mission that have come in since we paid our unit pledge in full in June will be sent to the Genesee Valley District to help meet the District pledge of support for UMW missions around the world. We then had \$2,000 to be given as follows: \$400 each to White Gifts and the Greece Food Shelf; \$200 each to Cookson Hills Center, Kennedy Mitchell's mission trip to Nicaragua, Greece Churches Habitat for Humanity, Red Bird Mission, and The Center for Youth; and \$100 each to Matthew 25 Ministries for the pill bottle ministry and Upper New York United Methodist Women Conference Projects. We are most thankful for all those who give of their time and resources to support all these missions. Through our dollars and projects, we are truly transforming lives and serving Christ with joy.

Chad & Jamie Bader to Speak

Make a point to be in church on Sunday, December 13. Chad & Jamie Bader will be with us that Sunday as part of their itineration to raise prayer and financial support for their ministry in Central America. Chad, the son of Nancy Bader, grew up at Aldersgate. He and his wife are now serving with Commission to Every Nation, a mission group headquartered in Texas. He is a teacher and she is a nurse.

Chad will speak about their work briefly in each service. You will then be able to hear a more-detailed report on their ministry over lunch after the second service. We will also be taking a freewill offering at the dinner for them.

There will be no potluck this time. The Community Dinner Team has offered to prepare and serve lunch. They have two reasons for making this offer. They want to thank the church for supporting the Free Community Dinner on the last Saturday of each month. However, they also want to take this opportunity to let those of us who haven't yet attended know what they are missing!

General Benevolence Fund Benefits from Recent Fundraisers

Money from the General Benevolence Fund is used by the Aldersgate Missions Committee to support their work throughout the year. Thanks to the Crafts & Collectibles Show, the Election Day Bake Sale, and recent substantial donations, the fund is in good shape to begin this coming year.

The Aldersgate United Methodist Women designated half the net proceeds of the Crafts and Collectibles Show--\$1188.83--to the General Benevolence Fund.

If you haven’t already picked up your Advent Devotionals, please remember to do so. They are located on the Table by the stairs in the Gathering Space.


Adult Devotional: “Hark the Glad Sound”



Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally Stewardship,

I recently started using Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) to pay my pledge to the church. However, I find that it makes me a little uncomfortable not to have anything to put in the offering when the plate is passed. Any thoughts?

Is Someone Watching Me?

Dear Watching,

I understand. As someone who has put my offering in the plate every week most of my life, I get a touch uncomfortable if for some reason I have no offering with me.

First of all, for many of us, the benefits of giving by EFT outweigh any uneasiness. It enables us to plan so that our giving can be regular and systematic, just as the scriptures tell us to do. You can plan your giving for whatever day in the month your income comes in. (It doesn't have to be just the first of the month as some might think.)

Keep in mind, too, that you are not the only one in this spot. Some members find it works better for them to give just once a month or once a quarter, leaving many Sundays without anything to put in the plate.

You'll probably get over feeling uncomfortable in time. In the meantime, feel free to use an empty pew envelope. If you don't write on it, it can be "recycled" back into the pew pockets. If you feel really bad, you can always throw in a dollar! Just remember, your neighbors may or may not be paying attention, but God is watching and does know your intentions!

On that comforting note, during the offering I'll try to

Holiday Reflections

Years ago, as a young man I was drawn to help my elders; in doing so they helped me by teaching some insights of their pasts. Little has changed since then; that draw remains strong today. Living Satisfied

Thank you for your faithful responses to our annual fall finance campaign to underwrite our ongoing ministries at Aldersgate in 2016. As of November 8, we had received **81 pledges totaling \$207,251**. If you have not already made a pledge, it is not too late. There are additional pledge cards on the ushers' table just inside the sanctuary doors.

The members of Aldersgate do not make pledges lightly, and the Finance Committee knows we can count on those that are made. We do make projections of income from other sources, such as giving from those who don't pledge, rental income, and the loose offering in the plate, but we can plan with more confidence when we have reasonable certainty that the financial support is available. Right now projections of income fall **around \$60,000 short of anticipated expenses** over the course of the year. That's why your missing pledge is important. We do still need more fearless givers!

Packets of envelopes for 2016 will be out in the Gathering Space for distribution between Christmas and New Year's for those of you who asked for them. Your name will be on the packet if you checked "yes" on your pledge card. It is a handy way for both you and the financial secretary to keep track of your giving. There are usually a few extra packets if you didn't mark the card. Just be sure to put your name on the first envelope you put in the offering so that the number on that packet will be associated with you.

This is also a good time to make arrangements to start or increase your Electronic Funds Transfer if that is your preferred method of making contributions to the church. EFT forms are available from the church office or our financial secretary, Jan Winter.

For those of you perhaps new to making pledges of financial support, keep in mind that we do realize that sometimes circumstances change for our members in the course of the year. You may raise or reduce your pledge during the year. A word to our financial secretary is all that is necessary. Ultimately, your commitment is between you and the Lord.

Here at the end of the year you are no doubt receiving mail from every charitable cause that has your address reminding you that your giving in December is your last chance to have that giving count as a tax deduction for

the year. Don't forget that added gifts to Aldersgate are equally tax-deductible and that supporting the ministries here should be our first priority. Charitable groups do good and necessary work, but let's first be sure there is a strong financial base for God's work here toward transforming lives and serving Christ with joy.
