

## *From the Pastor*

It's still Easter (at least until the middle of the month when we celebrate Pentecost). We would do well to remember that especially as we mourn the deaths of those we have loved. Easter is the confirmation that death is not the final word, that God has victory over death, and that those who die in Christ are alive forevermore in the presence of Christ. Easter also has implications for today. We don't have to stay stuck in sin and brokenness. Because Christ is alive, we too can live new lives in him so that living or dying our life is in Christ. Thanks be to God!

May is a busy month at Aldersgate. We are in the midst of our "Greater Things" debt reduction campaign. I hope you'll participate in the various scheduled events including conversations at the parsonage (the church-owned home where Tom and I live), a prayer vigil at church on May 21, and of course making a financial commitment to the campaign. Tom and I are excited about continuing to give and help the church reduce our debt, so we can be freed up for future ministry even as we continue to joyfully support the everyday ministry of church through the commitment we made last fall. It's such a blessing to be able to give to God through a church where we see God changing the lives of people in a very real way.

Other things you won't want to miss include the CROP Walk on May 1 as we seek to raise money to fight hunger here and around the world; the Mother Daughter Banquet on May 7 which is always a wonderful time of food and fellowship; and the opportunity to work with others to help spruce up the church on May 14.

On May 15, Pentecost (50 days after Easter and the "birthday" of the church), we will celebrate a baptism and welcome new members. **Wear red to church if you have it.** May 22 is the culmination of our "Greater Things" campaign when we make our financial commitments and bring our first financial gifts.

I pray you'll be able to be there every Sunday because without you the family gathering is incomplete.



## Lend a Helping Hand on May 14 Work Day

Thank you all for helping complete a number of maintenance tasks in the past year. Saturday May 14 is the **Spring Work Day** at Aldersgate, **starting at 9 a.m.** Below is a list of some of the tasks that need to be done. Please look them over and come prepared to donate your help in working on these or other tasks. Karen Best will be at the Gathering Space table to coordinate the work as needed. The trustees thank you for your help!

### To Do:

1. The exposed roof trusses at the front (east) and back of the chapel need a second coat of paint (primed only).
2. Caulk & seal outside window edges for copier room.
3. Replace leg & chair tips, most in IDE storage area.
4. Clean 6 sanctuary chairs, stacked in 'chair closet' and marked with a paper on top of stack.
5. Patch & then paint ceiling on both sides of Chancel area, both sides of Sanctuary.
6. Rake along & clean North & East sides of rental house.
7. Repair rental property front steps.
8. Trim along West & North sides of parking lot, plus clean/rake this area.
9. Clean up all leaves and debris around the property.
10. Weed & clean gardens as needed: Court yard and around the building.
11. Check & clean flat roof area of debris. Clean flat roof drains. Clean gutters on side of Chapel roof.
12. Clean & paint the hallway outside of the Chapel and Room 8. (Holes are filled and sanded).
13. Replace rotting lumber on shed.
14. Install LCD screen in Gathering Space for AUMC displays.
15. Office Hallway/Gathering Space door partition to control heat & A/C.
16. Connect Office area HVAC ventilation to Family Bathroom by Office Hallway

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## Annual Rummage Sale Gives Us a Chance to “Recycle” Things We No Longer Need

Have you run out of room in your closet, in your cupboards, or on your bookshelves? Are stored boxes sitting in your garage waiting for you to go through them? Do you feel guilty every time Pastor Anne mentions the number of shoes/shirts, etc. you have acquired over the years – often far more than you can possibly wear with any regularity? Now is the time to get busy!

Your “clutter” may be just what someone else needs. What usable items do you see that you no longer need? Don’t overlook the decorative items in your living spaces that you would really like to replace with something fresher. Those clothes and that “clutter” can help someone shopping at our Rummage Sale set up a new household or meet needs for clothing for the coming year – not to mention raising money for our church and UMW mission projects.

One young woman last year told us that she shops at Aldersgate every year for work clothing. She’s a childcare worker who spends much of her day on the floor playing with the children. Her job is hard on clothes and she really can’t afford new clothing every year. She counts on our sale. She even insisted that her family get back from a vacation early last year so she wouldn’t miss the sale!

The Annual Rummage Sale is set for **Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, June 9, 10, & 11**. For the first two days of the sale, items are sold individually, but Saturday is a bag sale day and we are open to negotiation on larger items. We also sell **baked goods on Thursday and Friday**. Many people look forward each year to being able to buy from our fine Aldersgate bakers.

The Rummage Sale is a major fundraiser for the UMW, but it is also a whole church function. The UMW uses half the money for its Pledge to Mission, local programs, and mission projects. The other half will be divided between the Aldersgate Building Fund and redecorating the church parlor this year.

**Drop off donations beginning on Memorial Day, May 30.** We will try to arrange help for you to get furniture or other large items to the church if help is needed. As useful as they are, we have found that hide-a-beds and sofa beds are usually heavier than we can manage. **Please try to bring all rummage sale items no later than Wednesday morning, June 8**, so that we can get them priced and



displayed. If you have questions, feel free to call Gretchen Hughes (865-2822) or Cindy Purzycki (225-4220).

What do we need? We are looking for **clean clothes in good condition for men, women, and children in all sizes**. It is especially helpful if the clothes are labeled for size. We sort by small, medium, large, and extra-large for men’s, women’s, boys’ and girls’ clothes. **Other items that sell well include** toys, games, puzzles, books, dishes, glassware, pots and pans, knickknacks, pictures, lamps, seasonal decorations, jewelry, clothing accessories, tools, sports equipment (**no bowling balls or ski equipment!**), household furnishings and small appliances. **Bring only items that are reasonably clean and appliances that are in working order.**

The sign-up sheets for helping with the preparations and the sale itself will be posted on the Opportunities Board by mid-May. Use this opportunity to have some fun and to get better acquainted with others in the church. A successful sale lets us do a lot of good for a great many people.



## Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally,

*I'm having trouble getting excited about another finance campaign, even if it is to pay for a building we all enjoy. I think I need an attitude adjustment. Can you help?*

*Need a "Pick Me Up"*

Dear Friend in Need,

You are not alone. Americans are not uncomfortable with debt – we consider it normal when we are making larger purchases like houses or cars. However, we really don't like paying off debt, especially that incurred by someone else.

Enough time has passed for the excitement of the building addition to wear off. Many of you were not part of our congregation when we built them. (Consider: If we hadn't built, would there have been room for you? As low as our attendance looks sometimes, most Sundays it exceeds the fire marshal's limits for the chapel.) Even then we had visitors almost every Sunday, but many did not come back after an initial visit because they felt crowded.

We live in a society that is faster paced. We no longer take two or three centuries to build a cathedral, paying for it as we go. We do want things done NOW! That does make our situation a bit more urgent with that attitude in mind.

A webinar that Pastor Anne shared with the Stewardship Team noted that while younger people prioritize giving to life change, people over 40 want to pay off

debt. Our thought is that this campaign should have appeal to both groups. Speaking for myself, I suspect most of us over 40 would prefer to be giving to ministries that change lives. On the other hand, I'm also hearing comments like, "I'm not going to live long enough to see the debt paid off." That's actually another reason to move up our time table!

With those thoughts in mind, in this campaign we are focusing on what we could do if that debt were paid off sooner than scheduled. Consider the opportunities if that \$11,361.33 now being used every month for debt payment were available for active ministry! The availability of the space has already made possible our Community Dinners and the Hispanic Ministry, to mention two of our most visible new ministries, and expanded other opportunities to reach out to our community. It's our vision for the future that will get us excited.

One other thought: The most important ingredient of any campaign is PRAYER. We will hold a prayer vigil the day before we make our commitments, but we can't wait until then. As Pastor Anne noted, God raises the funds when he moves in the hearts of people. We ask that *daily* you ask God to give us a vision for our future as a church and the ability to fund it. Thank God, too, that we have a healthy, active church that needs to hold a campaign. Only 16% of churches do!

Let's get that electricity flowing!

### Greece Food Shelf

According to their most recent newsletter, requests to the Greece Ecumenical Food Shelf were up from 1,695 in the 2013-14 year (July 1 to June 30) to 1,759 in the 2014-15 year. Of the 1,759, 506 were new to the Food Shelf and 1,253 had needed help in the past. When Carol Coons, the Public Relations Coordinator, spoke to United Methodist Women in April, she also noted that regular donations were down in the same period so that the gap had to be filled from other sources. (Aldersgate donations were down about 1,000 pounds from 2014 to 2015.)

The Greece Ecumenical Food Shelf was started in 1977 by members of several churches to answer concerns from the Police and Fire Departments who had noticed that there were people who needed emergency food help. It was hard to believe at the time that there were people living in Greece who need that support. Emergency support is provided to families once every three months.

A couple of years later the group became aware that there were people who needed help more regularly, and the Bread Basket Program began, a monthly delivery of food for those who qualified. Most of those are senior citizens, but the program does serve others who are eligible. Currently there are 28 people in that program but more could be served with additional volunteers.

The next *Food for Friends Sunday* will be held on June 19. Remember, however, that you can help *every* week by purchasing additional canned or boxed food when you shop for your own groceries and bring it to church to put in the blue Greece Food Shelf Box behind the Welcome Center. That food is delivered each week to the Food Shelf so that it is available right away to meet the needs of our community.

**Keep your checkbook handy to support someone participating in the CROP WALK on May 1!** Last year \$2,240 stayed in our community to support the Greece Food Shelf. The remainder goes to Church World Service to meet hunger needs worldwide.



### It's Time to Start Fundraising for our 7th Habitat House

The Greece Habitat Coalition of Churches is about to embark on the fundraising for our next home.

We already have over \$2,000 toward the \$65,000 necessary to sponsor a home. Our next fund raiser will be the Sticky Lips BBQ dinners scheduled for Thursday, May 26<sup>th</sup> at Hope Church, 1301 Vintage Lane just east of Long Pond Rd. 
