

Sign up now to help staff the show so that it runs smoothly on **Friday & Saturday, October 14 & 15**, from **9:00 AM - 4:00 PM**.

Shoppers will find beautiful, one-of-a-kind gifts and useful, decorative items for themselves. Jewelry, fabric art, photographs, decorative boxes and soaps, crocheted and knitted items, greeting cards, flower arrangements, paper crafts, and collectible memorabilia will be among the variety of items on display. You will be able to shop ahead for Christmas and birthday gifts as well as support our local craftsmen.

How can you help?

Thursday night: Assist vendors bringing in their crafts, help set up the church booth, make coffee.

Friday & Saturday: (1) Prepare lunch both days. We would like to continue offering our traditional meatball subs and hot dogs for those vendors and customers who want to purchase lunch. Regulars especially count on that lunch. (2) Bring in **baked goods** for both days. This is a major "profit center" for us if we have baked items to sell. Be sure to label the kind of pie, cake, or cookie and indicate whether or not the item includes nuts. **Staff** the bake sale, church booth, lunch counter, and welcome station.

World Communion Sunday Offering Provides Crusade Scholarships

Half the funds from the special offering on World Communion Sunday, **October 2**, will be used to support Crusade Scholarships for students primarily from the Asia/Pacific region, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Europe who don't normally have access to funding for graduate-level education. Students who plan to study in health-related fields, rural development, social work, teaching, theology, pastoral care, environmental studies, and agriculture are given priority. The students are expected to return to their home communities to use the skills learned for at least five years after finishing their studies. Any remaining funds are used to provide Ethnic Scholarships for undergraduates, with fifteen percent reserved to fund programs for ethnic people seeking second careers in church-related callings.

Missions Committee Sponsors Election Day Bake Sale

However, **to have a good sale we must have the goods!** People come in the morning expecting to find **cookies, brownies, and breads** to take to work with them. Throughout the day we have "regulars" who look forward to the mouth-watering pies **and cakes** they find here every year.

Proceeds from this Bake Sale go into the General Benevolence Fund, which is used by the Aldersgate Missions Committee to meet our financial commitment (\$100 a month) to Mission Share and other mission needs as funds are available.

Pie-Eating Season Coming Up!

Why bake for yourself when we have so many opportunities to purchase pies while at the same time helping important ministries?

How Many People Does the Greece Food Shelf Feed?

Ever wonder how many people you are helping when you bring in your donations for the Greece Food Shelf each Sunday? In the September issue of their newsletter they reported these statistics:

In the fiscal year 2015-16 they fed 1721 households. Each household is counted only once regardless of how many times they were served. Of those households 430 were new and 1291 had been helped in the past.

The number of people fed in Greece was 1255 and in Charlotte was 1049. Of that number, 2074 were children 17 and under, 2799 were adults 18-59, 361 were elderly over 60. In addition, the Supplemental Basket program fed an average of 31 people each month. These people are elderly, disabled or on SSI and have run out of food each month.

Keep in mind that people's needs are verified before they receive food and they can get food no more than once every three months because the Food Shelf was set up to supply emergency food only. Only those on the Supplemental Basket program receive monthly deliveries. Remember, also, that there are other food shelves in Greece, including a number maintained by various churches; so the total need in Greece is even greater. Yes, as part of the screening, they periodically check with each other to see if they are sharing clients.

Volunteers are always needed for a variety of tasks from telephone callers to drivers to deliver food or to pick up donations from local Aldi's. There's a task to fit your schedule and your skills. Call 277-5370 if you are interested in finding out how you can help.

Dear Sally Stewardship

Dear Sally,

“Living Simply” sounds wonderful right now. I feel as if I’m on a treadmill—too little time, too little money. What can I do?

Stressed All the Time

Dear Stressed,

First of all, you are not alone. You may have noticed all the articles in newspapers and magazines or on the internet or TV — wherever you get your news—about our 24/7 world. People are stressed and stress can affect our relationships with others, including family, co-workers, friends, and even people we just meet casually. Since I don’t know who you are, or if I even know you, I can’t tailor an answer just for you. But I can take a stab at suggestions that may help.

You are writing to a column in the [Hinge](#), so I assume you are part of our congregation. How is your spiritual life? Do you take the time out for worship on Sunday? Have you taken on so many responsibilities at church that Sunday is no more restful than any other day? Sometimes we get so busy “doing good” that we feel we can’t respond to God’s calls for a more direct commitment to serve our neighbors. Loving our neighbors and connecting with our community is part of our call.

Do you take time daily for reading the Bible and listening to God? Morning is generally thought to be the best time. It sets you up for the day. (I admit that until I retired, I was not much good at that. Getting up early enough for devotions before going to work did not happen.) However, whenever you can do it, find a regular time and place and keep your Bible, prayer list, and a devotional available. I mentioned “listening to God” first because it’s often the part we forget. God welcomes the expression of all our concerns and feelings. Don’t know how to pray? A little book by Anne Lamotte, “Help, Thanks, Wow,” which is the Reading Circle selection this month, suggests that those are the only three words we need.

Using “To Do” lists at home and work? Our tendency as a listmaker is to knock off all the easy ones first. Don’t set priorities; set a priority. Pick out the one most important item and do that first. You’ll get a stronger sense of accomplishment and relief when it’s done and

may find that the others on the list are not so important or that you work more quickly on the rest because you are not worrying about the first.

For many, getting bogged down by debt is the issue. We have many pressures to buy and it’s easy to do when we are using our credit cards, buying online, or using other non-cash forms of payment. It doesn’t feel like real money and the reality hits when the bill comes. Check with your church for budgeting and financial planning courses. We haven’t had a lot of success offering such courses at Aldersgate, but we could do so. We also have resources for individual counseling.

Credit card debt is not the only source of problems. Medical costs drive more than half of bankruptcies. You may have had other losses that were out of your control. I think I heard that student debt now is larger than credit card debt.

Think smaller. Some suggestions: Look at mid-grade rather than top-of the line when buying something new, turn the thermostat down a couple of degrees, reduce your consumption. (I don’t include skipping the daily stop at Tim Horton’s because it was never part of my experience. But if you do, find a cheaper alternative.)

Before you buy something, ask, “Do I really need this?” and “Why?”; then wait a day before making the purchase. Use things up before buying something new. Mend or repair things. Don’t throw things away just because they are outdated. Who knows how many working TV’s, toaster ovens, or microwaves have been taken to the dump! Think Rummage Sale?

Plan low-cost entertainment. Play games with the kids. Invite friends over to share a potluck meal and visit. Pity the poor man in the TV ad whose cable goes out and all he has left for entertainment is “meaningful conversation.” That’s a chance we should jump at!

I can only take a jab at an answer to a subject on which multiple books have been written and probably didn’t directly address your immediate need. However, reducing your time and money pressures will make more room for you to become the outgoing, generous Christians you aspire to be. Start with asking God to help you today, and set aside the time each day to draw closer and get guidance. That’s a priority!
